Jury's Verdict Awards \$791 In 'Horse' Case

Insurance Suit Settled for \$8,000 Without Verdict

Jury took in the fall term of district court ended here last week with the award of \$791 damages in one suit, the settlement of another case just before the trial closed, and the award of \$1,477 damages in a third suit.

Of considerable interest to farmers in this area was the "horse" case in which George McGuire of Wisner brought suit against Cal Thompson, owner of the White Horse Ranch at Napes, for damages and punitive allegedly incurred in negotiations he and the defendant entered into in May 1947.

McGUIRE CLAIMED that he agreed to trade an albino stallion to Thompson for a white mare in full but that the mare he acquired was not and had died, at which time he returned the mare to Thompson the latter did not return the stallion.

The case went to the jury last week Wednesday morning and a verdict awarding \$791 damages to McGuire, was brought in about 3:30 that afternoon.

THE CASE of Mrs. Agnes Leonard, Wakefield, vs. United Benefit Life Insurance Co., Omaha, in which the plaintiff sought to collect a \$100,000 insurance policy, was settled just before it was scheduled to go to the jury.

The trial opened Wednesday afternoon and settlement was reached about 12:30 p.m. Thursday.

Mrs. Leonard alleged that her husband, who died in March 1948, had taken out a \$100,000 policy with the company late in 1946, but that the money had not been paid to her following Leonard's death.

THE THIRD SUIT, reported in The Herald last week, grew out of an automobile accident west of Carroll in which Oliver B. Proett, driven by David E. Jones and Reinhold Hark, both of Carroll, the jury returned a verdict awarding \$1,477.55 damages to Jones, plaintiff in the case, who sought \$2,777.

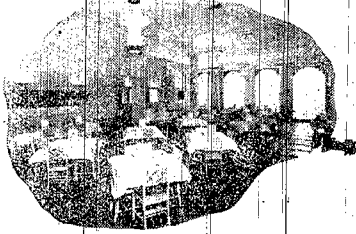

**In Old Nebraska**

On Christmas night, 1866, old Fort Laramie, guardian and outpost of the overland trail, provided the setting for one of the most intense and heroic dramas ever enacted on the western frontier. The mercury had plunged to 25 degrees below zero, but inside "Old Bedlam," the officers' club, all was warm and gay with the festivity of a Christmas celebration.

Suddenly out of the frozen darkness a gaunt, swaying figure, swathed in a buffalo coat and covered with snow, staggered into the midst of the celebration. He gasped that he had important messages for the commanding officer, and collapsed on the floor. This man, John C. (Portugee) Phillips, had ridden all the way from Fort Phil Kearny, 235 miles away, with word from Colonel Henry B. Carrington that the Indians were besieging the fort, and that if help failed to come soon the entire garrison, including women and children, was doomed to death. The attack on Fort Phil Kearny was one of the Indian efforts under the leadership of Chief Red Cloud, to drive the white man off the Bozeman Road, freight and emigrant route from the Platte valley to the gold fields of Montana. Fort Phil Kearny had been built only the summer before to furnish protection for travelers on the road.

With the situation desperate without help from the outside, Portugee Phillips, a scout and hunter, had volunteered to risk his life in a ride through the cold and the Indians to take the news to Fort Laramie. His only stipulation was that he go on Colonel Carrington's prize Kentucky thoroughbred, the fastest horse at the post. Reinforcements immediately

were sent out from Laramie, and when they arrived at Fort Phil Kearny, the found the garrison alive and well. The sub-zero weather which had endangered Portugee Phillips' life had prevented the Indians from making an attack. Phillips recovered from his ride and continued his life as scout, hunter and general handyman around our western military posts. Very tardily, his heroism was recognized by the government. Colonel Carrington never got his prize thoroughbred back, though. No sooner had his rider reeled from him and staggered into "Old Bedlam" than that gallant animal dropped dead of exhaustion on the parade ground.

