



## Sholes Consolidated School Founded in 1906

A Sholes Consolidated School District, regardless of whether records can be found at the State Capitol or not, was definitely organized by the voters of the three districts comprising same at an election duly held for such jurpose in the year 1906 and has operated as a consolidated school district ever since such date. Taxes have been voted and levied during the intervening more than 40 years for consolidated school purposes and at no time has any free high school tax been levied which would be required in the event the same was not a consolidated school. This continuous operation of the consolidated school for more than 40 years positively establishes a consolidated district.

A new redistricting law for all school districts of Nebraska has been discussed by several of the past legislatures and will unduitedly be discussed at future legislative sessions and without question at a good many of them. The fact that a bill to redistrict the State will be introduced, does not mean that it will be enacted into law. The people of Nebraska are not at this time ready for any new redistricting law. The highways of Nebraska along with winter weather conditions are not favonable for large districts. Also the larger districts are always operated at greater cost and expense. It has always developed in the past that the big sentiment in favor of a new redistricting law comes from the shate officials who are unable to see the needs and requirements for the small districts. These officials live in the big cities and do not fully comprehend the problems of the rural, country school districts where the children are required to go many miles to school. And in the event that the State is redistricted, if Sholes would have a modern up-to-date school building wouldn't it be logical to make it the school house for a district comprising the northwest corner of Wayne country?

In the larger schools it is only the good students and the bright chill dren who benefit as a result of any advantages they may have. This average child and especially those children who are slow about learning suffer as a result thereof, because they do not receive the personal contact and personal instruction of the teacher in small classes. In the smaller schools all children have an equal chance to learn and invariably children who go through and graduate from the smaller schools are the most successful students in colleges, universities and other walks of life. Also in this day of advanced education, high school children linish school at very early ages, sometimes sixteen years of age and in most cases, at seventeen. At these tender ages they are still actually too young to be sent away from home to attend schools of higher education. It would be most disastrous at the ages of 12 or 13 years to send your children away to high school at distances of from five to twenty five miles from home, to have such children board and room away from from home, to have such children board and room alway from and to deny to such children the attention and direction of their ts. The greater part of a child's training and education during tender years takes place right in the family home. This is the r place for such training.




