Churches throughout Wayne county next Sunday will issue an appeal for gifts of cash or commodities for the Christmas Overseas Program goodwill train which will leave Nebraska early in December.

The county's drive to raise funds for the purchase of a carload of food for the needy is progressing under the direction of Dr. O. B. Proett, county chairman, and workers in the various precincts. The committee hopes to complete collection of funds about Nov. 22.

COMMODITIES contributed for CROP will be sold and the money thus received will be added to cash gifts for the purchase of the carload. Each family is asked to give five bushels of corn or \$6, the cash equivalent.

'48 Corn Crop Termed 'Best Quality Ever'

90 Per Cent of Corn In Wayne County Has Been Picked

Wayne countyans are boasting "the best quality corn crop ever," according to reports from the agricultural agencies in Wayne.

"There is no worry damage and there are very few rotten ears this year," says T. P. Roberts, chairman of the AAA. "Moisture content ranges 13.5 to 19 per cent," he continued.

ABOUT 90 PER CENT of the farmers have finished picking and the average county yield is estimated upward from 40 bushels per acre, with some small plots reaching 50 bushels. The picking was done by machine and nearly all farmers have stored their corn for feeding.

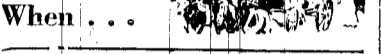
the adults were as interested in the public library, what a library we could have! Of course if they were, the staff would have to be increased, for there is a limit to what one individual can do.
