Attendance of 12,000 Reported At County Fair

Excellent Weather, Fine Entertainment Attract Visitors

Excellent weather, above average entertainment and a large number of exhibits drew crowds totaling over 12,000 persons to the four-day Wayne county fair.

Entry day (Wednesday) brought an estimated 1,200 people to the grounds for the Jimmie Lynch Death Dodgers show.

Attendance figures for the remaining three days were: Thursday, 3,500; Friday, 3,000; and Saturday, 2,000.

THE EXPOSITION this year also attracted many outsiders, some of whom said it was the best fair they had seen.

Afternoon and evening programs were well attended Thursday, Friday and Saturday because of the outstanding entertainment booked by the fair board.

Other interesting features were the large exhibits of 4-H club and open class livestock, huge displays of farm machinery, and agricultural, school and 4-H exhibits.

This year the actual judging of grand and reserve champion 4-H baby hives took place in front of the grandstand on the Thursday night show.

FAIR BOARD members are confident that this year's exposition also was a financial success—the best in at least five years.

The board intends to use the proceeds in an extensive improvement and upkeep program at the fairgrounds. One of the first buildings on the scheduled improvement list is the school exhibit structure.

Among the projects completed this year were the pouring of concrete floors in the agricultural building and the construction of a calf washing platform at the 4-H barn.

The gate receipts, over \$340, for the final game, will be divided among the non-salaried players of the club after taxes, lights and advertising have been taken out.

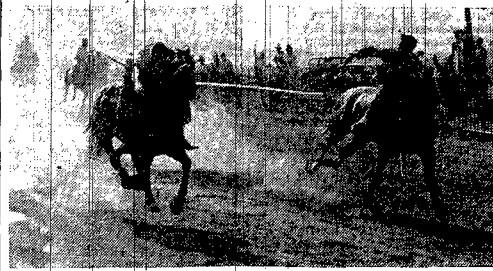

**Wisdom Is Needed**

In spite of the fact that government planning during the past decade has drawn severe criticism (much of it deserved), we sincerely doubt that the next administration, whether republican or democratic, will bring much of a reduction in the extent of government planning to which this nation, whether republican or democratic, nor should there necessarily be a lack of planning by the government, for any nation whose government does not plan for the future has no future. It's the KIND of government planning that's important.

Germany and Japan were two nations which knew government planning to its fullest extent. Both are examples of too much planning, practically all of it unwise. And in both cases government planning extended so far that private enterprise and initiative practically ceased to exist. What happened to both Germany and Japan is an excellent illustration of why too much power over the present and future of its peoples should not be invested in any government.

Latest example of ruinous government planning, according to the daily press, is Sweden. A recent article declares that Sweden, once an European "financial Gibraltar," now is bankrupt because of imprudent acts by government planners. All this, supposedly, has happened in the past two years. According to the news story, Sweden emerged from the war a wealthy nation, but government planners made too free use of Sweden's well heeled treasury by investing heavily in materials and equipment and extending too much credit to neighboring countries, expecting to reap huge benefits in future years. The benefits did not materialize, and as a result Sweden now supposedly is broke and looking to the United States for financial aid.

Here in the United States we have seen plenty of government planning, too, and much of it has been far from brilliant. Economically, this fact is much in evidence. The government may not be alone to blame for our current inflationary cycle, but by its failure to plan wisely it certainly has contributed heavily.

The examples of improvident government planning are numerous. We believe, nonetheless, that it is a vitally important function of our government, but in the future we want to see it done wisely, and we don't want to see it extended to the point where nearly every action of every citizen is subject to rigid government control.

**An Outstanding Success**

A word of praise is due this week to the Wayne County Fair Board, Manager Al Bahe, department superintendents, 4-H members and leaders, and all others who helped make the 1948 show such an outstanding success.

The Wayne county fair this year was excellent. Thousands of people attended each day, many of them from outstate. Some were so enthusiastic with the local show as to compare it with the state fair.

We are led to suggest that northeastern Nebraska's best fair in 1948 took place right here in Wayne. And it's not too soon to begin planning an even better exposition in 1949.

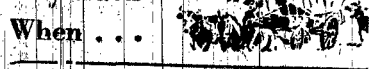
**It Has Never Happened... Yet**
