Highway Toll on Two Weekends as Many as in March

Lincoln—There were as many people killed in traffic accidents during the weekends of July 10-11, when four died, and July 17-18, when four more died, as were killed during the entire month of March, the Nebraska Safety Council reported today. Several others seriously injured in these same accidents may increase this toll if they do not survive their injuries, the council further reported.

"At the end of the first six months of this year, the record indicated the state had an excellent chance of accomplishing its goal of saving 100 lives," E. P. Tinker, jr., executive director of the council said. "Now, however, it appears that people are making a violent effort, by driving and walking themselves to death, to prove it cannot be done," he continued.

"If drivers would only realize the seriousness of the situation, I am sure they would heed our plea for constant alertness and bear in mind our admonition that 'Speed Kills—Take It Easy,'" Tinker concluded.

City of Wayne Complimented By Nebraska City Publisher

As a result of his July 19 visit to Wayne and the college campus, J. Hyde Sweet, member of the state board of education and publisher of the Nebraska City News Press, commented editorially in his newspaper as follows:

"The small city of Wayne, which is one of the cleanest and most progressive I ever saw anywhere, is a town without a slum or a shack... I suspect that it is because one of our four teachers colleges is there... Wayne is proud of the college, as well it might be for the school's surroundings are as neat and attractive as any California garden and the influence of the school is to be seen all over town... That's what colleges do for communities, as I have told you for about 40 years... We hope to do for Peru in a landscaping way what the small town of Wayne, with its 4,000 people, is doing not only for the school, proper but for its own environment... Wayne and Auburn, I suspect, are about the same size... But Auburn, as well as Nebraska City, could learn a lot."

In another edition he continued: "The Wayne college campus is as beautifully kept and attractive as the school is successful under the management of Dr. Mory, the youthful college head who took over just a few years ago. Dr. Nicholas of Peru thinks, as does the Kick, we can do something to improve the landscaping at Peru. That's our ambition and the river-side school, object of all and with hallowed traditions, can stand a lot of fixing up."

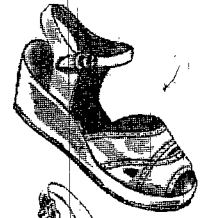

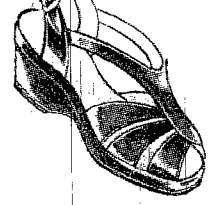

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War Costs Even More

The Russian blockade of Berlin has put the western allies in one of the toughest spots they have been in since World War II ended, and although the situation may have eased a little, there still is no reason to believe that Russia intends to permit the United States, Great Britain and France to resume normal rail and highway communications with Berlin at an early date.

It is gratifying to know that the United States is firmly resolved to remain in Berlin, come what may. To get out now would be the easy way out of a difficult situation, but in the eyes of Germany and all the rest of Europe it would irreparably damage the cause of the democracies. We have sought to build confidence in our intentions and ability to help rehabilitate Europe; if we were to allow Russia to force us out of Berlin without resisting to the last it would destroy our chance to make democracy work in Europe—perhaps forever.

Americans can be extremely proud of the manner in which their air force has supplied Berlin with food, fuel and other necessities of life. We seriously doubt that Russia would have undertaken the rail and highway isolation of Berlin had she thought the United States and Britain would have been able to surmount the hurdle by flying in tons and tons of supplies every day. This magnificent aerial feat has done us no harm among the Germans.

It is an extremely costly method of keeping a huge city alive, but the cost is infinitesimally small when compared to the cost of war.

Wayne's Newest Asset

Sunday will be a momentous occasion for the congregation of Redeemer Lutheran church in Wayne. On that date the parishioners will dedicate their new church building, one of the finest in northeastern Nebraska, with appropriate services which begin in the morning and continue on into the evening.

The new structure is beautifully designed and constructed, both inside and out. Anyone who visits the building is impressed at once with the knowledge that it was built for a purpose—to serve as a place of worship.

Watch the Senatorial Elections

President Truman, in common with a few other chief executives, has found out what it's like to hold the highest office in the land when an opposing political party has control of the congress. Before Truman, the last president to experience this most discouraging situation was Herbert Hoover, who had to contend with a democratic congress in the last two years of his term.

Truman probably won't have to worry about a continuation of this state of affairs after the election in November because it seems unlikely that he'll be in the White House in 1949. But, believe it or not, if Governor Dewey succeeds Truman as president, he could encounter the same trouble.

The senate is controlled by the republicans, but only by a very few seats. In the forthcoming election, the democrats would have to oust only a bare handful of republicans to regain control of the senate. Only four democratic senatorial terms expire this year; nearly five times as many senate seats now held by the republicans become vacant.

This phase of the election may prove far more interesting than the presidential race.

Some Should Be Spanked

Congress returned to Washington Monday to begin its special session with some members predicting it would last only a few weeks and accomplish very little.

Way Back When

30 Years Ago
