Full Program Arranged for Farmers Day

Urge Farmers To Bring Best Corn Samples

Complete program for the annual Wayne county All Farmers day on Thursday, Jan. 13, which this year will include a corn show and presentation of awards to district corn yield contest winners, was announced this week.

Sponsored jointly by the extension service and Wayne Chamber of Commerce, All Farmers day will begin at 10:30 a.m. in the city auditorium and close at 4 p.m. There will be separate programs for men and women.

WITH A PRIZE list now being compiled, the sponsoring agencies today urged all farmers in this area to select a good corn variety for entry in the corn show. The corn must be brought in before 10 a.m. on Jan. 13.

The corn show is separate from the presentation of district corn yield awards and will have its own schedule of prizes.

PROGRAM for the day follows: 10:30 a.m.—Annual meeting of the county extension board.

12:00 noon—Free lunch.

1:00 p.m.—Electric demonstration by R.F.A. conducted by Charles Fox of North Platte.

1:30—Report on European tour by Albert Watson.

2:00—Business forum, with Don Meljke, Herb Kollmorgen, Gordon Alvin, Ed McCherney and Eric Albers invited to participate.

2:45—Demonstration on seed treatment by members of Wayne campus school vocational agricultural department.

3:00—Presentation of awards in district 10-acre corn yield contest.

THE WOMEN'S program is scheduled from 2:00 to 4:00.

Polio Auction Next Thursday

Wayne's first fund raising event for the March of Dimes campaign will be a benefit auction next Thursday evening, Jan. 6, at the city auditorium. The auction will begin at 8:00, with T. J. Hughes and Jim Troutman serving as auctioneers.

Mrs. Chris Tietgen, county polo chairman, said that anyone having articles to be auctioned should leave them at R. G. Fuelberth's new building or the Tietgen hatchery on West Third street. Names of the donors should be attached so that due credit can be given.

MRS. TIETGEN said persons who do not have time to come in before the evening of the auction should bring their articles with them. "But," she said, "we do need articles and we do need bidders."

The Wayne city band, directed by Pat Atkins, will entertain as an extra feature of the auction. If weather permits, the band will march down Main street and lead the way to the auditorium.

OTHER entertainment will include demonstrations by local band twirlers, directed by Hazel Reeve, and selections by the high school sextet, directed by Arlene Kostal.

Mrs. Tietgen reports that the "corn to fight polio" ring at Third and Pearl still has no corn in it. She said, "Now that Christmas is over, please remember to sack up some corn or load some on your pickup and bring it in before it has time to rot on your mind again. Corn donors are to register at the Tietgen hatchery."

ELSEWHERE in the county: Mrs. Erwin Ulrich, campaign director at Hoskins, reports that plans are under way for a benefit auction in January, date to be announced soon.

Mrs. W. R. Scribner of Carroll also is planning an auction to be announced later. She is putting up a corn ring, too.

Winside will have a fund raising event, but has not yet decided upon the type of event to be sponsored.

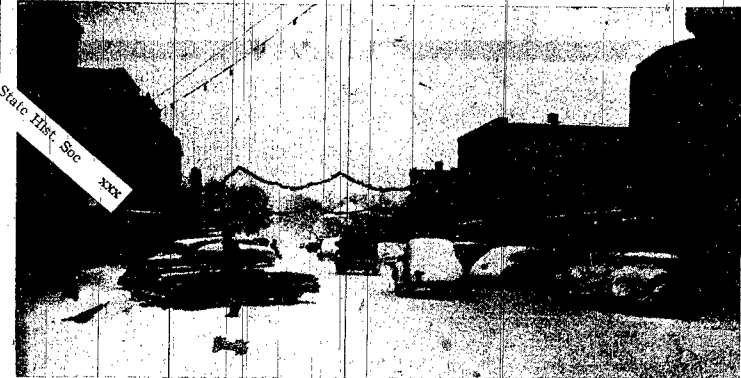
Langemeier said his health has made it necessary for him to relinquish part of his business to Mordhorst. He will retain his distributorship of Skelly products, transport service and tank truck service.

Choose Church School Courses

Courses of study have been selected for the union church school teacher training classes scheduled in Wayne the first week in January.

The training school will be sponsored by the Wayne Ministerial association for all church school leaders, department superintendents, teachers and adults interested in church school work.

CLASSES WILL BE held nightly at the Presbyterian church, beginning Monday, Jan. 3, and continuing through Friday, Jan. 7. There will be two 40-minute class periods each evening.

Intelligent selfishness is important to the welfare of any community, said William Johnson of Omaha, a former Wayne man, in an address Monday evening to Wayne Chamber of Commerce members at their annual business meeting and banquet at the Hotel Morrison.

Johnson, who spent his boyhood in Wayne and left the city in 1928, was lieutenant governor of Nebraska from 1938 to 1942.

THE CLOSURE as his topic, "The Importance of Being Selfish," pointing out that persons who devote time and effort to community activities, to charitable work and similar activities, actually are being selfish because they know that eventually they will receive tangible benefits. The Omaha upholder of this type of selfishness as being vitally important to the building of better communities.

New Postal Rates Effective Soon on Foreign Parcels

New postal rates, effective Jan. 1, have been announced by the post office department.

Packages sent to Great Britain and Italy, which formerly cost 14 cents a pound, can now be mailed for 6 cents.

Increases are listed for parcels going to the American, British and French zones in Germany. Parcels, which may not weigh more than 22 pounds, will cost 14 cents a pound in place of the 10 cents a pound rate.

An increase from 14 cents to 17 cents was made on packages going to the Russian zone of Germany, which includes all of Berlin.

