William Bahe, 71, Davenport, Dies

William Bahe of Davenport, father of Albert and Ed Bahe of Wayne, died Nov. 28 at a Hastings hospital where he had been a patient since Oct. 12.

Mr. Bahe, who was born in Beecher, Ill., Nov. 20, 1877, came to Nebraska at the age of 10 and settled with his parents in the Iowa vicinity. During his youth he was baptized and confirmed in the Lutheran church.

In 1900, he and Ella Gewecke were married at Ohio and they lived on a farm until 1939 when they moved into town. He operated a recreation parlor in Ohio for three years and then moved to Davenport where he had a theater for four years.

Mr. Bahe leaves his wife, his son, Albert and Ed, and a daughter, Adeline, now Mrs. Howard Sieckman of Davenport; seven grandchildren, two great grandchildren; a brother, John, and two sisters, Mrs. Sophie Dearking and Mrs. William Sieckman, all of Ohio.

Pioneer Merchant Recalls Big Fire on Thanksgiving, '91

Thanksgiving day reminded Edward Trautwein of Carroll of the spectacular fire in Wayne on Thanksgiving day in 1891. Mr. Trautwein, one of Wayne county's pioneer businessmen, retired after spending after 55 years in the meat business.

At the time of the fire, he was a lad of 15, having just come to America from Germany to be apprenticed to his uncle at a local butcher shop.

The half block from the corner of Third street south on the west side of the street was wiped out he recalled. The old hand pump fire engine broke down after only a few gallons of water had been sprayed on the flames. A bucket brigade was formed, but with little success, and the main concern of the business men was to keep the fire from spreading across the alley.

"MY UNCLE'S shop was located where the Mode is now, and we nailed a rug against the wall of the shop and threw water, salt and flour on it to act as a fire wall. It worked, too, because the rest of the block was saved," he declared.

In reminiscing of the past, Mr. Trautwein remarked that "things were different in the old days. Only the butcher shops (there were three in Wayne in 1891) sold meat, and only the grocery stores sold groceries. A separate store stand sold all the fruit in town, and it was a long time before grocery stores carried fruit."

"THE SECOND world war was the hardest period Mr. Trautwein could remember in his many years in business. 'Why, butcher scales don't even have prices on them as high as the price of meat during the war and now.' He explained that meat scales only go as high as 75 cents a pound and he first started butchering when only 36 cents.

To compare prices in the very early days with those now, he said that during the 90's, three pounds of beef steak sold for 25 cents, beef roast for 7 cents, boiling beef, 4 cents, pork, 10 cents, and lard, 12 to 15 cents. Lard and pork were higher because they were scarce, and the general trend of meat prices was so low because nearly everyone butchered for himself.

WHEN HE FIRST came to Wayne, the butcher shop was supplied with ice from the many lakes just east of town. "There was quite a chain of lakes out there," he said, "and during the summer one could catch as many as 150 blueheads in an hour. Of course, some of them weren't so big."

After he moved to Carroll in 1902 to operate his own shop, he shipped in ice from Sioux City. Later when he read about ice making machines, he bought one and became the owner of the first machine in the county.

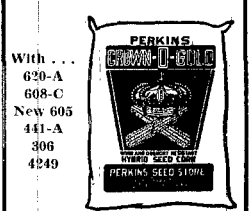

1,098 Veterans Of World War 2 60 Pct. Disabled

Lincoln—The veterans administration reports that 1,098 World War 2 veterans in Nebraska have service-incurred disabilities rated at 60 per cent or more in degree.

Ashley Westmoreland, Lincoln regional office manager, said these seriously disabled veterans include 9 who are blind, 5 with hearing or speech defects, 277 neuropsychiatric cases, 112 with amputations or other orthopedic difficulties and 134 with tuberculosis and heart ailments. The remainder, he added, of those whose service-connected disabilities are 60 per cent or more have various other disabilities or combinations thereof.

WORLD WAR 2 veterans rated as 60 per cent or more disabled receive money compensation ranging from \$82.80 to \$138 if the amount was incurred in war service and \$66.24 to \$110.40 if incurred in peacetime service. In some cases, such as total blindness the monthly payment may run as high as \$360. Additional amounts also are paid for support of dependents.

