Next Thursday night, Sept. 2, northeastern Nebraska farmers will have their second opportunity this year to buy high grade dairy calves at a non-profit auction sale sponsored by the agriculture committee of the Wayne Chamber of Commerce...

The sale will bring from 75 to 100 head of high grade Holstein and Brown Swiss calves to the Wayne sale barn. The calves were purchased from some of Wisconsin's top dairy herds...

All calves have been tested for tuberculosis and Bang's disease and will be vaccinated for cowpox before they are auctioned...

ANY PROFITS made from the sale will be held for a few days so that repayment can be made in case of death loss, and the money will be used to purchase more calves for the next year...

This will be a night sale, starting at 8 p.m. The sale will be held at the Wayne fairgrounds...

Water System Now in Operation at Memorial Park

One of Wayne's more important civic improvements projects this year became a reality last Thursday when installation of a water system was completed in Memorial park a mile north of the city.

The project included drilling of a well, installation of a water tank and automatic electric pump, and extension of a water pipeline throughout the park and golf course.

The pump was given its official test last Thursday morning and the pipelines were inspected for leaks. The following day a dozen volunteer workers dug trenches

and buried the pipes. The water lines extend into the park proper and to all golf greens except No. 8.

SPRINKLERS have been set up at the greens, and all greens have responded remarkably to daily watering in the week. The water system has been in use, according to one golf enthusiast. The course is in excellent condition and the golf club is seeking additional players to make use of the facility.

Another improvement will be installation of two outdoor fireplaces for use by picnickers. The fireplaces are gifts of the Mothers club and the American Legion auxiliary.

Dean McGinn Leaves College

Wayne State college last week another faculty member this week when Clarence McGinn, dean of men, resigned after eight years of service, with the exception of two years of work in the USA.

Dean McGinn announced his resignation in a telegram sent from Arkansas where he has been on vacation. McGinn's resignation here. The message gave no hint of the dean's future plans, nor did a letter which followed. Mr. and Mrs. McGinn were expected to return to Wayne sometime this week.

McGinn came to Wayne in 1939 as dean of men and rural education instructor.

THE DEAN has had wide experience in the educational field. He received his AB degree from Arkansas State Teachers college in Ft. Smith, his MA degree from Columbia university in New York, and completed resident work for his PhD at the University of Southern California. McGinn was dean of men and a specialist in educational and educational psychology at Ft. Smith junior college, an instructor at the Long Beach junior college and of one-time taught children in the movie colony.

McGinn has been active in Wayne civic and community affairs. He is the secretary of the Kiwanis club, a member of the Postmasters' club, and collecting officer for the veterans' housing project operated by the city. He is a member of the Baptist church.

DURING THE WAR, McGinn served with the USA, entering in 1944 and returning to Wayne in the summer of 1946.

In addition to his title as dean of men, McGinn was a teacher of rural education in the college here and at the time of his resignation was in charge of study center work. He also was in charge of the placement bureau.

Mr. and Mrs. McGinn are the parents of two children, Nancy and Ola Katherine, both students in local schools.

Hundreds at Wayne Pastor's Memorial Rites

Fellow Ministers Pay Tribute to Rev. Brackensick

An estimated 800 parishioners and friends attended memorial services Monday evening for the late Rev. Walter Brackensick at Grace Lutheran church.

Rev. H. K. Nierman of Laurel, who conducted funeral rites for Rev. Brackensick in Oklahoma City, Aug. 9, preached the sermon. Short addresses were made by Rev. J. C. Ortling of Madison, Rev. O. Weisman of Scribner and Rev. W. Homm, representative of the North Nebraska district of the synod. Rev. H. M. Hipfert of Winslow, who has been conducting services at the church, and Rev. Robert Krust of Wakefield also assisted.

Special music was presented by the church choir, with Mrs. Homer Bierman as soloist. Alma Temme was organist.

THE FOLLOWING account of Rev. Brackensick's life is quoted from the memorial folder prepared for the service.

Walter A. Brackensick, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Brackensick, was born in Quincy, Ill., May 13, 1896. He was educated in the St. James Evangelical Lutheran church, attended the St. James parochial school and was also confirmed there.

He entered St. Paul's college, Concordia, Mo., in the fall of 1915. Six weeks later, in September, 1915, he began his study for the office of the holy ministry in Concordia seminary at St. Louis, Mo. As a theological student he served three years as a vicar, one year in Asherville, Canada, another in DeWitt, and the third in Bay City, Mich., teaching school and preaching occasionally. His graduation from Concordia seminary followed in June of 1922.

From 1922 to 1925, he served as missionary at large of the state of Oklahoma. He organized the congregations at Bartlesville and also at Ponca City.

