Records Indicate Speed Big Factor In Fatal Accidents

Lincoln—Speed was the principal factor in all fatal accidents in Nebraska during 1947, according to the Nebraska Safety Council, which bears out the warning that "speed kills."

The survey, based on reports to the accident record bureau of the Department of Roads and Irrigation, reveals that driving too fast for conditions accounted for 80 of the 280 fatal accidents. Second high for the year was the failure of the driver to grant the right-of-way to the oncoming vehicle or pedestrian, with 42 fatal accidents.

Others in the order of number of fatal accidents were: improper passing, 37; driving on wrong side of road, 27; driving under the influence of alcohol, 17; and improper turns and signals, 7.

"The apparent reason for the increased number of fatalities in accidents due to speed reflects the fact that speed in itself can change a properly driven car into a fatal one," E. P. Tucker, jr., executive director of the state council stated.

"It is with this in mind that we of the State Safety Council call upon Nebraska motorists and our guests from other states to drive at a speed that is safe for conditions. Speed may not be a little later in arriving at your destination, but the chances of losing their lives are much greater," Tucker concluded.
