Fielding Blasts 'Bungling' of Foreign Policy

"Americans have bungled the nation's foreign policy so badly that Russia today is actually winning the cold war," Capt. Michael Fielding, military and political analyst, told two audiences at Wayne on Monday and Tuesday, April 11 and 12.

Fielding blasted the lethargy and lack of understanding characterizing Americans in high and low positions as he traced the clash between the selling campaigns of the United States and the USSR in their efforts to win the world to two bitterly opposed ideologies.

HE SPOKE ON "A Rift in the Iron Curtain" at the annual meeting of the Northeast Nebraska Schoolmen's association on the Wayne State campus.

Continuing, he said: "The Marshall plan is designed to open communist ideology by building the economic systems of western Europe to self-sufficiency, whereas the Truman doctrine applies political and economic force to counter Russian moves."

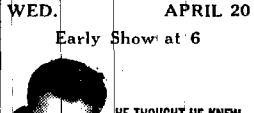

Mr. Hassel is a native Nebraskan, starting in rural school near Holdrege, then continuing his education in no less than five other schools. Four years of high school meant four separate and distinct schools for him.

In recalling the time spent in the various schools, Mr. Hassel stated that though there are both advantages and disadvantages in going from school to school, the student who makes more changes learns to

hetter adapt himself to both conditions and people.

"ALSO the individual who enters more than one school system must adjust himself to the school system instead of the individual," he continued in his explanation of the transitory pupil.

Mr. Hassel received his B. S. degree from Kearney State Teachers college and his M. A. degree from the University of Nebraska.

A 4-year war interruption forced him to discontinue his teaching and studies.

While serving in the armed forces, Mr. Hassel did personnel work in the seventh service command. A part of his duties during this period consisted of interviewing German, Japanese and Italian prisoners-of-war and thus determining what skills they had to qualify them for work in the various camps and areas where prisoner labor was used.

UPON BEING discharged from the army on Jan. 5, 1946, Mr. Hassel allowed no time to lapse before starting to teach again Jan. 6, 1946, at the University of Nebraska.

While doing graduate work on his degree at Omaha, taught three courses in the mathematics department, besides assisting in R.O.T.C. instruction.

Mr. Hassel married Lou Forre of Newman Grove in 1944. Mrs. Forre was born in Omaha at the time.

SINCE COMING here in 1947 the Hassels have found Wayne a pleasant community and one with many fine people. He attributes this to the many churches found in Wayne and describes it as a charming and friendly community.

A fine instructor and a good neighbor are two attributes that go to make Mr. Hassel an outstanding example of a scholarly educator.

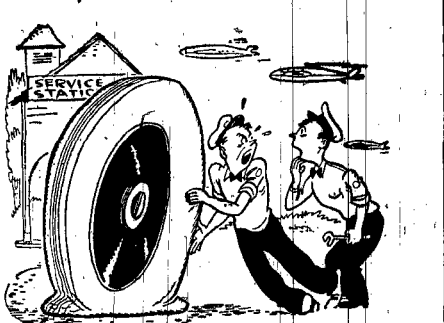

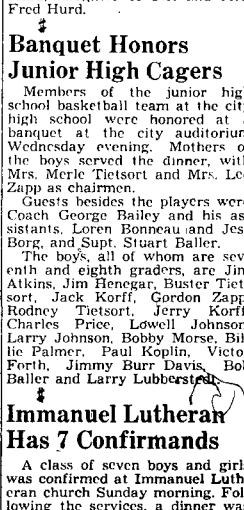

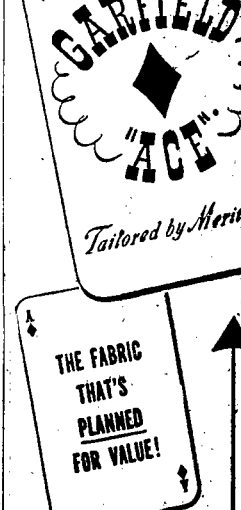

Says Hoppers Serious Threat

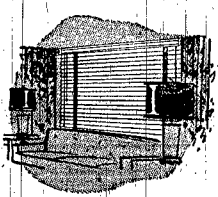
The Wayne county extension office this week reported that grasshoppers may become a serious threat in this area this year.

Conditions have been extremely

favorable for early hatches, and millions of neophyte grasshoppers now are in evidence in fence rows, windbreaks, broom pastures and alfalfa fields.

The county agent urged farmers to institute control measures immediately. If it is done now, the young hoppers can be controlled by treating relatively small areas to chemical sprays.

Warner said "If your neighbor has a sprayer, contact him to spray your hoppers. Arrangements are being made to have a supply of chemical on hand. The federal bait program used in the past is not in operation and there is no mixed bait available.

