Winside Soldier Being Returned

Kansas City, Mo.—The body of the late Sgt. Carl F. Jorgensen, being returned from Manila aboard the U. S. army transport, Sgt. Morris E. Crain, was due to reach San Francisco on or about June 28 and will be forwarded through the American graves registration distribution center in Kansas City to the next of kin, Nels F. Jorgensen of Winside.

From two to three weeks will elapse after arrival of the transport before the distribution center is in position to forward any of the bodies. In some cases the elapsed time will be as much as six weeks.

Armed forces dead originally interred in temporary military cemeteries in New Guinea and the Philippine Islands are among those being brought back to this country aboard the transport Morris E. Crain. It is the second transport to return with honored dead from Manila. Another is due in August.

From the distribution center to the final destination, the remains are accompanied by individual military guard quarters in the branch of service as the deceased and of comparable rank or grade.

Over 2,000 at Airport Sunday For Air Event

Heavy Saturday Night Rain Falls To Cancel Show

More than 2,000 northeast Nebraskans packed the municipal airport Sunday for Wayne's aviation field day. An event which had been postponed a week because of rain and nearly was washed out again by Saturday's all night drizzle.

The event opened with a flight breakfast Sunday morning at the airport clubhouse. Breakfast was served by the local National Aeronautic association chapter to about 75 Wayne townspeople and flyers from several Nebraska communities.

In spite of threatening weather early Sunday morning, aviation enthusiasts were here from Tilden, Burlington, Grand Island, Thurston, Ponder and Norfolk. Several Norfolk Civil Air Patrol planes were included in the morning flight to Wayne.

The afternoon program began with a flag raising ceremony in charge of the Wayne National Guard battery, making its first public appearance since it received federal recognition a few weeks ago. Members of the company were furnished by the Wayne city band, which also played several selections before the scheduled flying events began.

One of the most outstanding aerial displays of the afternoon was a demonstration of precision formation flying by a six-plane flight of AT-68 from the air force reserve unit at Sioux City. The group flew over the field for several minutes, forming a different type of formation for each pass over the airport.

One of the reserve planes was flown by Beverly Canning, a Wayne man stationed in Sioux City with the air force.

Next the crowd watched a skillful exhibition of high speed flying by three National Guard planes from Lincoln. The formation consisted of two P-51 fighters and a twin motor attack plane. With the attack plane leading and the fighters acting as escorts, the three planes roared overhead at jazzing speed.

An event which proved of special interest to farmers was a demonstration of aerial weed spraying.

On the ground there were displays of National Guard vehicles and models of some of the newest planes.

The evening opened with a performance by members of the KFAE Prairie Schooner show. A hangar dance sponsored by the National Guard was the closing event.

June Rains Total 4.54

The wettest June since 1945 has made the 1948 crop picture exceptionally bright in the Wayne area. Up to noon Tuesday, the month of June had brought 4.54 inches of rainfall, according to daily records kept at the State National bank in Wayne, in comparison with only 1.37 inches for the month of May. Precipitation measured in June last year was somewhat less—3.91 inches for the month.

But even though rains in June have brought considerable moisture to this area, the total for the year to date still is less than it was for the first six months of 1947. The comparative figures are: 9.19 inches total this year; 11.55 inches from January through June a year ago.

During June, rainfall was recorded on nine days. Quantities measured on each of these days follows:

City Tax Levy Down 3 Mills

The Wayne city tax levy this year will be 16 mills, a reduction of 3 mills from last year, the city council decided at its meeting Tuesday evening.

The reduction in the mill levy was made possible because of the increased valuation of property in the city limits this year.

Levies for each of the different funds: April general revenue, 4 mills (reduced 1 mill); sewer maintenance, 2; maintaining city parks, 1; fire department, .4; city library, 1.5; payment of interest on bonds, 4; payment of intersection paving bonds, 6.5 (reduced 2 mills); bond, .8; auditor's bond, .7; payment of interest on aviation bonds, 3 (reduced 2 mill).

