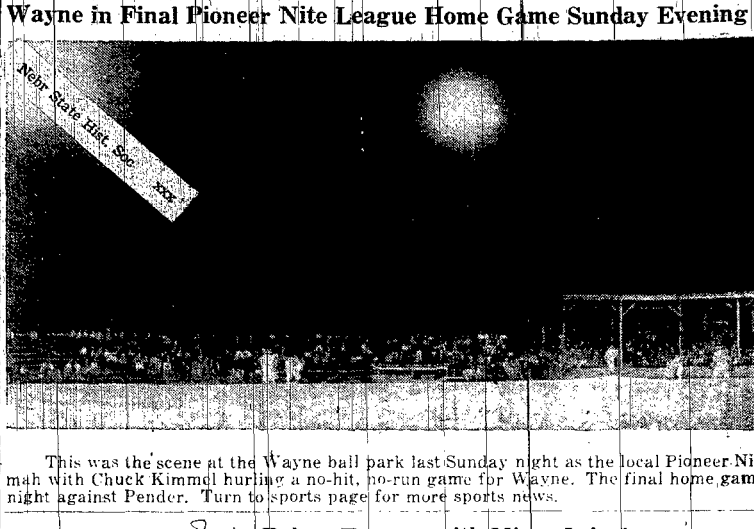

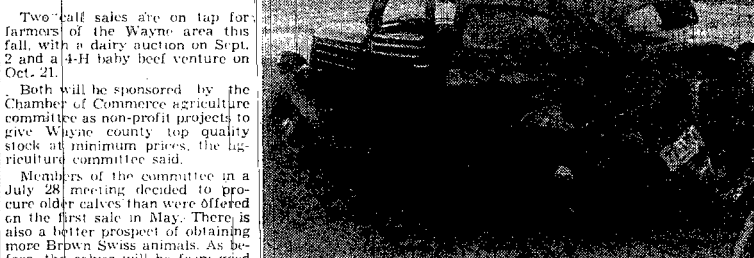

Transfer Records If You Change Schools

Lincoln—Nebraska World War II veterans who plan to attend a school or training facility under the GI bill in some other state are advised by the veterans administration to make arrangements with the VA regional office at Lincoln to have their records transferred to the agency's regional office in the state where they plan to attend.

Ashley Westmoreland, Lincoln VA regional office manager, said making such arrangements in advance will help avoid delay in submitting checks once the veteran begins his training.

To assure enrollment in the schools of their choice, the VA official also advised those veterans who plan to enter school for the first time in Nebraska to obtain a certificate of eligibility from the Lincoln VA office well in advance of the date upon which they plan to enter training.

In Old Nebraska

For the most part, the Civil War was too remote from Nebraska to have the impact on the new territory which it had on the states of the East. But 37 years ago this month--in August of 1811, it would have been difficult to convince the men of the First Nebraska Regiment, Commanded by Colonel John M. Thayer, that the war was something remote and far away.

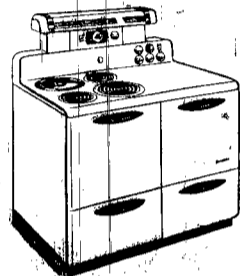

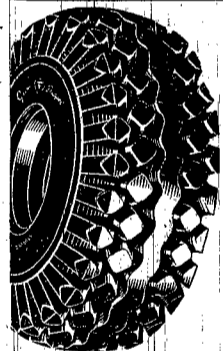

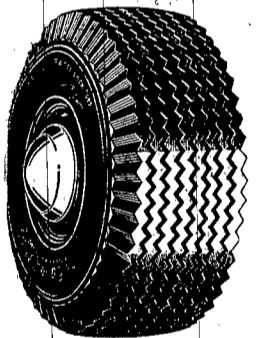
