Wayne Girl Finds Life In Germany Presents Plenty of Problems

Necessities of Life Are Not Easy to Obtain

Life for occupation forces in Germany is far from the "praches" many Stateside Americans have been led to believe it is, according to Mrs. Wayne D. Walters, now living in Stuttgart, Germany.

Mrs. Walters is the former Norma Fuesler, daughter of the Eric Fueslers of Wayne. A full account of the problems of an American family living in Germany is given in the following letter from Mrs. Walters to The Wayne Herald, written Aug. 28 and received here Monday.

Dear Friends: When I left Wayne to come overseas I promised to write you about our experiences over here. To be honest we have been so busy having these experiences that I am even months behind in writing my personal journal.

Our life is very different in Germany, the newspapers and magazines have printed many "never had it so good," "everything can be had on the black market," "tea party life stories" (Tea would be rationed if they had any they don't and I would be tempted to go to the black market for a typewriter ribbon).

WE ARE RATIONED one bar of laundry soap and one of face soap per week per person, one carton of cigarettes per adult, seven candy bars and on several other small items. We can buy most of the things we need and our rations are high enough if they would always keep everything in stock.

WE GET very few fresh vegetables but usually have oranges and sometimes lemons, grapefruit and apples. Often the vegetables that do arrive are dried out or old and the fruit half spoiled, moldy or frozen so we eat very little.

No, we do not starve, for we have canned milk, vegetables and fruits. We eat a very severe diet at times for stovies have a habit of running out. There is always plenty to eat but it gets tiresome eating the same things week in and week out.

Black market is for the sucker and the expert. We leave it alone, for it is not a very satisfactory way of doing business and is very dangerous. Many Americans are wearing glass for diamonds, have a poor grade of dime store china they think is the best, etc.

Before the new mark, cigarettes sold for 900 marks per carton; now the highest price is 50 marks. The old mark was at the 30c mark and prices are same but there is more to buy. It is cheaper to send to the states and pay postage for almost everything we could buy in a German store.

WE USE "SCRIPT," not dollars, here. Anyone caught with more than one dollar of American money is in serious trouble. Our lowest-denomination is a paper nickel, so if we buy something costing 6c to 9c we must pay a paper dime.

of the American children here have little or no idea of what a penny or nickel even looks like.

The PX (post exchange) is our other store. We can buy many things there, but not everything we need. They have very few children's things, no toys and few clothes for either women or children.

WE ARE RATIONED one bar of laundry soap and one of face soap per week per person, one carton of cigarettes per adult, seven candy bars and on several other small items.

No one can live in Germany without using a few cigarettes, even though they do not black market, for the cigarette is King and Germans will work for cigarettes where they would not for anything else.

The Germans all specialize in their work. It took four men three days to repair a broken window because no one would do more than their training allowed them to do. The post office will send a crew for every repair job and that way each man can take his turn twisting his screw, hitting his nail or doing what he had spent years learning to do.

MOST AMERICANS learn a short-cut German and most German schools teach English, so with a bit of German, bit of English, and much hand waving, we all manage to make ourselves understood.

Skip spoke nothing but German until a little American moved next door. The two older ones were in school so it looked like a toss-up for a while.

No one trusts another here at first meeting. An American guest of a German friend walked off with a silver spoon, a second guest of a second friend took a small wood carving. Another friend owns a large shoe factory near here and many Americans come demanding highly rationed shoes; one day three drunken soldiers stormed the factory, tried on shoes, throwing those that did not fit left and right, and staggered off with several pairs of shoes and not even a thank-you; these are exceptions to the rule.

MOST GERMAN repair men will carry out anything they can put their hands on; therefore when anyone works in the house, either the maid or I stay with them and watch every move they make.

Motorists Warned To Be Careful of School Children

Lincoln—With the grim reminder that 197 youngsters from ages 5 to 19 were killed and injured last year after being struck by vehicles, the Nebraska safety council again warned the motorists of Nebraska to "Watch Out for the Kids."

School has again started, which means many youngsters will be exposed to traffic dangers to a much greater extent than during vacation, the council said.

During the month of September last year, 8 youngsters from 6 to 19 years of age were killed in traffic accidents. Although all of those were not pedestrians, the council pointed out that it is cause for grave consideration this year.

The state safety council calls upon motorists to observe three simple rules, especially during this fall. (1) Drive at a moderate speed that will enable you to stop quickly. (2) Keep on the watch for sudden, unpredictable actions of children. (3) Look around carefully before backing or starting up from a parked position.

100 T.B. Patients Learn Crafts at Kearney Hospital

Kearney—More than 100 patients at Nebraska's hospital for the tuberculous here in Kearney are receiving vital rehabilitation and occupational therapy services during their convalescence. The craft shop activity, while apart of the get-well plan at the hospital, has given the patients a small source of revenue through the sale of articles they make.

Several of the patients have shown such remarkable ability of weaving, leather work, making of fishfiles, and other types of work that their handiwork will be on display for sale at the Nebraska state fair.

CHARLOTTE BERG is rehabilitation coordinator for the hospital and it is under her direction that the program is being conducted. Assisting her is Miss Maud Noyes, occupational therapist for the hospital here.

Work the patients do includes the making of jewelry, wood carving, hook rug weaving, sculpture, metal work and typing. Besides giving the patients at the hospital an interesting activity to keep them busy, the rehabilitation program keeps their morale high during the convalescent period, teaches them to use their muscles again and in many instances, gives them a financial return, though small.

THE PROGRAM operates for ambulatory patients, as for those still confined to their beds who receive instruction in sewing, weaving, making of lapel pins, and similar in-bed work which they can do.

Some patients continue with their schooling while in the hospital. Other patients about to be dismissed, meet with representatives of the Nebraska state division of vocational rehabilitation. This is done so that the rehabilitation plans made in the hospital may be carried through to completion.