The council awarded the contract for paving district No. 17 to Dugdale Construction Co. of Omaha, but since the bid was submitted last April before the city was joined on proceeding with the paving, it is not known whether the Dugdale firm will accept the contract award.

The following three building permits were issued: William Beckon, 5, auditorium board was removed on the back of the building occupied by Conger grocery; George Giese, for a room to be built onto his house; and George Hoffman, to remodel Ickler blacksmith shop building, which he bought into a business but is doing immediately north of the light plant.

Disabled Veteran Receives New Car

As soon as the title is transferred, Eddie Rochester, Wayne college student and war veteran, will have a 1948 two-door Pontiac with hydraulic drive and hand controlled dimmer switch at the expense of the government veterans program.

Rochester took advantage of the program to supply disabled veterans and applied through Ed Wolcke, local Pontiac dealer, last April. He drove the car home from Pontiac, Mich., a week ago Friday. The government paid \$1600, the allowable limit, for the automobile.

Rochester lost the use of his ankle and foot when he was wounded by Japanese machinegun fire while serving in the Philippines. Directly afterward, he was hospitalized for 14 months and now spends up to four months each year in a veterans hospital for treatment of an infection resulting from the wound. He is a junior at the college.

Rochester, his wife and 20-month-old son live in the quonsets. The VA has provided funds for cars for veterans who have lost a limb or the use of a limb. A regulation which goes into effect July 1 provides that cars will be given only to veterans who have lost a limb.

In Old Nebraska

By James C. Olson Supt., State Historical Society

A little more than 100 years ago a subject of constant fascination for a certain group of American artists was the American Indian.

One of the first of these artists in the West—and the first really important one—was George Catlin.

While living in Philadelphia he saw a group of Indians walking through the street and decided to devote his life to the painting of these original Americans in their native surroundings.

Catlin first came west in 1832 as a passenger on the steamer Yellowstone, which the year before had made the first steamboat trip to the upper Missouri river.

All told, Catlin produced more than 600 paintings of notable Indians and of their dwellings and equipment.

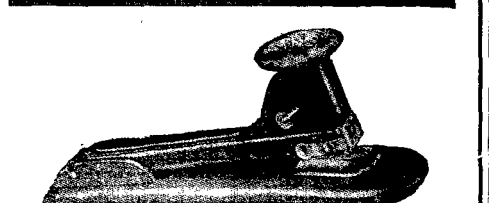

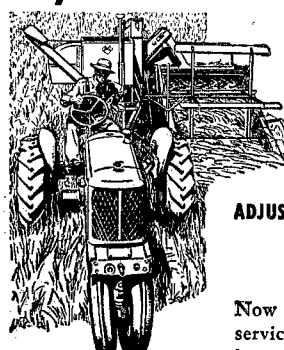

Two Out of Three Nebraska Veterans Receive Benefits

Lincoln—Marking the fourth anniversary of the famed GI bill, veterans administration officials Thursday reported an estimated 75,200—or two out of every three World War II veterans in Nebraska—have received benefits from the bill since enactment, June 22, 1944.

VA regional office manager said that of the 114,000 World War II veterans in the state more than 41 percent, or 47,556, have received schooling or job training; 46,269 have drawn \$16,663,000 in readjustment allowance payments, and 11,672 loans were granted amounting to \$48,365,983.

At present, 18,919 veterans, including more than 1,400 disabled, are engaged in job or institutional training, and about 4,410 ex-servicemen are drawing unemployment readjustment allowances.

Westmoreland reported 983 veterans already have paid up loans

in full amounting to \$279,705 and only 34 of the nearly 11,700 loans were defaulted.

The largest number of loans—9,463—were made on homes, while 1,171 were for farms and 1,038 for businesses.

In addition the VA provides medical care for veterans in the hospital at Lincoln, operates an outpatient dental and medical clinic, and pays for home-town doctor treatments, which serve hundreds of non-hospitalized veterans with war-connected ailments.

VA spends out monthly subsistence, compensation and pension

checks totaling \$2,088,983, to 35,378 veterans and veteran dependents in Nebraska.

Severely disabled veterans in the state numbering 168 have received free automotive vehicles under the "amputee car" program, scheduled to end June 30.

