Wayne Hospital Has 35-Year Record of Service in This Area

Has Been Operated By Dr. S. A. Lutgen Since Its Founding

When the Tri-States Nursing home takes possession of the Wayne hospital on Nov. 1, it will mark the close of 35 years of hospital service to northeastern Nebraskans under the direction of Dr. S. A. Lutgen.

Dr. Lutgen came to Wayne from Auburn, Neb., in 1910. At that time the only hospitals in northeast Nebraska were those in Norfolk and in Fremont, and they were both very small. There was as yet no bridge across the Missouri at Yankton, so this entire northeast section was tributary to Wayne.

When the state took over the normal school, the old ward school building, which was situated where the city water tower now stands, was abandoned. Local physicians tried to interest the city into converting the building into a hospital, but city officials feared it would not be self-supporting and declined to take action.

Dr. Lutgen then built a 10-bed cottage hospital on the lot that is now the southwest corner of the college campus.

DURING the first world war when the flu epidemic struck, Dr. Lutgen was serving as college physician, a position which he held for 25 years. An ROTC unit was housed at the college and at one time more than 400 students were ill at the college. With only two nurses available, Mrs. U. S. Conn, wife of the college president, organized the faculty women as nurses aids to help care for the sick. Those who contracted pneumonia and the more seriously ill were moved to the hospital and not one of the 400 patients was lost.

Not only was there a shortage of nurses, but many doctors in the community were stricken with the flu and this increased the burden of the local doctors. Dr. Lutgen describes this period as the most trying in his career.

It wasn't long until the little hospital proved inadequate. The ground was sold to the normal school to enlarge the campus. The building was moved across the street and converted into what is now the College Inn.

THE PRESENT hospital site between Ninth and Tenth on Main street was purchased from the late Dr. Wightman. The buildings were moved across the street and occupied by Mrs. Delilah Tyrell and the Alan Sandahls.

Formal opening of the present hospital was held for two days during the Thanksgiving period in 1920. Since its completion, it has been enlarged into a 30-bed hospital with an 8-bassinel nursery. At times, even the capacity of the enlarged hospital has been strained.

When asked how many babies have been born in the hospital, Dr. Lutgen explained that he hadn't had time to look into the records to count them. He said that he had had a good many Caesarian babies and twins were not uncommon. However, only one set of triplets was born at the hospital. These were born to a family who lived north of Laurel and who were enroute to Omaha at the time.

During the early years of the hospital, there was no state, county or federal aid and no compulsory automobile insurance. Nonetheless, every emergency patient was accommodated, even though many times remuneration was not forthcoming.

THE OF NURSES during the early period was much easier and cheaper than it is now. Hard work and much planning were required to master the problems during the depression following the first world war. Many business houses closed or sold out, but the hospital kept serving the public.

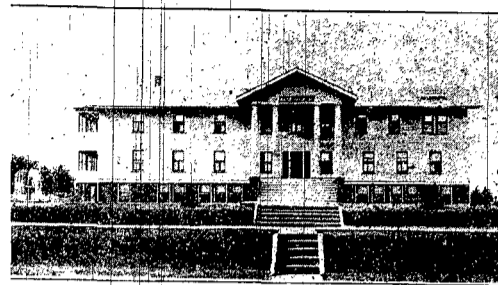
During the second war, rationing and other restrictions added to the inconvenience, but everyone seemed content with a smaller profit to meet the challenge of service.

The help problem was most acute during the second war. Young college men who had formerly been utility workers, were called into service or took war jobs. The government paid nurses a good deal more money so many deserted private practice to go to work for the government. The hospitals carried on in spite of all these adverse conditions.

During the first 10 years, a nurses training school was conducted at the Wayne hospital in cooperation with the college and local physicians, the late Drs. E. S. Blair and George Hess and Dr. C. T. Ingram, who now resides in California.

FIFTY-EIGHT girls graduated from this course, spending their last year of training in Chicago, either at the Presbyterian hospital or at Frances Willard, with additional time spent at the Illinois Cook county hospital. Many who completed the course, but did not go on to Chicago, but remained to serve as practical nurses.

In 1925, Dr. Lutgen, with the help of Dr. Conn, bought a 1000-watt radio station and established studios in the south basement of the hospital. The station was conducted with the assistance of the college faculty and was known as station KGCH. During its four years of operation, Merrill J. Shum, was engineer and operator. He attended college in his spare time, and at his graduation was offered a position with a Los Angeles station. When the owners of the



station were unable to interest the city into taking it over, it was sold to Grand Island and is still in operation there.

FIVE LADIES have served as superintendents of the hospital since its establishment. The first was Elizabeth Bellinger, who later married Dr. Vic Slinger and moved to California.

Eva Lucas was the first superintendent in the new building. Shortly after the hospital opening, she married Lt. Paul Sherburne of Sioux Falls, during World War II, she was in charge of the health unit at the Sioux City air base and is now doing welfare work in South Dakota.

Mrs. Anna Grisset served for just one year, having left a job with a railroad company in Sacramento to try out the midwest. The winters were too severe for her and she returned to California where she is still in the railroad employ.

Lisle Clayton succeeded her and was here for several years. She now resides in California.

Mrs. Harriet Hossle has been in charge of the hospital for the past 12 years.

ASIDE FROM the hospital building, Dr. Lutgen has remodeled or built 15 residences in Wayne. Among them are the late Dr. William's residence at 317 West Third; the John Sherburne residence at 212 Lincoln; at one time the home of the Lutgens, which has since been converted into five apartments; the O. K. Brandtletter home at 1012 West Ninth; the William Wagner home at 409 West Tenth; the A. C. Lamp home at 413 West Tenth; the Ralph Morse home at 1020 Main; and the present Lutgen home at 1012 Main.

Dr. Lutgen has served as city physician under Mayors Martin Ringer, Herman Lundberg and the two terms of E. W. McNatt.

Even though the hospital has been sold, Dr. Lutgen will continue to practice in Wayne, with offices in the Berry building.

After serving for two world wars, with the threat of a third, he wishes to be relieved of the responsibility of handling the hospital. He will probably spend some time doing graduate work in medicine and just "enjoying himself."

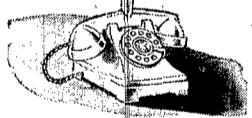
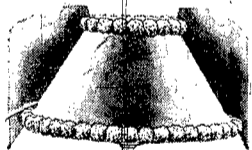

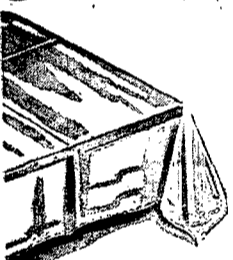
