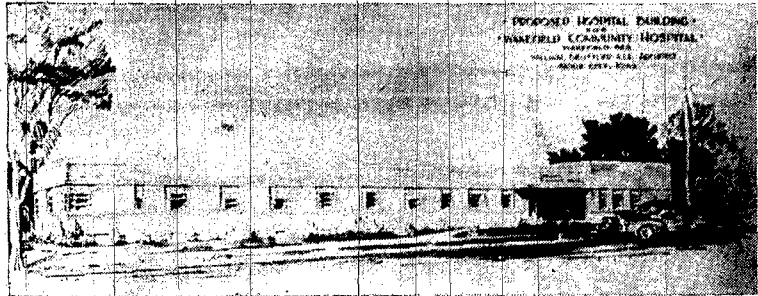


Wakefield's Proposed New Hospital

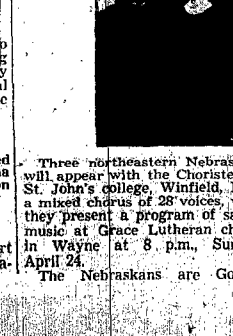

PMA Reduces District Size

The Nebraska production and marketing administration has appointed three additional farmer fieldmen, "necessitated by the large volume of participation in the loan and price support programs by Nebraska farmers, and the probability of average adjustments in basic crops for the 1950 crop year."

None of the three new fieldmen will work in this area, but the district covered by Lee E. Sollen of Randolph, northeast Nebraska fieldman, has been reduced to nine counties. This was necessary because of the increased amount of work according to Thomas P. Roberts, Wayne county AAA chairman.

Sellen's area now comprises Knox, Cedar, Dixon, Dakota, Pierce, Wayne, Thurston, Madison and Stanton counties.

The PMA has announced the appointment of James W. Lemley to the post of state commodity loan supervisor. Lemley, who was born and raised on a Butler county farm, has been associated with the administration of PMA programs in the state for the past 11 years.

Religious Slides Given to Library

The Wayne Ministerial association has given the public library nearly 400 colored slides depicting the entire story of the "Life of Christ."

The library will loan the slides to persons owning projectors, providing the borrower first obtains permission from a minister in the association. Only 60 consecutive slides, sufficient for a one-hour program, may be taken out at any one time.

Borrowers must return the slides within three days, and are responsible for breakage.

The association plans to add more religious slides to the collection at a later date.

Judge Grants Permanent Writ In Sholes Case

Prevents Leasing Of School Unless Electors Approve

District Judge Lyle Jackson Tuesday granted a permanent writ in the Sholes school case which he had taken under advisement last Nov. 24 following the temporary injunction on Sept. 9, 1948.

The permanent injunction enjoins school district 76 of Sholes and its individual board members, who were defendants, from taking any of the following actions:

1. Leasing a school house without securing the consent and approval of the voters.

2. Maintaining a high school in the district.

3. Changing or attempting to change the site of the school house in the district without first securing the approval and consent of the electors.

4. Making any expenditures of district funds without express authorization from the electors.

The judge further decreed that costs of the election should be taxed to two of the defendants, Roy Ison, director, and Ray Nelson, moderator. Leo Frederick, district treasurer, also was named as a defendant, but it is reported that he favored the side of the plaintiff, Ira Griggs, who filed the suit "in behalf of all other taxpayers and others opposed to a high school in Sholes."

The case developed as the result of a fire which destroyed the Sholes school in April 1948. School patrons differed on the question of what should be done about maintaining a school in the future.

Some wanted to continue the high school; others wanted only a grade school.

The court ruled that there is no authority to maintain a high school in the Sholes district. Freeman Decker, assistant state superintendent of schools, gave testimony to this effect when Judge Jackson heard the case last November.

The temporary injunction granted last September by Judge Fay Pollock restrained school authorities from leasing a school house without the consent of the electors. This injunction has been in effect since.

THERE HAS BEEN NO school in Sholes during the 1948-49 term. Some patrons favored a plan to remodel Madsen hall for use as a high school, and rooms downtown for a grade school, but the state fire marshal refused permission.

Students have been attending school in Carroll, Randolph and adjoining districts.

The judge gave the defendants one month's time in which to appeal to the Nebraska supreme court.