IN 1924 on June 26, he married Miss Minna Rose Kuenkel of Oklahoma City. Less than a year after his marriage he became ill and entered Wheat Ridge sanatorium at Wheat Ridge, Colo. Confinement there for two years he brought the Word of God to his fellow patients. In 1926 he served as vacancy pastor for Emmaus congregation in Denver. In the fall of 1928 he removed to Oklahoma City where he worked with his brother-in-law for the first three years.

He accepted the call to Grace Lutheran of Wayne in 1931, and it was dedicated in March, 1942. He served the church at large as a member of synod's publicity board and was a member of the students' service commission. Sept. 21 of last year he was privy to celebrating the 25th anniversary of his installation in the holy ministry. Realizing that we are to work while it is day, he revised all of his ministerial records, just as though he knew in advance that his work was about finished at Grace Lutheran of Wayne. Only one project remained unfinished—the new organ he desired very much as an accomplished musician. The Lord planned greater things for him, namely the removal to his heavenly kingdom. It came suddenly on Wednesday evening, approximately Aug. 10-25, August 2, he lived about five minutes after the accident.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Minna Brackensick, and their adopted children, Dorothy Joan, 18 years, and James Robert, 10 years, also by three sisters, Miss Ella Brackensick, Quincy, Ill.; Irene (Mrs. G. Froelich), Chicago, Ill.; Miss Dorothy Brackensick, Quincy, Quincy, There are three surviving brothers, Arthur and Edward of Hawthorn, and Harold of Richmond, Wash.

This came to a close a short ministry of 26 years, but a very fruitful ministry, reminding us of the promise of holy Scripture: "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord. For they will rest from their labors, and their works do follow them."

High school boys interested in enrolling in vocational agriculture were instructed today to get in touch with D. J. Melchre, vocational agriculture instructor at Campus high; Stuart Baller, superintendent of the City schools; or M. B. Street, superintendent of the Campus school.

The course is open to any boy who attends one of the high schools in Wayne. He must be interested in farming as a vocation. Boys who have had two years in the program are not eligible for further course work in agriculture.

EACH STUDENT is required to complete a livestock production project and a farm betterment project on his home farm in addition to his regular course work. Purpose of these projects is to give practice in approved farming methods, to encourage the student to assume responsibility and to give him a basis from which his future farming program may grow.

A two-year program is offered in Wayne with units in animal husbandry and in crops and soils. The crops and soils unit is being offered this year.

Farm Mechanics is Integrated with both these units in order that the students may make or repair equipment to use with their projects and learn the principles of building, maintenance and care of farm equipment.

## Farms Enter Soil Contest

Wayne county farms to be entered in the Sioux City soil conservation contest are those of Roy Day, Dave Reas and Norris Schroeder. These farms were picked from a group of five selected by supervisors of this district. Judges were Leland Miller and Bob Weir of Cedar county.

These three county winners will be honored at a banquet Oct. 1 to be given by the local district and to be held at Wayne State college. When state winners are chosen, a banquet in Sioux City will recognize both county and state winners.

**STATE AWARDS** are to total \$1,000. Engraved certificates will be received by county winners from the sponsors. The district from which the state winner is picked will receive a cash award.

The farms are judged according to the extent of soil conservation practice being used on the farm (50%), the quality of conservation practices being used (50%), and the degree of community leadership in soil conservation activities (10%).

**TWO YEARS AGO**, Wayne county won an Omaha sponsored contest and last year won the Sioux City contest. Winning farms in these contests are ineligible for competition this year. The farms of Albert Watson, Bernhard Splittgerber and Roy Sundell are thus eliminated.

John Fleming, Bill Elliot and Art Holstein are Cedar county winners. Don Warner and Herbert Kohlmoegen were judges for that county.

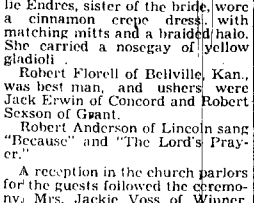

## Late Again

Now comes the government with a measure it hopes will help put the brakes on inflation. Effective Sept. 20, federal reserve board regulations will make it more difficult for the consumer to buy "on credit."

Time payment plans haven't been abolished, but on many articles higher down payments will be required and less time will be given to complete the payments. The theory is that more rigid credit controls will help keep down inflationary spending by preventing the purchase of unnecessary articles by consumers whose incomes aren't sufficient to make such purchases practicable.

We don't know how much of an effect the new regulations will have and don't propose to go into it. But the government, apparently, believes this action will help stop inflation, and, in fact, has had the power all along to take such action.

The question, then, is not why did the government put the brakes on credit, but rather, why didn't it do so sooner?

## As School Starts—Be Careful

The new school term will open in Wayne next Monday and if, during the summer months, you've slipped into the habit of driving past the school building without worrying too much about possible pedestrians, now's the time to remind yourself that more cautious driving will be necessary.

Hundreds of youngsters, many of whom "leap before they look" will be swarming across the streets near the school at certain hours of the day. You, as a driver, must be constantly on the alert for the youngsters who may dart into the street without looking for cars.

