

In Old Nebraska

A white stone shaft, reaching 100 feet in the air from a bluff overlooking the Missouri River just south of Sioux City, marks the grave of Sergeant Charles Floyd, the first United States soldier to lose his life in the Nebraska country.

Sergeant Floyd was one of the young men from Kentucky who joined Lewis and Clark on their history making expedition up the Missouri River shortly after the Louisiana Purchase. He was made a sergeant the day after he enlisted, and apparently was one of the most trusted members of the command.

He took an active part in the work of the expedition until August 19, 1804. The explorers had camped for several days on a sandbar in the Missouri, located in all probability not far from the present town of Dakota City. Here they fished, and tried to round up the Omaha Indians for a council. They didn't have much luck with the Indians but the fishing was good, one day's catch amounting to more than 800.

Sergeant Floyd became seriously ill. Captain William Clark wrote in his journal: "Sergeant Floyd is taken very bad all at once with a Bilious Cholick we attempt to relieve him without success as yet, he gets worst and we are much alarmed at his situation, all give attention to him."

The next day the Captain reported sadly: "Sergeant Floyd died with a great deal of composure . . . We buried him on the top of the bluff 1/2 mile below a small river to which we gave his name, he was buried with Honors of War much lamented, a Seeder post . . . was fixed at the head of his grave."

We don't know just what it was that caused Floyd's death. There was no doctor in the party, and hence no professional record. Indeed, one of the most amazing aspects of the expedition is that in two years of wandering about the wilderness, Floyd's was the only death.

The memory of Sergeant Floyd is well perpetuated in the vicinity of his grave. The monument, mentioned above, dominates the landscape. The bluff on which the monument stands, a river, a town and a park all are named after this brave man who gave his life in the exploration of the West.

Because Sergeant Floyd was

buried on the Iowa side of the river, the people of Iowa have taken the lead in perpetuating his memory. If so doing, they have helped fulfill an obligation which rests not only on them, but on all of the residents of the Missouri Valley.

Gold Star Buttons For War Dead Kin

Lincoln—The Veterans Administration announced today that next of kin of members of the armed forces who died on active duty between the dates of Dec. 7, 1941, and July 25, 1947, may obtain forms of assistance in filing applications for Gold Star Lapel buttons

at the Lincoln regional office or the Omaha VA office.

Ashley Westmoreland, Lincoln regional office manager, said "next of kin" is defined as widow, widower, mother, father, stepmother, stepfather, mother or father through adoption.

To those, on application therefor, the buttons will be issued free of charge by the branch of service in which the deceased served.

Other relatives, he added, such as brothers, sisters, stepbrothers, sisters, and any children of the deceased may purchase buttons at a cost of \$1.50 each. Application forms for purchase of buttons are available at the Lincoln regional office and the Omaha VA office.

Rising Costs Force Request for Increase in Telephone Prices

Constantly increasing costs of providing telephone service have reduced earnings of this Company in Nebraska to a point where they are insufficient to meet the needs of furnishing good service. Therefore, we have applied to the State Railway Commission for repricing of local and long distance services within the state.

Costs Mounting

The principal factors which have made this action necessary are huge plant additions to meet service requirements, increased costs of materials and supplies, and higher wage levels. Our investment in Nebraska has been increased by nearly \$12,000,000 or 38 per cent since V-J Day. In addition, bargaining sessions lasting several months resulted in a third post-war wage increase in line with the general trend in industry which boosted our annual wage bill considerably.

Service Demands

Nebraskans are asking for more and better telephone service. The Company can only meet this demand by expanding its plant—adding more cables, wires, poles, switchboards, etc. This requires additional capital which must be obtained primarily from investors, and investors will not put their savings in the business unless assured of a reasonable return on their money.

Only Once in 23 Years

In the last 23 years, there has been only one general repricing of telephone service in Nebraska—a rate adjustment effective last December to increase total revenues of the Company within Nebraska by about 14 1/2 per cent. The proposed new rates would add about 9 per cent more, making a total increase since 1925 of less than 25 per cent. However, the increase will vary somewhat between different classes of service.

Fair Prices Needed

We believe that Nebraskans want and are entitled to the best possible telephone service at a fair price. We believe a fair price is one which permits us to meet all expenses, plus a reasonable payment to the people whose savings provide the telephone plant needed to meet the public's service requirements.
