Prominent Leaders On Presbyterian Program Oct. 5-7

The Synod of Nebraska of the Presbyterian church of the U.S.A. will celebrate its 75th anniversary when delegates convene at the Wayne Presbyterian church Oct. 5 to 7 for their annual session.

Approximately 150 ministerial and lay representatives are expected for the meeting, according to Rev. Oliver B. Proett, Wayne, stated clerk of the synod and host pastor.

THE SESSION opens at 10 a.m. Tuesday with registration. A music period and business matters are on the afternoon program, and at 8:00 that evening Rev. Raymond V. Kearns, sr., of Chicago, will give an address on the New Life movement.

Rev. Kearns also will be the speaker at the college convocation Tuesday morning.

THE COLLEGE CHOIR will present a special concert at this meeting, to which the public is invited, Rev. Proett said.

Also on the Wednesday program will be the laymen's dinner at 6:00. Talks will be given by Presbyterian laymen who attended the Chicago meeting.
