



They Still Need Watching

Although the communists may not yet be ready to take over the United States, the evidence indicates that they've been working at it and may have made more progress than most Americans believed possible.

The latest disclosures by the House Unterican Activities committee, in its investigation of a Washington communist spyring, point an accusing finger at at least one highly placed former state department official. Other former government officials also may have been involved in the theft of dovernment secrets for probable transmission to Russia.

Without a doubt, this is one of the working the state of the working the workin

Mithout a doubt, this is one of the ma-scandals of the century. It means that government was unforgivably lax in its ction of employees for trusted positions, d also apparently paid too little attention their activities.

And, although the spy incidents now cing investigated occurred 10 years ago, doesn't follow that the communists are a longer at work in this country. They robably are, and they can't be watched to closely.

Surplus Encourages Spending

Surplus Encourages Spending

Nebraska's state government operates on the pay-as-you-go basis; thus, the state has managed to hold its taxes at relatively low levels, but has no surplus in the state treasury, nor even a broad enough tax structure to raise the funds needed to cover increasing governmental costs, let alone the proposed 926 million dollar road program.

Some state (Iowa is a notable example) operate on the theory that now, while times are good, taxes should be high so that a comfortable balance can be built up in the state treasury—this surplus to be used when times are bad and taxes won't raise sufficient funds to operate the state government.

But is it? Iowa has this huge balance in its treasury now, but may not have it long enough to be used in the future. The Sioux Gity Journal notes that this surplus is not a secret, and as a result practically every state department has requested an inerested budget. If all these demands for more money are granted, Iowa's total state budget will be 56 million dollars higher than the appropriations granted by the 1947 sessions of the legislature.

So, while the idea of piling up a surplus

So, while the idea of piling up a surplus for use on a "rainy day" may be a good one, it apparently is not so good from the standpoint of holding down governmental expenditures today. Rather, the knowledge that such a surplus exists tends to encourage increased expenditures without further delay.

If Iowa permits the numerous state If low permits the numerous state department budgets to be increased, it can do so only by digging into its "mad money" or by the uneuviable alternative of increasing taxes. Gas Heating Installations

The present steel situation continues critical. The lack of steel pipe for increasing pipe line capacity still prohibits the installation of gas heating equipment (other than new home installations as now approved).

Large amounts of steel pipe are on order by the pipe line company and everything possible is being done to get gas to you as quickly as possible.

As increased pipe line capacity will permit, we wish to make more gas available to our customers so in order for us to be in a position to allow installations to be made we request those wishing to install gas heating to file an application for a permit. These applications will be classified according to the following classifications with a priority in the order as listed. Please bear in mind that it may take several years before we will be in a position to fill all requests.

DOMESTIC INSTALLATIONS

A-PHYSICAL HARDSHIP CASES

This classification covers those cases where actual hardship exists and where there is no able bodied person available at the location. Company shall have the right to judge these cases based on the showing of the application after investigation by company.

B-EQUIPMENT REPLACEMENT CASES

This classification covers cases where the existing heating equipment must be replaced due to its being beyond repair. The company shall have the right to determine this by its own inspection.

-CONVERSION CASES

This classification covers cases other than those enumerated above where the conversion is from some other fuel to gas. These will be approved under this classification in the order they are received.


COMMERCIAL INSTALLATIONS

This classification will be served as to the extent gas is available for such service where suitable provision is made for substitute fuel and curtailment of gas service as company may direct.

We again call to your attention that we will first attempt to fill Class A "Physical Hardship Cases," and then go to the other classes when pipe line capacity becomes available. The outlook for the moment seems to indicate it will be quite some time before we can get to Class B "Equipment Replacement Cases" and an even longer time before we can attempt to fill requests in Class C "Conversion Cases."
