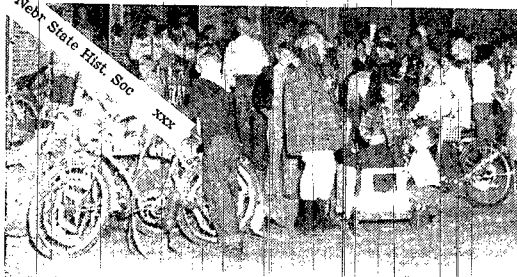

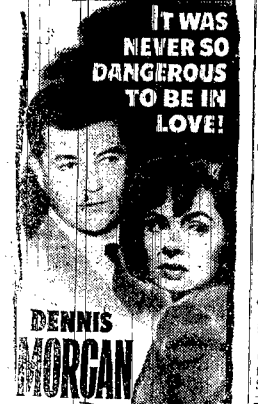

House Committee To Get Data on Small Business

Omaha—Nebraska's small businessmen will air many of their difficulties in Omaha Friday, Sept. 17, before the House small business committee. Charles A. Peters, field director of the Nebraska Small Business Men's association, reported today.

Peters said his office has received numerous inquiries from businessmen throughout the state relative to appearing before Rep. Walter C. Hoesser, committee chairman.

"Many of inquiries," Peters stated, "were from small concerns who fear they are being frozen out of the economic picture by big business. They should contribute substantial information to the Hoesser committee in its study of the problems of small business across the nation. We hope that the information affecting our small businessmen will be reflected in legislation to be adopted by the next congress."

The Omaha hearing, the only one scheduled by the House group for Nebraska, Iowa, North and South Dakota, was designed to cover monopolistic practices, encouragement of competition, elimination of unfair trade practices, anti-trust laws and the enforcement of existing laws affecting small business.

PARITY PRICE LAW—The Nebraska Small Business men's association today issued a call to farmers and farm groups in the state to review the present parity price law.

Citing the importance of farm income to the prosperity of Nebraska, the NSBMA urged careful study on the parts of interested groups so that whatever changes in the law made by the next congress will be of benefit to the country as a whole.

The parity price law, subject to many sharp debates, was established in 1942 and revised during the last session of congress.

The cost of the law is the most important issue, according to the NSBMA. The decision must be made by farmers and other taxpayers what the parity price should be. Department of commerce figures show farmers are receiving about 85 per cent of the prices paid in the base period from 1910 to 1914, and are paying 251 per cent for commodities they have to buy.

Champion Twirler At Fair Tonight

Dr. George R. Rhoades of Kansas City, Mo., national champion baton twirler who will give an exhibition at the Wayne county fair tonight (Thursday) in conjunction with an appearance by Wayne high school twirlers, found that his baton skill was valuable when he needed cash to finish college and attend dental school.

Dr. Rhoades now is a practicing dentist in Kansas City, having recently opened his office. He is a World War II veteran, serving three years in the navy's dental corps. Part of that time he was a twirler with the navy band.

His high-throwing record is 97 feet. Part of his exhibition at the local fair he high tosses with the spinning stick. He also will use lighted batons.

Gives Information on G.I. Flight Training

Lincoln—The state department of aeronautics suggests that all veterans making application for flight training under the G.I. bill of rights be sure to submit ample data to the veterans' administration on the following points:

1. Give all possible information on why you want to take flight training.
2. Tell how flight training will contribute to your present or future occupation.
3. Tell how long you have been interested in aviation and in what phases.
4. Tell what previous flight training you have had, such as previous flight training as a civilian or in the armed forces, service as a navigator, bombardier, or gunner; experience as an A & E mechanic, air traffic control operator, or in weather reporting. Tell of any other previous experience that you have had in any field relating to aviation.

5. Tell how long you will get to and from the airport while taking the training.

6. Tell how you expect to continue flying after the completion of the course; how you will obtain an aeroplane and other pertinent details to show that you can and will continue flying.

Naturally, these suggestions do not cover all the justifications that should be submitted, but the veteran should see that all of these points are covered in his application. James D. Ramsey, director, said.

Big Aerial and Ground Display At Offut Field

Omaha—Offut air force base will open its gates Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 18-19, to give residents of eastern Nebraska and western Iowa an opportunity to view one of the largest static and aerial exhibits on display in this area since the end of the last war.

The occasion will be Air Force day, the first anniversary of the United States air force as an autonomous military service and its 41st birthday as the top military air arm of the United States.

In conjunction with the celebration, presentation of a \$100 war bond and a letter of appreciation from Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg, chief of staff of the United States air force, will be made to Carl Spurgeon, 70-year-old Bellevue farmer, the man who rescued two Offut airmen from the blazing wreck of a B-26 light bomber last July.

The Air Force day celebration will start in the Omaha area on Saturday, Sept. 18, the official Air Force day, when the air force's huge B-36, six engine bomber, will fly over Omaha at 8:50 a.m. The bomber will be one of five which will fly non-stop from Fort Worth to different regions of the United States and return to Fort Worth.

The B-36 will fly over Omaha at a minimum safe altitude.

At noon Saturday two B-29s flying non-stop from Oahu, Hawaii, via Little Rock, Ark., will land at Offut and remain over the weekend on static display. Visitors will be allowed on the base Saturday to view these bombers arriving.

With 46,000 cattle, calves, hogs and sheep on sale, Omaha Monday was the biggest U. S. livestock market for the fourth straight Monday. The run was the biggest at Omaha since last October, and included 16,000 Western cattle, four-fifths of them stockers and feeders; and 20,000 Western sheep, over half of these feeder lambs and breeding ewes.

Reflecting a recent sharp upturn in dressed meat values, most slaughter livestock sold higher late last week and Monday at Omaha. Slaughter steers, yearlings and heifers last week scored the event that it is awarded within the next 10 days, plans call for the presentation to be made at Offut on Sunday, with the other awards.

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Cows advanced \$1 to \$2 and more, clearing canners and cutters by Monday at \$16 to \$18.25, with beef cows to \$23.50, odd head \$24. Beef bulls sold to \$24, vealers to \$28. Stockers and feeders last week recovered early losses, and Monday sold strong to \$1 higher. It was the first "up" market on replacement cattle in several Mondays. Feeder steers sold at \$25 to \$30, stock steers at \$21 to \$30, and stock heifers at \$22 to \$28. Steer calves reached \$30.50.
Fat lambs last week advanced \$2.50 and were steady Monday, the top \$26.50. Slaughter ewes Monday were 50c lower, top back down to \$10.50. Feeder lambs sold steady to 50c and more higher at \$22 to \$25. Freezing ewes were up as much as \$1 at \$13.25 to \$25.
Only hogs failed to show price upturns. They were steady to 50c higher, Monday, some sows up more than 50c, but were still short of a week earlier by 50c to \$1 or more. Butcher hogs Monday ranged from \$24.50 to \$29.25, sows \$23.50 to \$27.50, stags to \$21.50.