Stop signs, too, will be put back in place at the school intersections for the protection of the students, and drivers will be expected to obey these signs. For that matter, stop signs are a protection for the driver, too. The motorist who observes them won't be likely to find himself in the position of having to explain how he happened to run over a child.

## Riding the Bandwagons

Norman Thomas, always a candidate but never a winner, is the socialist party's presidential standard bearer again this year. In the United States the socialist party attracts too few votes to be an important factor in presidential elections, and the same fate is in store for it again this year. For example, the party was not able to obtain enough signers (only 750 were required) to place Mr. Thomas' name on the Nebraska ballot for the November election.

But despite the fact that socialism just isn't popular in the United States (and we hope it never will be), Mr. Thomas sometimes speaks words of wisdom. In Lincoln last Sunday he said, "The people who really throw away their votes are those who insist on riding the bandwagon, no matter which way the bandwagon is going."

We don't know what bandwagons Thomas referred to, but we do know there are two powerful political vehicles in the nation: The South, which always votes democratic, and the North, which almost without exception votes republican.

Riding along on one of these two bandwagons, just because you are a Southerner or a Northerner, doesn't necessarily make for good government.

## In Old Nebraska

Since the days of the Pilgrims, the establishment of colonies by religious groups has been a part of the American tradition. The celebration in North Loup in August of the Diamond Anniversary of the founding of the Seventh Day Baptist church there brings to mind one of the Nebraska aspects of this great American tradition.

The beginnings of the colony in the North Loup Valley date back to 1871, when a group of Seventh Day Baptists came out from Wisconsin in search of new homes. They explored the valley as far as the Chalk Bluffs, but decided to go no farther because they were afraid the area was too remote from a railroad. They returned home with a negative report.

That might have been the end of it, had not one of the men—C. P. Root—been so favorably impressed with the valley that in September of the same year he made a second trip to Nebraska, bringing a group of interested young men with him. They returned to Wisconsin late in the fall and spent the winter talking up the new territory and making plans to settle there the next spring.

Letters extolling the merits of the new land were printed in the Sabbath Recorder, the denominational paper of the Seventh Day Baptists. Members of the church in Iowa, Wisconsin, Missouri and Humboldt, Neb., who read these articles decided to cast their lot likewise with the North Loup Valley. Hence, when those who had spied out the land the year before arrived in the valley to take up homes they found others of like faith awaiting them.

On the first Sabbath after the arrival of the group—May 18, 1872—all of them assembled for religious services. In 1935 the Ord Quiz ran an article describing this first formal worship service held in the Loup country. Elder Oscar Babcock, who had been ordained into the ministry a few years before, conducted the service. There was no shelter, and the Elder used an old rocking chair for a pulpit.

The next year, 1873, a formal church organization was perfected and services were held, according to the Quiz, in the "palatial dug-out of Dr. Chas. Badger." To indicate how times have changed during the past three-quarters of a century, a recently dedicated electric organ will be used in the memorial service in North Loup this summer.

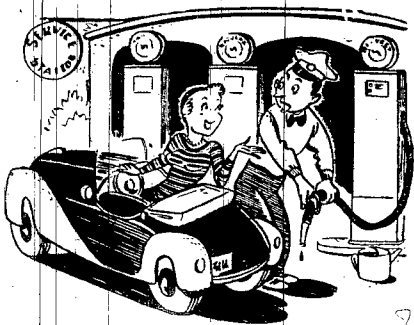

Harry Thomsen, jeweler, and Raymond Brudigan, farmer, both polio victims, attended a reunion of handicapped persons in Washington, D. C., recently. They were there for a week's entertainment starting Aug. 23. Before returning home the men also spent a week in Chicago.

The group they were with is part of a national organization of people with physical handicaps of all sorts. The national convention was held the week following that of the reunion but was not attended by the Wakefield men. The purpose of the organization is to convince the public that physically handicapped persons can be as much of an asset to a community as those who have all their faculties.

A COMPLETE sightseeing tour was arranged for the visitors. They saw all the places of historic interest and scenic beauty in the district and nearby communities in Virginia and Maryland. Thomsen said they enjoyed more privileges than tourists receive. Part of the group was allowed to ride in the president's special elevator in the White House.

A picnic and a banquet, held biennially, were special features of the week. The tour also included a ride up the Potomac river to Mt. Vernon on a boat said to convey 2,400 passengers.

THE REUNION of this group is held every two years. The preceding gathering was held in Wisconsin; the next meeting will be in Denver in 1950. All handicapped people are eligible for membership. The only fee is one dollar for a newspaper. Members pay their own expenses for the trips.

Thomsen had infantile paralysis when he was 10 years old. Brudigan was a victim of the disease at an earlier age. Neither considers himself a liability to the community.
