

Expect Record Enrollment for 1948-'49 Term Reservations in Dormitories at 'Highest Level'

Wayne State Teachers college prepared this week to greet its largest student enrollment since the war as applications for admission to the fall semester poured into the registrar's office.

Reservations in college dormitories for men and for women have reached their highest level for years and the college is arranging for rooms in private homes for additional new students.

THE COLLEGE will offer 169 courses for the semester beginning Monday, Sept. 6, in agriculture, art, biological science, chemistry, commerce, economics, education, English, French, geography, German, health education, history, physical education, industrial arts, journalism, mathematics, music, physical education, physical science, sociology and speech.

Schedule for the first week of the semester is freshman examinations, Monday, Sept. 6; upper-classman registration, Tuesday, Sept. 7; freshman registration, Wednesday, Sept. 8; and start of classes, Thursday, Sept. 9.

NEW STUDENTS will be given the services of a large staff of faculty counselors especially trained to help them plan college careers. Students intending to enter the college this fall are urged to write to the college registrar for application forms and the college housing bureau for housing information.

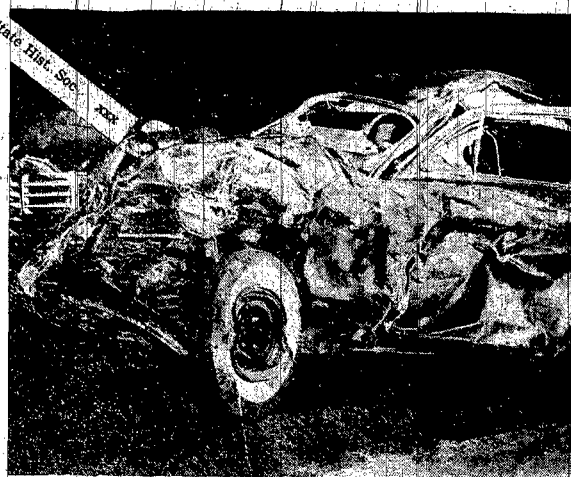
'Rec' Program Draws to Close

Higher Death Payments Due

Lincoln—Approximately 4,000 widows, children and dependent parents of deceased Nebraska veterans will receive increased death compensation payments, effective in September, under a new federal law, the veterans administration announced today.

Ashley Westmoreland, Lincoln regional office manager, said the increased rates apply only to the dependents of veterans whose death was due to service during any war or in practice. Veterans Administration records show that the dependents of over 2,500 deceased veterans in the state will receive the higher payment beginning next month.

THE INCREASED rates do not apply, however, to the several thousand other veterans' dependents in Nebraska who are receiving non-service connected pensions.

The new schedule of monthly compensation payments (with existing rates shown in parentheses) for the death due to wartime service is: widow but no child, \$75 (\$60); widow with one child \$100 (\$75), plus \$15 (\$15.60) for each additional child; no widow but one child, \$58 (\$30); no widow but two children, \$82 (\$45.60); no widow but three children, \$108 (\$57.60); plus \$20 (\$12) for each additional child; one dependent parent, \$60 (\$54); two dependent parents, \$35 (\$30) each.

DEPENDENTS of veterans whose death was due to peacetime service will receive 80 percent of the new wartime rates.

Westmoreland said dependents entitled to increased payments under the new law will receive them automatically and urged beneficiaries not to write VA offices about the matter.

cards as the first step in the dividend paying process. The phase of the process will require many months to complete, he added.

Requesting veterans not to write the VA regarding dividends, Westmoreland said veterans will be given application instructions when the dividend checks are ready for distribution.

State Capitol News

The Nebraska Resources Foundation forecast a demand for twice the present Nebraska electrical supply in the state in the next 20 years. This demand will have to be met from steam generating plants and not from the hydroelectric developments, according to the bulletin issued by the division. Allen Dowling, chief of the division, said agriculture presents the foremost immediate demand, but he predicted that industrial requirements would triple in the next 30 years. Dowling is also predicting an increase of 100,000 in the population of Nebraska in the next 20 years.

About 700 Nebraska corporations will find themselves owing a 15 per cent penalty to the state, besides their delinquent state corporation tax. Average payments of corporation taxes, according to the office of the secretary of state are from \$30 to \$35, with average capitalization at \$60,000 to \$70,000. If all delinquents pay the state, penalties will exceed \$3,000.

State Superintendent Wayne O. Reed proposed a new program revising teacher certification standards in Nebraska. He says that this state has the lowest teacher qualification standards for rural schools of any state in the nation. His proposal would change the present third grade elementary certificate from a three-year to a one-year certificate, renewable for two one-year periods upon earning credit. As the law now stands it is possible for a normal training graduate to teach for three years in rural schools without college training.

The board of control has asked the state auditor for permission to increase its budget for aid to the blind by \$8,333. This permission is necessary before any governmental agency may spend more than its quarterly allotment. A report on the rehabilitation work begun July 1, 1947, among 25 blind persons showed that all but one now had been placed in paying jobs.

The Nebraska state fire marshal reported that \$140,538 was lost in the state during June through fire. The loss in Nebraska property was caused by 114 fires, the lowest monthly total in 1948. Loss for the first six months is \$2,640,987 from 1,023 fires.

Nebraska will have \$30,700 in federal funds available for mental health activities, according to federal security administrator. This money is to be used for a program of research, training of personnel and development of local mental health facilities. It will be distributed on a basis of matching state funds. The federal dollars for each dollar appropriated by the state.


