The sad part of it is this: Qualified techers are at a premium; the best ones, the men and women you would want to in-sprict your children, go where adequate housing is assured. We prizel our children more than any-thing else in the world; all of us want them to have a good education and we spend thousands of dollars to provide the best cedacational facilities and to hire good teachers. Yet we sometimes lose those teachers, but because we won't house them. It is a nutlike problem and deserves the

them. It is a public problem and deserves the interest and attention of every forward looking citizen.
