You know what tat means! Less feed. More and quicker profit.

3) Sheep Experiment Station men at Dubois, Idaho, and they can use the scales to select breeding stock for reater production in the future. Their ewe lambs, hich are heavier than average at weaning time, prove be the best producers in total lamb weight and fleece eights.

4) At the University of Wyoming they divided dairy eifers into light and heavy weight groups. The "heavies" eighed 24 pounds more at birth. But at six months nev averaged 43 pounds more per animal. Keep or buy animals heaviest at birth or weaning!