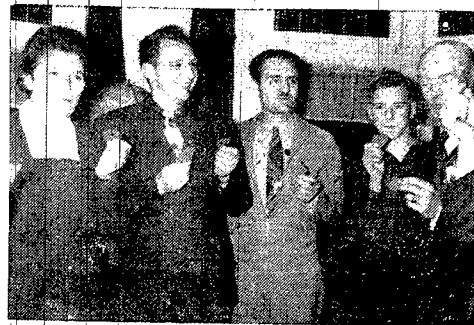

# Farmers Return from Europe

Omaha - Mal Hansen and members of the WOW farmers' trip to Europe, including Norris Schroeder of Hoskins and Albert Watson of Wayne, are back home. Already they are making plans for passing on to their fellow midwest farmers the information picked up abroad.  
Most of the farmers arrived Sunday at 3 p.m. at the Omaha airport after traveling in 11 European countries for a month. The group, under leadership of Mal Hansen, was greeted at the airport by their families. Douglas county 4-H club band, members of the Omaha Chamber of Commerce, representatives from Omaha packing industries and Omaha stockyards, a committee from the Knights of AK-Sa-Ben, members of the WOW board of directors and staff, and several thousand spectators and farmers.

**THE TRIP HAS** had a great many thrills in the past 30 days. Probably the greatest was that of landing in Omaha, seeing their families. They experienced the typical midwest rousing welcome. The Douglas county 4-H club band in its green and white uniforms, under the direction of James L. Hansen, played its young heart out regardless of the chilly wind which swept across the airport. The farmers had seen the youngsters of England, Germany, Italy, and all the rest; yet these 4-Hers looked mighty good to everyone, particularly Mal Hansen, who was a 4-H boy himself.

WOW went off the air as soon as the plane landed into the administration building. Special Executive Director Ray Clark described the arrival and then turned the microphone over to Mal Hansen who talked to members of the tour and their families in a half-hour broadcast Sunday afternoon. The station held a reception and buffet supper in the Fontenelle hotel in honor of the returning group.

**WITH THE 30 DAYS** in Europe behind them, what will probably be the largest public service portion of the job remains. This is the conveyance of the world of information these men have acquired to their fellow midwesterners. All participants in the tour plan to make extensive speaking engagements in their own localities.  
According to members of the tour the trip itself was the experience of a lifetime. They were

on a 50-degree slope of the mountainside, were immaculate and well organized, producing to capacity. Here in the land of the tall scenery, the farmers visited dairy and cheese factories, and agricultural colleges at Zurich and Bern. It was during their visit to three Swiss farms that they resolved to tidy up their own places immediately upon their return to America. Swiss farmers are not pigs.

**FROM SWITZERLAND**, the farmers moved through the beautiful Alps on to northern Italy. They visited Florence university and were told that Italian farm production was up to 80 per cent over its acre of land and still improving. The group visited centers of Florentine art and culture and traveled to Rome. It was here that one of the important results of the trip turned up. It was in the form of a vote by the farmers in which they revealed that they would keep the Marshall Plan as it is in all countries visited except Belgium, Luxembourg and Switzerland. For these three countries they felt the help should be eliminated or at least cut.

Perhaps one of the greatest of the many highlights of the entire trip was the personal audience with Pope Pius XII in Rome. The ritual leader of the Catholic church met them in a private room joining his quarters. Mal Hansen explained the purpose of the trip. The Pope sent special blessings by one member of the party to Boys Town, also to Archbishop Bergan and all the people in the midwest. This was the experience of a lifetime.

**THE SUNDAY** was spent relaxing on the Riviera and then the party moved on to Paris, there to live and observe French farms. The party left Paris Thursday, Dec. 16, arriving in New York City on the 17th.

Twenty of the farmers immediately flew to Washington, D. C. feeling that since they had visited the capitals of Europe they must, by all means, visit their own capital before returning home.

**HOLLAND, TOO**, had its highlights. Here the citizens were gay and full of warm hospitality for the Americans. Most of the Dutch farm hosts could speak enough English to get by with their American guests, a situation which would not be true were their positions reversed.

