Open Season With Victory

Wayne high opened its '48-49 basketball season Tuesday evening with a 44 to 18 victory over Hartington. The game, played at Hartington, gave Coach George Bailey an opportunity to try out nearly all members of his squad during the game.

Playing a smaller and more inexperienced team, Wayne's Blue Devils drove into an early lead, ending the first quarter 12-3 and the half at 19-9. Hartington was held to only one field goal during the first half.

Lanky center Don Tietgen led the Blue Devils scoring with 16 points, and was understudied for part of the game by Warren Price who tallied 4 points. Dick Baller at right forward counted 11 points while Alan Cramer at left forward and Jack Fisher at left guard, each netted 3 points. Other points scored were: Warren Ellis 2, Richard Berry 1, and Dick Dion 2.

In all, 10 boys were listed by the official scorer as seeing action for the Blue Devils. They were: At forward, Baller, Ellis, Cramer and Berry; at center, Tietgen and Price; guard, Dion, Smith, Fisher and Reno Pfeil.

Wayne made 23 fouls '40, Hartington's 16, yet scored only 11 points on four to 10 for Hartington. The locals showed evidence of speed and spirit Tuesday evening, and possibilities of developing a fast breaking offense this season that may become valuable.

Their second game will be played Friday evening at Norfolk. First home game for Wayne high will be played Dec. 17 against Stanton on the auditorium floor here.

They Still Need Watching

Although the communists may not yet be ready to take over the United States, the evidence indicates that they've been working at it and may have made more progress than most Americans believed possible. The latest disclosures by the House Un-American Activities committee, in its investigation of a Washington communist spy ring, point an accusing finger at at least one highly placed former state department official. Other former government officials also may have been involved in the theft of government secrets for probable transmission to Russia.

Without a doubt, this is one of the major scandals of the century. It means that our government was unforgivably lax in its selection of employees for trusted positions, and also apparently paid too little attention to their activities.

And, although the spy incidents now being investigated occurred 10 years ago, it doesn't follow that the communists are no longer at work in this country. They probably are, and they can't be watched too closely.

Surplus Encourages Spending

Nebraska's state government operates on the pay-as-you-go basis; thus, the state has managed to hold its taxes at relatively low levels, but has no surplus in the state treasury, nor even a broad enough tax structure to raise the funds needed to cover increasing governmental costs, let alone the proposed 926 million dollar road program. Some state (Iowa is a notable example) operate on the theory that now, while times are good, taxes should be high so that a comfortable balance can be built up in the state treasury—this surplus to be used when times are had and taxes won't raise sufficient funds to operate the state government.

At the present time, Iowa has a surplus of more than 100 million dollars in its various funds. That's a healthy sum of money, raised by various forms of taxation. In some ways the plan to tax heavily now to provide for possible future eventualities sounds like a good idea. But is it? Iowa has this huge balance in its treasury now, but may not have it long enough to be used in the future. The Sioux City Journal notes that this surplus is not a secret, and as a result practically every state department has requested an increased budget. If all these demands for more money are granted, Iowa's total state budget will be 56 million dollars higher than the appropriations granted by the 1947 sessions of the legislature.

So, while the idea of piling up a surplus for use on a "rainy day" may be a good one, it apparently is not so good from the standpoint of holding down governmental expenditures today. Rather, the knowledge that such a surplus exists tends to encourage increased expenditures without further delay.

If Iowa permits the numerous state department budgets to be increased, it can do so only by digging into its "mad money" or by the unenviable alternative of increasing taxes. In Nebraska there is no such problem—if more money is to be spent, as it appears that it must, it can be done only by boosting taxes.

Getting Caught Up?

Omaha Journal Stockman: From an observant small town business man in a prosperous western Iowa farming and feeding community comes this report on the real estate situation in his community. "Our real estate boom appears to have passed its peak. The movement of retiring farmers into town has practically stopped. Construction of several houses by one contractor and the deaths of three widows have placed several homes on the market for which there appear to be no buyers at present, at least at anything like the prices which have prevailed recently. It looks as though our housing situation had switched from scarcity to surplus almost overnight."

How representative that may be of the situation in other communities we don't know. But it certainly sounds typical of the manner in which the end of a boom sneaks up on us unsuspecting and hopeful mortals.

The more popular the new book on the library shelf the shorter is the time before it lands in the book hospital. Our library is equipped to give first aid to these books and does so to the tune of over 1000 books a year. The first thing to do is to diagnose its case. Then the book often must be taken through the special treatments of a regular bindery in order to correct its trouble. At the present time we have 150 of these books which have just been returned from the bindery at a cost of \$97. If you see bright shining books on the shelves they may not all be new titles but the books which have just come back from their recovery program.
