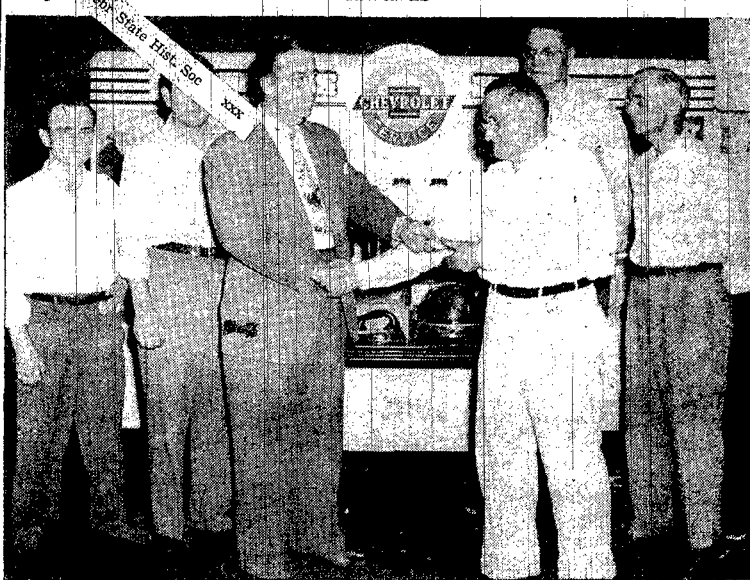
75 to 100 Holstein And Brown Swiss Calves Go on Sale

New Traffic Controls Proposed to Council

Chamber of Commerce Seeks Installation Of Three Traffic Signals, and R.R. Signal

Complete revision of traffic control in downtown Wayne, including the installation of three stop-and-go signals and the establishment of two through streets, was recommended to the city council Tuesday evening by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce civic affairs committee.

Mrs. Rex Johnson Injured in Auto Crash in Wyoming

Mrs. Rex Johnson of Wayne and her mother, Mrs. J. A. Jacobs of near Gillette, Wyo., were injured the evening of Saturday, Aug. 21, in Wyoming when their car overturned after striking deep ruts in the road.

The recommendations, signed by Adon S. Enns, president of the Chamber of Commerce, and Ed Meese, chairman of the civic affairs committee, follow:

(1) That amber flashing signals be installed at the intersections of Twelfth and Main, Ninth and Main, and Fourth and Main.

(2) That other appropriate measures be taken to create a restricted speed zone on Main street, particularly in the area through which students must pass enroute to and from their schools.

(3) That three-color stop-and-go signals be installed overhead at the corners of Second and Main, and Third and Main streets.

(4) That Pearl street be made a through street at the junction with Second and Third streets, and that non-jointed stop signs be installed to halt eastbound and westbound traffic at these two points.

(5) That First street be made a through street at the junction with Pearl street through addition of stop signs to stop northbound and southbound traffic.

(6) That the council exploit every possible means to encourage placing a suitable traffic control at the railroad crossing on Main street.

(7) That this matter be given immediate attention in view of present serious hazards.

It is further urged that all existing traffic laws and all regulations be changed in accordance to the above recommendations to be rigidly and uniformly enforced, with such enforcement being the only ultimate solution to Wayne's traffic problems, and that all barriers to enforcement be removed to facilitate the task of our police officers.

Army Nurses Are Now Eligible for Retirement Pay

Omaha - Women officers of the Army nurse corps reserve are now eligible for reserve retirement benefits under provisions of a law enacted by the 80th congress.

Longevity retirement benefits will accrue to those reserve nurses who have attained the age of 60, completed 20 years of satisfactory federal service as a member of the organized reserve, and meet standards of performance which are required for assignment to the active reserve.

The standards of satisfactory federal service as a reservist require that 50 qualifying points be accrued each year. Points may be earned by extended active duty, active duty training for short period, attendance at drills (training meetings), and by membership in the officers' reserve corps. Thus, even nurses who remain in civilian life and do not request extended active duty may accumulate points toward retirement.

