

Sergean Floyd was one of the yang mer from Kentucky who you may be and clark on their listed making expedition up the Missouri River shortly after the Louisiana Purchase. He was made a sergeant the day after he enlisted, and apparently was one of the most trusted members of the command.

He took an active part in the work of the expedition until August 19, 1804. The explorers had camped for several days on a sandar in the Missouri, located in all probability not, far from the present own of Dakota City. Here they fished, and tried to round up the Omaha Indians for a council. They didn't have much luck with the Indians but the fishing was good, one day's catch amounting to more than 800.

Iowa Wants Better Roads, Too

Nebraska's proposed 20-year program of \$926,230,000 expenditures for better roads seems like a whopping sum of money—and it is. But before any of us takes the stand that it's too much to spend, let's concider the proposal of our neighboring state—lowa.

Anyone who has traveled much in Iowa cspecially in the northern part of the state—knows that Iowa already has more roads, and far better ones, than Nebraska. These highways have cost Iowans a tremendous amount of money over the past 20 years or so. Yet, even though the Hawkeys state's roads unquestionably are superior to Nebraska's, that state still considers its highway system inadequate.

Like Nebraska, Iowa, too, has been dying a new long-time road phogram, it a special road study committee has ommended that \$945,000,000 be spent highway improvements during the next yaers. That's about 20 million dollars re than Nebraska proposes to spend for same period of years.

we dont pretend to know how much ney Nebraska actually should invest in etter roads program, but when a state chaiready possesses a pretty fair high system considers spending a sum ghly the same as that proposed for Nebraska posal seems not quite so exorbitant.

proposal seems not quite so exorbitant.

As we have pointed out repeatedly, good roads in Nebraska will dig deeply into the pockets of all taxpayers. We can have roads if we want to pay for them. A few days ago we mentioned this fact to a minister friend from a nearby rural parish who was complaining about road conditions. He agreed that good roads will be costly but insists he's willing to pay his share of the expense, observing that the increased taxes won't cost him a great deal more money than he's already spending each year to repair the damage his car systains on rough roads.
