





In a recent article in Collier's, Gen.
Omar Bradley said, "Citizenship by the
dollar signi cannot and will not work."
The general's immediate reference was
to education. Through a few questions he
once asked a group of successful business
and professional men, the general learned
that each was too busy "in his own daily
affuirs to determine for himself the charactee and quality of education furnished his
sons and daughters." The general coutends
they are "victims of the checkbook habit
quite content to let it go simply by paying the bills."

At one moment we curse high taxes, government waste and inefficiency, and government interference with our way of life. And in the next breath too many of us seek government aid for some more or less selfish project or program; government benefits for one group or another; government operation of something that might be operated much more efficiently and economically by a private concern. When the government grants our demands it adds even more to its already top heavy bureaucracy, it puts more people on its mammoth payroll, and chances are it becomes more wasteful and inefficient than it was before.

And to top it all off, the government

comes more wasteful and inefficient than all was before.

And to top it all off, the government doesn't give us these things. We're got to pay for them in the form of ever increasing taxes. We Americans pay our taxes, as good citizens should, but we know too little about what we are buying with this money—and too many of us make he effort to find out. It's that checkbook habit again—we pay the bills and let it go at that. This, The Herald thinks, is another form of "ditizenship by the dollar sign."

Moreover, by constantly asking our government for more, more and more, and by giving our government a virtual blank check to qover the cost, we are allowing our government to drift toward a form of socialism. Someday we may be horrified to find how far this trend has progressed, but it is happening only because we permit it to happen and, in fact, aid and abet the trend by our sometimes selfish demands for government benefits.

"Citizenship by the dollar sign" won't preserve the type of democracy that has made our nation the world's greatest. Dollars made our country a better place in which to live if we expect the government to supply the dollars we need for the things we want.