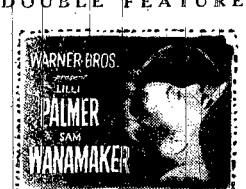

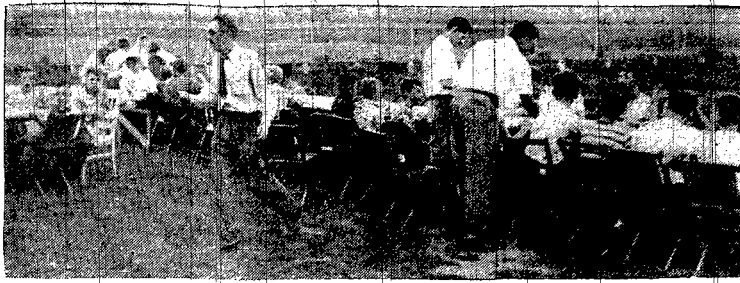

Cows were steady with last week's break, canners and cutters \$15.50 to \$17.50, beef cows to \$22.10. Beef bulls sold to \$23.75, veal calves to \$27.

Stockers and feeders, off 50c to \$2 last week, were little changed Monday, some big feeder steers hard to sell but yearling stock steers steady to strong at \$20 to \$30, feeder steers to \$25.50. Stock heifers sold at \$27, steer calves to \$22 and heifer calves to \$30.50.

Hog trade had a weak under-tone, but most sales were steady. Butchers \$26 to \$31, a few \$31.25, high mark for the major markets, and sows \$24 to \$28. Stags were \$19 to \$21.
Spring slaughter lambs, jotted \$2 last week, were rapped another 50c to 75c Monday at Omaha, slicing the top to \$25.50, a new low for the current crop. Slaughter ewes were 50c lower at \$8.50 to \$11. Feeder lambs sold to within 5c of last week's record \$27.10, the top Monday \$26.75. Yearling breeding ewes sold at a record \$22.25, and 2- to 4-year-old breeding ewes at \$11 to \$14.75, the latter a new all-time high.

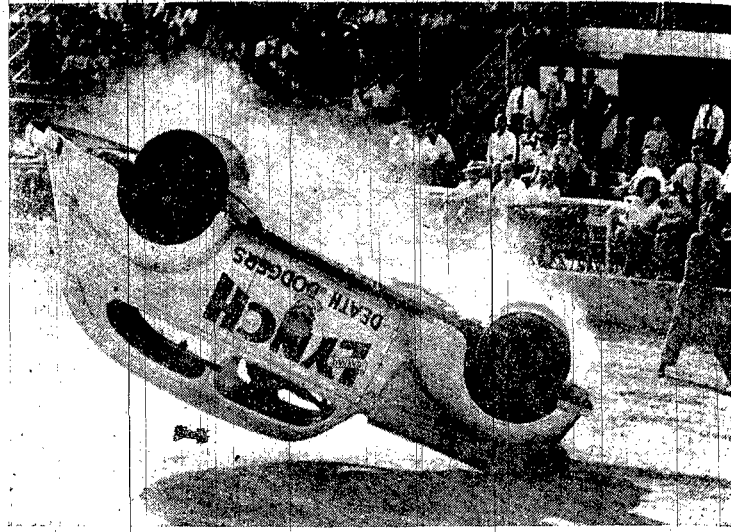

Mayor L. W. McNatt this week warned all local residents that use of the property two miles north and a half mile west of Wayne as a dumping ground henceforth is prohibited.

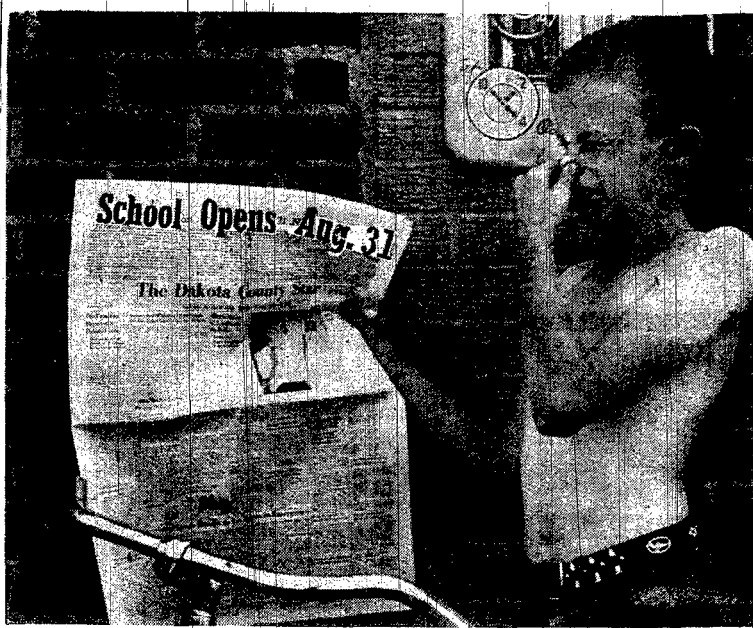
In the past the property had been used for dumping purposes through arrangements made with the owner by the city. The period for which this agreement was in effect has expired, McNatt said.

