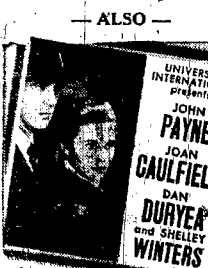

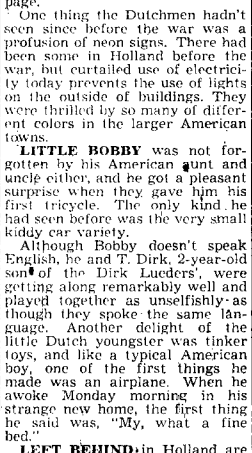

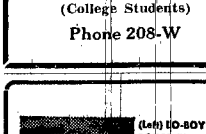

**No 4 in a Series—
KNOW YOUR FACULTY**

This column features a short story each week on one of the faculty members of Wayne State Teachers college. In the hope that townspeople and college instructors may become better acquainted.



THE FIRST TWO years of college attendance for Miss Wendt were taken at Wayne State Teachers college after which she transferred to Iowa State college, Ames.

Life on a Wayne county farm and a rural school are Miss Wendt's earliest recollections. High school work was completed at Wayne city school.

"It's not the technique, it's the ingredients," stated Miss Wendt in explaining how successful cooking and baking are carried on which is a reversal of her instruction in classes where Miss Wendt stresses the importance of accuracy in laboratory technique.

From alcho nitroso beta naphthene to the actual baking of a cake may seem a large stride, but Miss Wendt firmly believes that a good knowledge of chemistry is closely related to successful cooking.

OUTSIDE INTERESTS are various and many for Miss Wendt, who can handle a shotgun during pheasant season, or a rod and reel whenever the occasion permits. Lack of time is a major factor in restricting Miss Wendt to a non-participant rank certain times.

Miss Wendt strongly favors the passing of the bill giving the teachers colleges the right to grant liberal arts degrees. She also is looking forward to the time when, through the building program, space will be available to divide and expand the chemistry laboratories to meet the increasing need for them.

Students at Wayne State Teachers college find in Miss Wendt a superior instructor with a bright outlook for the future.
