His reason: He believes Governor Dewey is certain to be the next president and says it would be "only fair to give him (Dewey) 'time to look over the whole governmental ladministrative and fiscal picture!

It is a known fact that swiftly mounting government lexpenditures (for rearnament and European ald, among other things) may make an early return to higher income taxes necessary if deficit spending is to be avoided. Thus, the congressman may be selizing an opportunity to "pass the buck," hoping in this way to get out of the embarrassing position in which he would find himself if taxes da go up despite his recent loud dediarations that taxes can and should be reduced.

In fairness to Mr. Knutson, though, it should be pointed out that he may be making a very wise move. Mr. Dewey, if elacted, should have the right to study the entire picture before too much inkering is done with the nation's taxing machinery.

Dewey has promised that he will conduct a thorough housecleaning in Washing. In view of mounting governmental expenditures, it will take just that kind of action to prevent an increase in tax rates. As for the congressman's dream of another income tax reduction, it is not an impossibility, but it will call for a really good job of consolidating verlapping government bureaus and eliminating unnecessary ones.