ALSO IN COURT Tuesday, Judge Jackson overruled a motion for a new trial in the "horse case" in which George F. McGuire of Wisner brought suit against Cal Thompson of Napier.

Last Dec. 14 a district judge awarded McGuire \$791 damages in a jury trial.

It is reported that Thompson expects to appeal to the state supreme court.

Largest Number of Trained Teachers Graduate This Year

Wayne State Teachers college will prove more highly trained teachers for northeastern Nebraska during the current year than ever before in the college's history.

Bachelor's degrees in education will be conferred upon 102 graduates. The pre-war record year was 99.

These 4-year students complete a thorough, liberal arts type curriculum specializing in fine arts, general subjects or science. They also earn 24 semester hours of education training which includes theory, methods and actual experience in laboratory schools.

The Wayne State program has been evaluated as outstanding by national agencies which fully accredit the college's offerings for every type curriculum.

IN ADDITION to the degree candidates, Wayne will prepare 109 students who will complete special three, two and one-year courses.

Several hundred summer students are expected to earn grade 2 credits in the regular school year completing the new 24-hour plan authorized by the 1949 unicameral.

Howard E. Tempero, director of the Wayne State placement bureau, reports that nearly 800 vacancies have been listed with that agency and that another 500 are expected to be placed by the end of the year.

Four-year candidates are being placed mostly in teaching positions ranging in salary around the \$3,000 mark.

THE INCREASING value and service Wayne State is providing for northeastern Nebraska is reflected in the enrollment summary to be announced May 1 in the 1949-50 college catalog, now being produced by The Wayne Herald.

Number of students enrolled in the regular school year increased from 729 in 1947-48 to 816 during the current semester. Correspondence students rose from 210 to 212; study center students increased from 438 to 443; summer session enrollment jumped from 688 to 717.

The regular campus laboratory school opened to 213.

Compared with a typical small, liberal arts college, Wayne State provides educational activities for an evaluated enrollment of 1,700 students.

Degree and diploma winners for 1948-49 will total 211 against 165 in 1947-48.

College Ready For 'Quarantine'

Wayne State students will return to their northeastern Nebraska campus after a four-day vacation for a prolonged stay as student organizations ready plans for the annual "quarantine weekend" at the college April 22 to 25.

The social planning committee, made up of representatives from every campus club, will direct a series of entertainment activities and will enforce a voluntary ruling that no student leave the campus during the quarantine period.

First event is an annual Women's Athletic association banquet on Thursday evening, April 21. The spring prom, sponsored by the "W" club, will be held Friday night, April 22. The semi-formal affair is regarded as a high point in student social life.

Saturday will feature recreational sports in the afternoon and a gala carnival at the Student Union building in the evening.

"Go-to-church-in-Wayne" is the slogan for Sunday, April 24. A special edition of The Goldenrod newspaper, will also be issued.

This is Miss Fletcher's first appearance in Wayne. Her concert will include sacred and classical numbers and her interpretations of several Negro spirituals. She has been called "the second Marian Anderson."

Highway Death Toll Mounts as Spring Arrives

Lincoln—Light heads and heavy feet seem to be the principal causes for Nebraska's alarming increase in traffic deaths.

Horace E. Crosby, president of the Nebraska State Safety Council, stated today that the death toll in Nebraska nearly equals last year's toll for the same period. As of April 7, Nebraska had 36 fatalities as compared to 45 for the same period last year.

"This, contrasted with the fact that at the end of January, Nebraska had reduced its traffic fatality experience by 72 per cent, is cause for real alarm," Crosby said. "It is hard to put the finger on the exact cause of so many traffic deaths. Perhaps it is because we drivers have a light head and a heavy foot on the accelerator in this spring weather. And on the first dry roads we have seen in months," he continued.

"That feeling of self-satisfaction which comes with perfect road conditions and pleasant driving weather sometimes lulls us into a false sense of security, which can be as fatal as taking poison. Don't allow your watchfulness to decrease even for a moment while walking or driving," Crosby concluded.

Neihardt Finishes Pioneer Days Saga



New York City — John G. Neihardt, Nebraska's poet laureate who grew up in Wayne and attended the Nebraska Normal college, this week saw the publication of his book, "A Cycle of the West," by the Macmillan Co.