900 Wayne County Christmas Seal Letters Still Out

There is still time to take care of unanswered Christmas seal letters, Mrs. Merton Hilton, chairman of the county drive, said this week.

The latest check of returns shows that \$1216.65 has been turned in so far in the county. This is about \$10 ahead of a similar period last year.

Mrs. Hilton reported that about 2600 letters sent out, all but 900 have been returned.

Throughout the state, the total is \$142,242, against a statewide quota of \$175,000 for Nebraska, according to Dr. J. Harry Murphy, president of the Nebraska Tuberculosis association.

Those who have bought and used Christmas seals know that they are directly supporting the 1949 tuberculosis prevention and control program of the association, which is now under way. Those who still respond to those unanswered Christmas seal letters will be able to test that they are participating in the protection of their own health as well as the health of others," concluded Dr. Murphy.

It comes in a highly concentrated dose. But what our communicant means, no doubt, is that during the balance of the year we ought to keep in closer touch with friends and be a bit more conscious of the good old Christmas idea that it's more blessed to give than to receive. The holidays, then should simply be the training season. The rest of the year should be devoted to the practice of that rule. And that's a pretty fine idea, don't you agree?

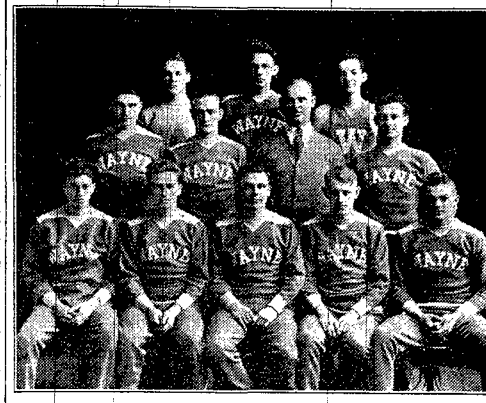

Urges Veterans To Review GI Insurance Policies

Lincoln—To make certain their GI life insurance will provide the exact protection desired, Nebraska veterans were urged by the veterans administration to review their government insurance for possible changes of beneficiaries and methods of settlement.

"Based on the settlement of GI insurance death cases handled to date, there is increasing evidence that many deceased veterans have not provided the family protection they probably desired," said Ashley Westmoreland, Lincoln regional office manager.

Pointing out that many of the approximately 45,000 Nebraska World War II veterans holding GI insurance may not have changed beneficiaries even though their family status has changed, the VA official said changes of beneficiary can be made at any time, and as often as necessary by simply notifying the VA. He added that the veteran has the right to designate any person, company, corporation or other legal entity as his beneficiary.

Westmoreland also advised those carrying GI policies to study the various optional methods of settlement available for payment of insurance proceeds to beneficiaries. In some cases he said, proper selection of optional settlement may increase benefits as much as 30 per cent.

Vets Should Get New Certificates Of Eligibility

Lincoln—World War II veterans holding unused certificates of eligibility for GI Bill education or training issued before Sept. 1 and who plan to enter training for the first time after Jan. 1, 1949, should immediately exchange them for a new type certificate, the veterans administration announced today.

Ashley Westmoreland, Lincoln regional office manager, urged the exchange because of new registration techniques that will be used after Jan. 1 to safeguard the interests of the veterans and the government.

After that date, he explained, the extent of entitlement for training of an veteran enrolling with an old certificate must, under the new regulations, be verified by VA before tuition and subsistence payments may be made. In verifying entitlement, VA must assign each enrollee a claim number and set up the initial index record for the veteran.

By exchanging the old certificate before entering training, the veteran will enable VA to dispose of these actions well in advance and make possible more prompt and accurate service after training starts, Westmoreland said.

The new certificates will show the amount of training time to which each veteran is entitled, claim numbers assuring speedy identification will be noted and the new certificates will be accepted by schools and VA without question.

The certificates may be exchanged in person or by mail at any VA office.

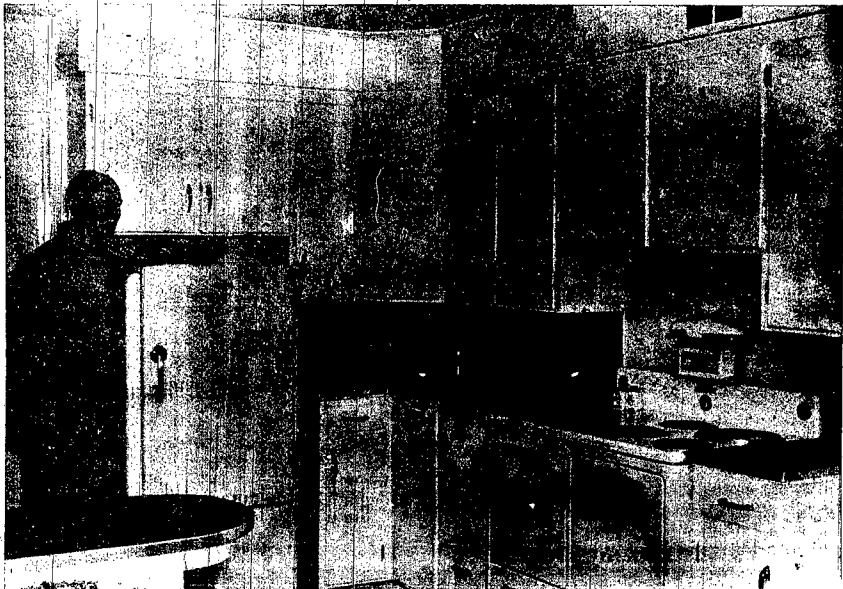
