





One explanation is that there was a strike of more than two months in the packing industry. When the strike was over the packers bought high-priced livestock which later slumped. They were caught with meat on hand which was not marketable at the price of purchase.

Packers usually count on one cent net profit out of each, sales dollar. But they didn't set be in 1948. All of which shows that you can give out business profits entirely and still have high prices.