Two-Thirds of Quota Attained

Omaha—Nebraska has attained 66 percent of its \$37,500,000 quota in the Security Loan campaign, it was announced today by Leonard R. Hall, state director for Nebraska of the Treasury U. S. savings bonds division.

Nebraskans have purchased a total of \$24,727,486, in E, F and G Series, U. S. savings bonds in the Security Loan campaign up to June 12, Hall said.

It was also announced today that all bond purchases made between now and July 15, if reported to Federal reserve banks by July 17, would count in the Security Loan.

The fact that certain classes of investors may purchase up to a million dollars in E and G bonds between July 1 and July 15, and that commercial banks, who have savings accounts or who issue time certificates of deposit, may also purchase up to \$100,000 in E or G bonds, will help Nebraska reach its Security Loan quota, Hall said.

Twenty-three counties have already reached or exceeded their Security Loan quotas. These include Adams, Banner, Kimball, Sheridan, Cherry, Arthur, McPherson, Keith, Keya, Paha, Boyd, Rock, Garfield, Wheeler, Valley, Antelope, Kearney, Hamilton, Polk, Butler, Colfax, Stanton, Cedar and Bart.

Six counties are 90 percent of quota or better. They are between 80 and 90 percent and 12 others are from 70 to 80 percent.

Safety Council Says 'Slow Down' Over the Fourth

With the warning that four people may meet violent death on Nebraska highways and streets during the coming Fourth of July holiday, the Nebraska State Safety Council is issuing a plea for motorists to "slow down" with the further warning that "speed kills."

"Speed holds the key to how free of accidents the jam-packed highways will be during the long three-day weekend," Dwight Havens, president of the council, said, "when a record throng of pleasure bent motorists will take to the roads in celebration of Independence day."

Havens further pointed out that speed is a contributing factor in two out of every five fatal accidents and the greater the speed when the accident occurs, the greater the chance for death.

The council offered these practical speed tips to holiday drivers:

1. Obey the legal and common sense speed limits.
2. Keep your car under control at all times so that you stop in time if you have to.
3. Slow down before you get to a traffic signal or an intersection.
4. Keep a safe, clear stopping distance between you and the car ahead.
5. Keep following traffic in your rear view mirror; signal for turns and avoid abrupt stops.
6. Slow down at sundown hold night (time speed below the maximum at which you can see within the range of your headlights).

NEBRASKA PRESS

A Formidable Team

In nominating Governor Dewey as their presidential standard bearer, the republicans chose a young, forward looking man who has an excellent record as an able administrator.

From the mid-western viewpoint, there may be some objection to Dewey because he is an easterner and may not be fully aware of the problems of this section of the country. But this weak point, if it does exist, is at least partially offset by the selection of Governor Warren of California as Dewey's running mate. Warren's record also is good, and he is in a better position to know what goes on in the middle west and far west. It is too early to say that a republican landslide is in the bag, as some GOP leaders say it is, but the team of Dewey and Warren is a formidable one. The democrats have a lot of work to do between now and November if they are to stand a chance of retaining control of the White House.

They All Want Good Roads

The state highway advisory committee which has just completed a series of 16 regional meetings throughout the state, reports that the demand for more and better roads in Nebraska is "unanimous." But there was a lack of unanimity as to how the state should raise the money it will need for better highways. As The Herald pointed out in an earlier editorial, good roads can be had if the people are willing to pay for them. This can be done only by increasing existing taxes or by levying new ones. Undoubtedly, recommendations for a road improvement program will be introduced in the next session of the legislature, which will have the unenviable task of deciding how money for such a program shall be raised. This, too, will provide the test of whether or not better roads really are wanted. When confronted with an idea of how much an improvement of any kind is going to cost in the form of increased taxes, people sometimes lose their enthusiasm for something they thought they wanted. Support for a state-wide road improvement program can be indicated by popular support of tax measures which will be needed to pay the cost.

