

Firmness may not work either, but it seems worth a try inasmuch as consistent diplomatic efforts to reach an understanding with the Soviet Union have failed.

The Knoxville (1a.) Journal says: "Truman's abuse and blasting away at everybody in sight reminds us of the old saying that the lawyer with a poor case in court abuses and villifies the opposition lawyer."




