War Death Benefits \$2,840,000 Monthly

Lincoln—Death benefits amounting to more than \$2,840,000 a month are being paid to deceased war veterans' dependents living in Nebraska and the four neighboring states Iowa, Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota which comprise the veterans administration's breach states.

Ashley Westmoreland, Lincoln regional office manager, said that of the above amount, \$1,521,376.66 death compensation and pension benefits is being paid each month to 29,742 persons in the area. 15,084 of whom are dependents of World War II veterans.

This northeast Nebraska pioneer farmed in Wayne and Dixon counties from around 1882 until 1911 when he and Mrs. Busby moved to Wakefield to live.

Lieder Singer on College Program