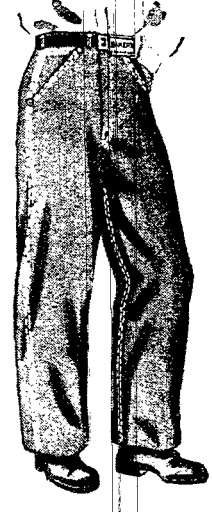

Why Is It Necessary?

Throughout the nation this week young men are registering under the new peacetime selective service law for possible service with the armed forces. As they fill out the registration forms, many of them probably will wonder why this is necessary.

Other than daily reports on the constant threat of war with Russia, recognized by anyone who can read the newspapers, there hasn't been a lot of effort made to educate young men as to why they may be called into the service of their country. It will be up to the armed forces to do a good job of telling them the reasons.

Last week Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, national draft director, moved a step in that direction when he said, "No nation as rich as we are, and subject to so many envious eyes, can hope to continue in existence unless it is ready and able to defend itself."

He also said, on what we think is a more idealistic level, that the purpose of the draft is "to avoid war."

The plain truth is that a draft would not be necessary if it were not for Russia. It is hoped that if our armed forces can be made strong enough, Russia will hesitate to provoke war. The reasoning is that Russia respects strength but overrules weakness.

Perhaps, however, in all the negotiations which have taken place and all the warlike "incidents" which have occurred in Berlin, it seems to us that Russia has followed no logical line. Her every action has been unpredictable, and it certainly is not safe to believe implicitly that she will not attack a strong America.

We, too, hope that our strengthened armed forces will prevent war, but we are more willing to believe that the big reason for the draft is to be ready in case of war.

On Paying for Roads

Public demand for better roads in Nebraska is getting louder, despite the fact that every responsible person realizes improved highways will mean more taxes in one form or another. Public officials, seeking to do the bidding of the people, are on the spot. It's up to them to provide good roads and to raise the needed revenue, without causing extreme anguish to the already heavily burdened taxpayer.

Six possible methods of raising money for improved highways are suggested in a questionnaire sent out by the Nebraska Good Roads association. The suggestions are:

1. A general real estate levy.
2. A general sales tax.
3. An increase in gasoline tax.
4. A statewide bond issue, by changing the state constitution.
5. Increased motor vehicle fees either with or without one or more of the other plans.
6. A graduated income tax.

At least three of the suggestions, if adopted, would cut into Nebraska's reputation as the "white spot of the nation." These are the state bond issue, which would do away with the pay-as-you-go plan; the sales tax; and the income tax.

None of the six methods would be exactly painless. New taxes are never popular, nor are increases in already existing taxes. We believe there is no easy way to raise the vast sums of money needed for better roads.

If we want good highways we must be willing to pay for them. We must settle on some plan to raise the revenue, and then stay with it until some better method can be devised. Either that or be content with the almost unnoticeable progress our highway improvement program is now making.

Luxury Items Slipping

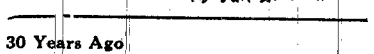
Sioux City Journal: Climbing living costs, according to interpretations of the internal revenue bureau, are causing large numbers of buyers to back away from the so-called luxury market. People are not buying so heavy of jewelry, furs, cosmetics, handbags and luggage as formerly, as is shown by the 10 per cent drop in retail taxes on such items. Nor are they paying as much for amusement and entertainment. Taxes on theater admissions, bowling alleys and pool rooms have declined.

This is not at all surprising. For while a large percentage of the population still is buying luxury goods because of increased incomes in their special fields, the masses composed of individuals and families in the lower income brackets are cost-of-living conscious in greater degree than ever before.

In time, unless there are reductions in the cost of living along with mark-downs in various commodity lines such as luxury goods, apparel, motor cars, furniture, musi-

cal instruments and the like declines will be felt all around. First of all, families must live and while heroic efforts at budget adjustment may be made the anemic dollar can be stretched only so far.