In addition to 1098 seriously disabled veterans, Westmoreland said, a total of 9916 others draw monthly compensation for service-connected disabilities rated at less than 60 per cent. The total compensation paid by VA for all types of service-incurred disabilities amounts to \$425,294 in Nebraska.

IN ADDITION to monthly compensation payments, the VA also provides disabled veterans with hearing aids, glasses, artificial limbs, braces and other prosthetic devices, and helps pay for education and job training to assist the veterans toward full rehabilitation.

Discuss Wildlife Area Program For Next Year

Representatives of the state game forestation and park commission met here Nov. 22 with soil conservation service personnel from 10 counties in northeast Nebraska, to discuss the program of developing wildlife areas in 1949.

The program, which was started in 1947 in this area of the state and in one small section in the southeast part of the state, was expanded this year to include a much larger area. Plans for 1949 are to develop five new areas in each county where the program is in operation.

The wildlife areas are established on farms where there is land not suitable for production. These areas will be fenced off by the state game commission and will be planted to trees and shrubs. The farmer agrees to protect them from livestock for a period of 10 years.

Twelve refuges have already been established in Wayne county, and two new ones are planned on the Bernard C. Spittler farm and Mike Draghu farm.

The Highway Report

The price of a long range road development program in Nebraska is going to be high—\$926,230,000 over a 20-year period, according to the long awaited report of the highway advisory committee to the governor.

As envisaged by the committee and consulting engineers, better roads would cost \$46,316,000 annually, if a 20-year program were to be adopted. This would provide new roads in parts of the state which need them most, and for the repair and upkeep of existing roads.

In addition to the 20-year plan, the committee submitted alternative 15-year and 10-year programs, which would call for proportionately higher annual expenditures in order to accomplish the same goals.

The committee's specific recommendations as to where new roads should be constructed, and as to how existing roads should be improved, may not prove entirely satisfactory to all Nebraskans. But the report is something to work from, and it should prove of great value to the governor and legislature in working out a good roads program.

There is no question as to whether Nebraskans want better roads—the clamor is growing louder each year, and state officials and legislators will be expected to take action on the demand. Their problem will not be an easy one, for if they adopt a long-time program, they also must determine how it will be paid for. As much as they want good roads, the people may not be willing to bear the tremendous cost.

The advisory committee recommended raising the needed revenue by increasing the already expensive gasoline tax one cent per gallon, increasing the license fee on all cars to \$10 a year, and increasing the registration fees of small farm and commercial trucks.

The only way to obtain better highways is by adopting an intelligent long-time program and by being prepared to pay for it. Nebraskans can help their legislators determine whether or not such a program shall be adopted by expressing their views on the subject before the legislature convenes in 1949.

A Job Well Done

Although handicapped because available equipment was hardly adequate for a job as big as the one occasioned by the recent snowstorm, Wayne's street department deserves commendation for its speediness in clearing away the snow from the heavily traveled streets in the business district. It was accomplished only because the snow removal crews buckled down to many hours of hard labor. Testimony that they did a good job was given by many visitors who said local business streets were the cleanest of any in major towns in this area.

An extra pat on the back also is due Councilmen William Pfeil and Willard Wiltse. While most everyone else was relaxing after eating a big Thanksgiving dinner, Pfeil and Wiltse secured road maintaining equipment and, operating it themselves, piled up the snow remaining in the business district so that it could be hauled away the next day.

There were countless tons of snow to be removed; that task couldn't be completed overnight. That it was done as quickly as it was speaks well for the street department, and it was good advertising for the city of Wayne among the thousands of northeastern Nebraskans who regularly visit our city.

Postmaster Asks Rural Patrons to Keep Boxes Clear

Rural mail carriers, hampered by road conditions resulting from the two recent snowstorms, need the help of rural boxholders to facilitate mail deliveries, according to J. J. Steele, postmaster.

The Wayne postmaster said:

"WINTER IS now here and rural delivery patrons are reminded that, under the postal regulations, they are required to keep clear the approaches to their mail boxes by promptly removing obstructions, including snow, which render it difficult or impossible for the carrier to deliver mail to the boxes without alighting from his vehicle.

"Unless the approaches are cleared within a reasonable time after heavy snow falls, the delivery by carrier may be withheld temporarily until the approaches have been cleared.

"YOUR COOPERATION is requested in this matter with the view of assisting the carrier to give you the best possible service."
