



If this is true, safety measures which have been adopted by many cities should be extended over the entire nation. Safety conscious cities annually set up automobile inspection lanes for the purpose of check-ing lights, brakes and other parts of all cars in those cities. Those deemed safe are so marked with small stickers; those with de-fects are warned to have repairs made at

once.

With so many old cars on the highways, it is probable that mechanical failures will contribute more and more heavily to the accident rate. Some system should be established whereby all cars everywhere can be inspected once a year.

Uncle Sam Gets in Line

In these days of high prices, the Omaha Journal-Stockman notes that Uncle Sam has been slow to join the nation in increasing his prices. As an example, the Journal-Stockman points to the obsolete fees of the post office department, and notes that some of these fees will be increased on Jan. 1. The Journal-Stockman says:

"When the costs of a service reach the point where they contribute to mounting deficits, the prices. 


