Enrollment Drops In Rural Schools; Cost Skyrockets

Lincoln—Cost of operating ru-ral schools in Nebraska has in-creased 98 per cent during the past 10 years, while the expenditures of city schools have risen only 56 percent, State Superintendent Wayne O. Reed said today.

During the same 10 years, en-rollment of the rural schools has dropped 46 percent while that of city schools has declined but 26 percent.

The period used for the study, Reed said, was the 1936-37 school year as compared with the 1946-47 school year, the latest available.

During this period the per pupil cost of rural schools based on av-erage daily attendance increased from \$62.69 to \$182.33. The city schools, which includes high school pupils as well as those in the ele-mentary grades, have increased from \$68.94 to \$156.48 and for all schools it has gone from \$67.28 to \$162.47.

In the 1936 school year, the ru-ral districts spent a total of \$4,536,551, but in 1946 spent \$8,977,011. The city schools in 1936 spent \$15,988,316 against \$25,006,105 in 1946.

In the last decade the number of rural schools has shrunk from 5,922 to 4,551, a drop of 1,371, whereas the number of city and village schools has declined only 60.

Reed pointed out that the unfa-vorable cost ratio between city and rural schools is even greater be-cause expenditures of high schools are included in the operation costs of city schools.

Stefan Will Tour Europe

Washington D. C.—Representative Karl Stefan, Norfolk, today made known the text of a letter he has received from Secretary of State George Marshall, which asks the senior Nebraska congressman to survey U. S. diplomatic operations in Europe. The letter reads as follows:

"Last year, the department in- vited members of the appropri- ations committee to survey the de- partment's operations in Europe. I recall that you were unable to par- ticipate in this survey and I am writing to renew the invitation for this next summer. I believe it would be particularly advantageous for our people in the field to be able to discuss with you their cur- rent activities arising from passage of the European Recovery Pro- gram legislation and increased diplomatic activity in Western Europe."

A similar invitation has been re- ceived from Secretary of the Ar- my Royall. The full House commit- tee on appropriations, but unani- mous vote, has likewise request- ed Stefan to make the survey.

He will sail from New York for Cherbourg, France, June 24 on the Queen Mary. He plans to return to Norfolk early in August.

Stefan said the itinerary for trip was as yet confidential, but that he would visit "most of the countries of Western Europe."

"The appropriations committee is anxious for one of its ranking members to observe first hand just how the Marshall-Harman or- ganization is starting to function," he said.

A noted linguist and world trav- eler, Stefan is chairman of the im- portant appropriations subcom- mittee on the department of state, commerce, justice and the federal judiciary. He is a ranking member of the deficiency appropriations committee which recently made a substantial cut in the ECA appro- priation.

"I declined making such a trip last year because of investigative work at midwest and Pacific coast department of commerce installa- tions," Stefan said. "However, I feel that such a trip is imperative at this time because of the trem- endous investment the American people are making in Western Eu- rope."

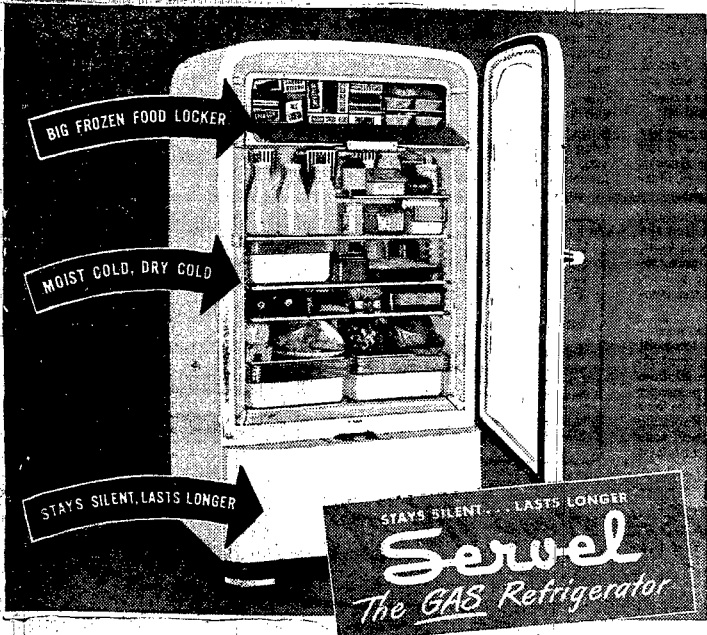

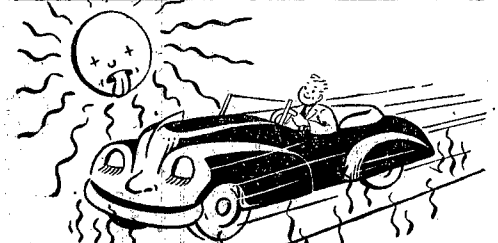

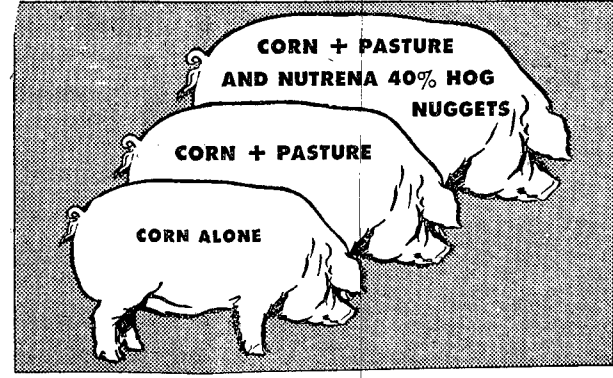