Rain Can Be Harmful

Although northeastern Nebraska had to wait right up to the danger point, crop prospects now are excellent because of June's heavy rains. If reasonably beneficial weather continues, bountiful harvests should result. But, if the rains were good, so were they harmful. The local soil conservation service notes that the pounding rains washed away precious, irreplaceable topsoil from many hillslopes. In time, if this erosion is permitted to continue, the fertility of the land will be damaged beyond repair. There is at least one remedy, the soil conservation notes. Many wise farmers have adapted terracing practices to hilly fields and an inspection made following the recent rains indicates that topsoil erosion in their fields was negligible. The land is our wealth. Once it is destroyed, our fields will be little more than wastelands. Adoption of proven soil conserving practices wherever needed is a step northeastern Nebraskans must not fail to take before it is too late.

The Wrong Attitude

A ministerial group in the East has urged American youths not to register for the draft, although the new selective service act was duly passed by congress and signed into law by the president. Everyone regrets the necessity of the draft act, but it was deemed necessary to safeguard the national security. It is the will of the people; otherwise there is little chance that the measure would have been enacted. No matter how much we may disagree with any law, in principle or in spirit, the law is the law and must be respected as such. No individual or group should encourage anyone to break the law.

IN BOOKLAND

to Nebraska authors in the library, a new sign has been made and placed above the shelf. This shelf has been a feature in the library for more than 15 years and each year we endeavor to add more books to it because we are proud of our Nebraska authors. The new poster in the children's department reads:

"Child do not throw your book about, Refrain from the untidy pleasure, Of cutting all the pictures out, Regard it as your choicest treasure."

A Book About Dewey
In 1944 the library book committee purchased a book called Dewey, An American of this Century. It has been checked out exactly five times in the last four years. Now once again it is running for president. It will be interesting to see if anyone else cares to read the book. The book has been prominently displayed for the past three months, but no one has been attracted by it. Many interesting conclusions could be drawn from such reader reaction but the library is no place for politics, except to present information about all the candidates.

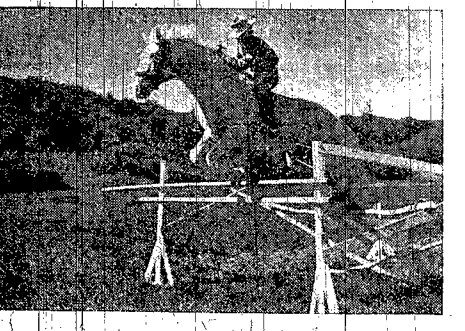

Extension Notes

Army Worms Common Grasshoppers and Their Control
Due to the warm dry spring we had an unusually good hatch of grasshoppers and army worms this spring. Army worms have done considerable damage in the county already and grasshopper numbers are such that damage from this pest is probable. Control of these pests this year is imperative. If

control measures are not applied and these insects are allowed to reach maturity we will have a greater infestation next year. Following are some of the control measures that can be applied: The entomology department of the University of Nebraska recommends the poison bran treatment. The formula for this bran is: Mill-run bran, mixed feed or shorts, 25; Sawdust (3 times bulk of bran), 75; Sodium fluosulfate, 4; Water, 8 to 10 gal. White arsenic or paris green may be substituted for sodium fluosulfate as the killing agent in this mixture. It is well to sweeten the bran with molasses or aryl acetate, commonly known as banana oil. Of the newer chemicals that can be used as spray, chlordane seems

to be the most effective. Certain farmers hesitate to use these chemicals because they believe they are poisonous. All insecticides are poisonous and as such should be treated with respect. However chlordane is the least toxic of the common insecticides on the market today. A table has been prepared by government toxicologists which indicate comparative degrees of toxicity. The following table shows the median lethal doses of some of the new chemicals:

Chlordane	500
DDT	250
BHC	125
Chlorinated camphene	60
HEPP	7
Panathion	3.5

Chlordane can be used at a rate of about 1 per cent of the actual

chemical per acre and will kill almost 95 per cent of the grasshoppers and army worms. Other chemicals that you can use if chlordane is not available are benzene hexachloride (BHC) or chlorinated camphene, more commonly known as toxaphene. If you have insect problems feel free to consult your county agricultural agent for the information he has on the control of these insects.