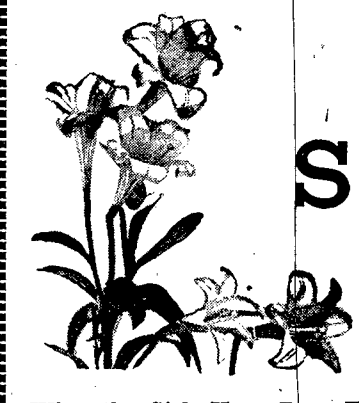

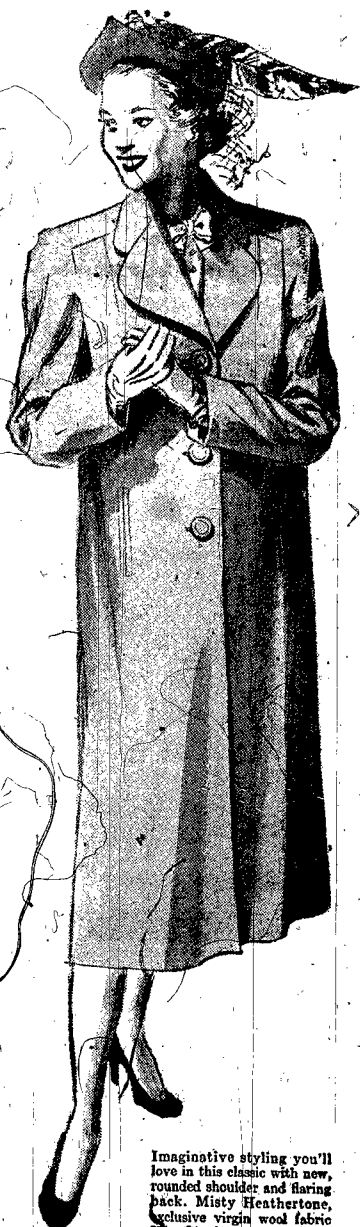

**Congress**  
As Seen By

When the department of justice appropriation bill was reported for general debate in the house last week, it included the full amount requested by the federal bureau of investigation for its operations during the coming year, despite the action of the bureau of the budget in trimming more than a million and a half dollars from the estimate. The appropriations sub-committee of which the third district member is ranking minority member reported this cut after hearing FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover testify that without this amount his agency would be greatly crippled.

The appropriations committee voted unanimously to give the FBI the \$52,585,141 it requested. The bureau of the budget had approved only \$50,987,000.

The FBI handled more than a half-million investigative matters last year. This was an all-time high, even exceeding the bureau's workloads during any of the peak years. During those busy years, when government expenditures were unparalleled in this country's history, approximately \$10,000,000 which had been authorized but unspent was voluntarily returned to the treasury by the FBI, indicating the efficiency of its operation under Mr. Hoover.

Originally FBI jurisdiction covered only 20 or 30 federal statutes. This number has now increased to around 120 major laws, including seven passed by congress in the past year alone. In addition, the responsibilities of this organization have been increased by presidential directives which have charged the FBI with the coordination of all internal security matters affecting the civilian population, including matters of espionage, sabotage and treason.

Every FBI special agent in the field is now carrying an average workload of 16 cases, although 10 are regarded as the maximum for efficient productive capacity. The spirit of the agents is demonstrated by the fact that during the 1948 fiscal year they performed voluntary overtime, for which no compensation was received, in excess of one million hours and forfeited 12,915 days' annual leave.

Investigations indicate that the communist party today is organized in some 600 communities in the United States. When the communist revolution occurred in Russia in 1917, there was only one communist for every 277 inhabitants of that country. In the United States today there is one communist for every 2,463 inhabitants.

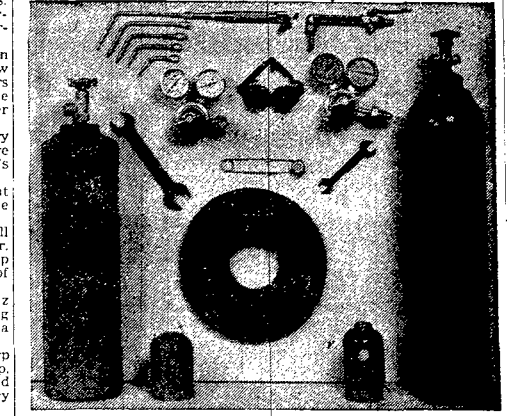

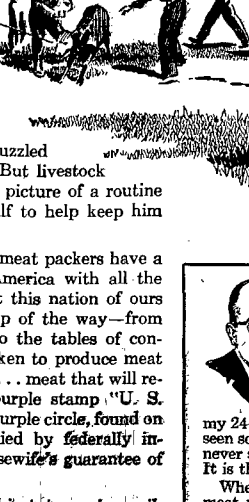

**INFLAMMABLES** like paper, books, rubbish, and rags accumulating in a house, basement, attic or garage invite fire. Poor electrical wiring and attachments, dirty chimneys, oily rags are among fire hazards. Kerosene, gasoline, cleaning fluid and other inflammables should be kept in fireproof containers or they invite tragedy.

Trash, garbage, dump heaps are breeders of disease as well as eyesores and should certainly be cleaned up during this campaign. Health officials point out the serious epidemics that start from neglect of such collectors of flies, rats, mosquitoes and bacteria.

They also agree that paint is important in health and sanitation, as paint is a sterilizer of disease

germs. Painting fills up the tiny fissures and small craters prevalent in most walls that collect organic matter which may feed bacteria.

## Time to Clean Up Farms, Too

Announcement of the 1949 spring clean-up drive, held to encourage farmers to correct fire hazards which have accumulated during the winter, has been made by the National Fire Protection association. The program has the support of the U.S. department of agriculture and state agriculture extension services.

The NFPA recommends cleaning homes and farm buildings thoroughly, inspecting buildings and farm equipment and making repairs and replacements when necessary for fire safety.

Emphasis is given to getting rid of accumulations of debris and eliminating hazards such as dirt chimneys, which shoot sparks out onto roofs. This danger is increased if the roofing is not fire-resistant, the NFPA says.

The entire fire loss for the United States last year exceeded \$711,000,000 and was the highest in history. NFPA records show that about 90 percent of all farm fires could have been prevented.
