

Snow Removal Costs County \$100,000

AAA Funds Double Last Year

Farm Program Signup Begins Next Monday Applications for 1948 Payments To Be Completed

Thomas P. Roberts, county AAA chairman, this week announced a schedule of sign-up meetings for the 1949 farm program in Wayne county and at the same time revealed that the county has been allocated \$83,111 AAA funds for the program.

This figure is nearly double the \$42,296 the county received for last year's farm program.

At the forthcoming sign-up meetings, which begin next Monday, AAA representatives also expect to complete applications for 1948 payments. Roberts said the applications will be ready for the signatories of farmers who cooperated in the program.

The schedule follows:

March 7 - 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. at the Wayne AAA office, for Brenna, Plum Creek, Hunter, Strahan and Wilbur precincts.

March 8 - 9 a. m. to 3 p. m. at the Hoskins village hall, for Caldwell, Hancock and Hoskins precincts.

March 9 - 9 a. m. to 3 p. m. at the Farmers State bank in Carroll for Chapin, Deer Creek, Garfield and Sherman precincts.

March 10 - 9 a. m. to 3 p. m. at Fleer's cafe in Winside for Brenga, Chapin, Garfield, Hancock and Hoskins precincts.

March 11 - 9 a. m. to 3 p. m. at the Sholes barber shop for Garfield, Deer Creek and Sherman precincts, and 9 a. m. to 3 p. m. at the Wakefield recreation for Logan, Leslie and Plum Creek townships.

Assessors Set Up Schedule of County Visits

All Taxpayers Responsible for Filing Returns

"Remember that the law requires you to turn in your own schedule and, if you do not, the county assessor may make one out for you from any information he can obtain and add a 50 per cent penalty," County Assessor Alex Jeffrey warned taxpayers this week as he completed final preparations for the 1949 assessment of personal property.

Furthermore, failure to receive a schedule does not excuse a taxpayer from filing a personal return, Jeffrey said.

ASSESSMENT returns should be filed with the assessor from March 10 to April 20, and to assist the taxpayers in making out the schedules, the assessor and his assistants will set up temporary offices in four towns in the county. After April 20 the 50 per cent penalty applies.

Assisting Jeffrey will be Henry Arp, Otto Lutz and Art Mann of Wayne, David Leonard of Winside and Henry Lage of Carroll.

THEY WILL be at the county assessor's office at the court house in Wayne from March 10 through March 16, in Winside from March 17 through March 19, in Carroll from March 21 through March 25, and in Hoskins from March 24 through March 26.

Taxpayers unable to meet with the assessors on these dates will be required to complete their assessment schedules at the county assessor's office in Wayne.

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Northeast Nebraska Called Safest Spot for Motorists

Highway fatalities in northeast Nebraska were reduced from 47 in 1947 to 22 for the year 1948, according to W. H. Teachman, state highway patrol corporal in charge of 19 counties of this area. He spoke on highway safety before the Wayne Kiwanis club Monday noon.

"Northeast Nebraska is the safest place in the state to drive," Teachman said. In this district the patrol has 10 men under the supervision of his office in Norfolk, who traveled 500,000 miles during 1948.

IN REFERRING to the independent system of the highway patrol, the corporal pointed out that the organization had been kept completely out of politics for the 10 years since it started, and added "when it gets into politics I want no part of it."

"Safety is everybody's work! You can obey the law and set an example in safe driving. You also should take an interest in your county, to see that your habitual violator is properly prosecuted."

TO ILLUSTRATE a point on needless speeding, Corporal Teachman told the story of a salesman who whizzed into a farm yard, set his brakes, stopped, got out of his car, looked at his watch, and exclaimed, "Ah, 20 miles in 20 minutes."

The farmer looked at him and said nothing. Just then a bull ran a hay stack in a farm lot was attacked by a bee—and the bull "circled the stack so fast he threw dirt in his own face." The farmer looked at the bull, then the salesman—and said, "Well, that bull's not nearly so fast as you."

The program was completed by showing a moving picture of safety patrol work in the Los Angeles area. It pointed out the growing problem of congestion and the continued increase in number of automobiles.

THROUGH HIS work with the natives in these villages, Rev. House has learned their abilities as well as their needs and has acquired a great confidence in their future, along with deep sympathy with their superstitions and fears.

He is a graduate of Hastings college and the Presbyterian seminary in Omaha. He has been pastor of Presbyterian churches in Gillette, Barroff and Helton, and at the time of his appointment to the foreign field was pastor of the Clifton Hill Presbyterian church in Omaha.

Women of the Methodist, Presbyterian, St. Paul's Lutheran, Redeemer Lutheran and Baptist churches will participate in the services, which are observed by church women throughout the world.

Plane Used to Seal Wayne Corn

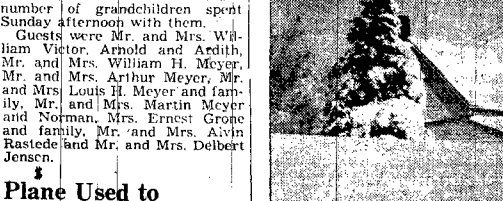
Opening of Wayne county's roads has demanded an increase in the demand for government corn loans, according to the AAA office.

Judge Finds For Defendants

At the opening session of the February term of district court last Thursday, Judge D. R. Mounts of O'Neill found generally for the defendants in the case of Wightman vs. Walter S. Bressler and the City of Wayne. He further ordered that the petition of the plaintiff be dismissed at his cost.