The next country in which the group studied was Belgium. Here in Brussels they found no shortage. The praises were high. Belgium farming, they discovered, was highly specialized with the farms producing to capacity. Belgium and its tiny neighbor, Luxembourg, are the most prosperous countries, excluding Switzerland, in Europe.

Luxemburg, with its area of only 999 square miles and 300,000 persons, the farmers found to be the "never-never" land. Here they found castles, swords, gold braids, industries, cattle raising, the lowest taxes in Europe, no black markets and food the finest in Europe.

**THE TRIP** into American occupied Europe the farmers found a most amazing experience. Here they saw the real war damage. Hundreds of Germans with pinched faces, tired, whipped looking. All up and down the train the American farmers visited with German and refugees. All told stories of extreme hardship but they were factual narratives, not shoulder cravering. They found the German farmers are willing, industrious, and trying hard to rebuild their country's production. They visited German farms where they found conditions worse than they had expected. One had an ancient German-made tractor, but mostly the farming power in Germany is human. In a lot of cases the women as the group moved on to Switzerland they again noticed a marked contrast. Switzerland, of course, was untouched by the war. The farms, although some of them are

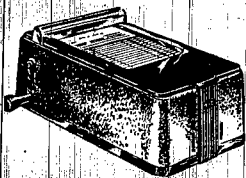

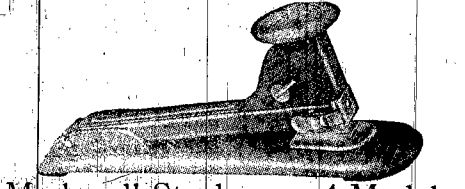

### Warning: 'Don't Get Caught in Christmas Crush'

"Don't get caught in the Christmas crush."

This warning was issued today by E. P. Tinker, Jr., executive director of the Nebraska State Safety Council, in connection with a concerted drive by state and local agencies to reduce the death toll during the holiday season.

Tinker related that last year 12 persons met death on Nebraska's highways between Dec. 20 and Jan. 2. This equaled the toll of the year before when 12 persons were killed during the same period.

"If we may expect the same rate of reduction as we have enjoyed all year," Tinker pointed out, "we should cut our deaths by three. It would be much better if we could go through the entire holiday without a single fatality. This would indeed be the holiday's greatest gift."

"If we could get the holiday travelers in this state to express the old saying of 'courtesy, caution and common sense,' every family in Nebraska could celebrate a merry and safe Christmas. Give life this Christmas, don't take it," he concluded.

### 45 Per Cent of Veterans in School Or Take Training

Lincoln—More than 45 per cent of Nebraska's 114,000 World War II veterans have taken some type of schooling or training under the veterans' administration.

William C. Westmoreland, Lincoln regional office manager, said a total of \$2,294 veterans in the state have enrolled since the programs started and that of these 2,812 were disabled veterans.

"The VA official said that at present 12,264 veterans are attending education institutions, another 4,393 are taking job training and 1,644 are engaged in institutional on-the-farm training. The present total of 18,301 veterans in all types of training represents an 8 per cent decline from the 19,902 total registered one year ago.

### Produces 640 Lbs. Butterfat in Year

Brathelboro, Vt.—Sunny Roxana, registered Holstein-Friesian cow owned by Ivan Borman, Wakefield, has completed a 363-day production test of 640 pounds of butterfat and 15,771 pounds of milk in herd improvement registry.

The testing was supervised by the University of Nebraska, in cooperation with the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

"Sunny" was milked twice daily and was 4 years 8 months of age when she began her test period.

### Produce High Corn Yields in Dixon

DeKalb, Ill.—Producing yields several times the national average has won recognition for several farmers in Dixon county.

Rewinkel brothers of Wakefield won the county title in the 11th annual DeKalb corn growing contest with a yield of 146 bushels per acre on a selected five-acre plot.

Other high yields in Dixon county were: Robert B. Hanson, Concord, 141.43 bushels; Wendell Allen, Martinsburg, 133.12 bushels; and Elmer Rodgers, Allen, 122.46 bushels.