Wightman had filed suit seeking the marshaling of liens so that the lien of the city against his property for back taxes would be subsequent to his (Wightman's) alleged lien for improvements and subsequent taxes paid. He also sought to require Walter S. Bressler, city clerk and trustee, to account for the \$1500 he claimed to have paid for the property.

The judge, in his ruling, declared that Wightman did not and cannot bring his case within the provision of legislative bill 276 under which the action was filed.

Wightman may appeal to the Nebraska supreme court.

In the case of Bartels vs. Magdanz, District Judge Fay Pollock enjoined Magdanz from removing any straw from the property he rented from Bartels.

A creditor's bill was filed in court by Herman Essmann against John Albertson, and an action to quiet title on lot 26. Taylor and Wachob's addition, was filed by Gladys Gilbert against John Emil Heff.

Only Few Miles Of Roads Are Still Unopened

Operation Snowbound ceased work in Wayne county at midnight last Friday after opening all but a few miles of relatively unimportant county roads.

During the peak of operations, 28 pieces of heavy equipment—excavating-type bulldozers and rotary snowblowers—worked night and day at the hard packed drifts, liberating hundreds of farm families who had been "snowed out" for weeks and even months. Some reported they had been snowbound since the severe storm of last November.

A county official said Thursday that probably only about 35 miles of roads remain blocked. These are roads along which no farms are located.

THE COST OF opening roads, exclusive of Operation Snowbound, has been staggering in Wayne county for the winter of 1948-49. Up through Jan. 31 the county had spent approximately \$100,000 on its own snow removal operations, the highest figure reported by any county in the state up to last weekend.

This sum included wages of county employees and officials, and fuel, oil, repairs and depreciation on the equipment. The county reported no expenditures for snow removal after Jan. 31 because its fund for this type of work was depleted.

ADDING FURTHER to the cost, winter maintenance for Operation Snowbound, estimated at approximately \$10,000 in Wayne county. This sum will pay for the use of machinery contracted for by the army, and the wages of men who operated the equipment.

Estimates of snow removal expenditures for other northeastern Nebraska counties, none of which reported depreciation on equipment as reported by Wayne county, follow: Cedar, \$42,000; Dixon, \$11,000; Pierce, \$19,000; Stanton, \$10,000; and Thurston, \$23,000.

MEANWHILE, Gov. Val Peterson this week approved a Nebraska disaster plan designed to meet future emergencies.

It provides for a permanent organization, the Nebraska Disaster Relief Commission, to coordinate any disaster, and to immediately be concerned with floods which threaten many sections of Nebraska.

Throughout the state, the governor has appointed county sheriffs as local disaster organizations in the counties, and has named Sheriff Hans Tietgen to that post in Wayne.

THE ADJUTANT general was appointed state coordinator, and Sheriff Tietgen will act as his advisor and contact man in this county. All local relief committees will coordinate with the sheriff's office, and requests for state federal assistance will be made through him. He will keep state headquarters informed on local conditions.

This plan is aimed at avoiding duplication of effort, coordination of various agencies in assisting the Red Cross, and providing a chain of communication which will facilitate the use of the military, as well as state and federal agencies, when local disaster committees find they are no longer able to cope with the situation.

SHOULD it become necessary for the military to take action, the plan provides for state aid, and will move into the field with available National Guard personnel and equipment.

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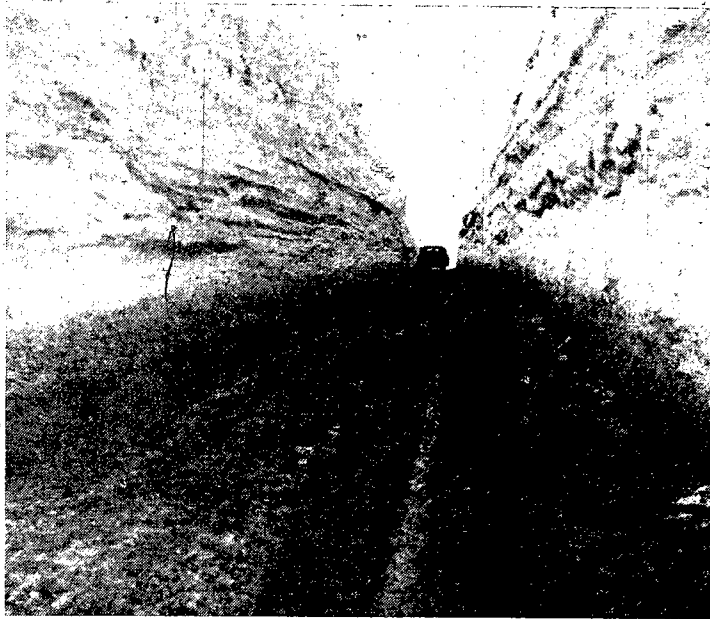
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This is THE Snowdrift in Wayne County

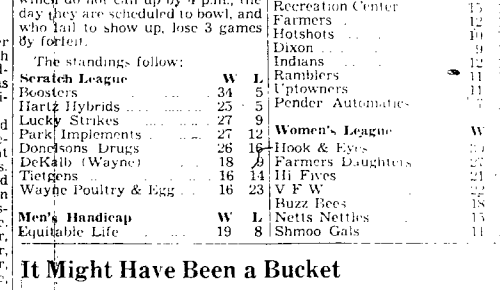