The book marks the completion of Neihardt's saga of the opening of the western country, 1823-1890. Of his saga:

"In 1912, at the age of 31, I began on a cycle of heroic songs designed to celebrate the great mood of courage that was developed west of the Missouri in the 19th century. It was planned from the beginning that the five songs of Three Friends, of Hugh Glass, of Jed Smith, of the Indian Wars, and of the Messiah, which appeared at long intervals during 29 years, should constitute a single work. Now in 'A Cycle of the West' they are offered as such."

Much of the action of "A Cycle of the West" takes place on the Nebraska plains and along the Nebraska and Platte rivers. Country which Neihardt knows from having spent his earliest years with his pioneering grandparents in the northwest part of the state and later living in Wayne, Lincoln and Bancroft, where his friends, the Omaha Indians, have named him Little Bull Buffalo.

Neihardt is the only official poet laureate of Nebraska. He was appointed to the position by the Nebraska legislature in 1921.

AT THE NEBRASKA Normal college in Wayne, where Neihardt paid his tuition three years by ringing the class bell every 50 minutes of the day beginning at 6:30 p.m. he came under the influence of the president, J. M. Pile, and of Dr. U. S. Conn, later president of the school. Given every opportunity for private instruction by these two men, Neihardt's progress was rapid and he completed his first course at 16.

The college dormitory, Neihardt hall, is named for the Nebraska poet.

Receives Letter Of Missionary

The recent assassination of a Presbyterian missionary, Mrs. Horace Underwood, in a Korean college, which has received national and international attention, was made more locally significant recently when Mrs. H. L. Payne of Ladurita, Colo., received a letter from the bureau of the murdered woman which Mrs. Payne was here visiting Mrs. Dave Theophilus, Mrs. Payne and Mrs. Theophilus are sisters.

Mr. Underwood wrote that "the communists have recently been threatening to kill those who are teaching capitalism. They have also been lately attacking women and children as the best way to terrify the men. I have long said that some day the communists would decide that the time had come to kill some well known American to show the world that the Koreans hate the American imperialists."

"It is no exaggeration to say that there was probably no one so widely loved in all Korea as Mrs. Underwood and this made her a good mark. She would feel most deeply hurt... if through her good name of Korea was tarnished, I hope of you in her name not to feel that Koreans are to blame. Al ready (within two hours of the affair) we have heard from the President of Korea, the prime minister, a representative of the assembly, and other high officials. They are doing everything in their power to catch the assassins, though neither Ethel Mrs. Underwood nor I want any Korean executed on our account."

Don Payne, a nephew of Mrs. Theophilus and Mrs. Payne's son, is also teaching in the college at Seoul, Korea, where the Underwoods have been working for several years. He writes that there has been no heat all winter in the schoolrooms, although a few of the teacher's rooms have heat. One of the teachers remarked that "It is a wonder they don't hate me because I am warm."

10,212 Veterans Purchase Homes

Lincoln—A total of 10,212 World War 2 veterans in Nebraska have purchased homes during the post-war period with the help of credit aids provided in the GI bill, the Veterans Administration reported today.

Ashley Westmoreland, Lincoln regional office manager, said veterans have obtained GI home loans totalling \$45,582,411 since the GI bill was enacted in 1944. Of this amount, VA guaranteed or insured the mortgage lenders against loss for a total of \$22,953,891.

In this state 1,257 veterans obtaining GI home loan financing during 1948, as compared with 3,586 in 1947 and 4,650 in 1946.

Westmoreland pointed out veterans have until 1957 to apply for a GI loan and urged them to move cautiously and seek sound advice before investing.

Legislature O.K.'s Driving Tests

Lincoln — Legalized chemical tests to be used in drunk driving cases passed the final reading on the floor of the Nebraska legisla-ture.

The bill, sponsored by the Ne-braska State Safety Council, won the okay of the state's senators by a vote of 25 to 10.

If signed by the governor, the bill will provide the degrees of in-toxication of the suspect. Through the use of chemical tests, the de-gree may be determined and ad-

mitted as evidence in Nebraska courts.

An amendment to the bill less-ens the punishment on first off-ense. It lowers the monetary fine and lessens the minimum amount of time of license suspension, as well as lessening the minimum jail sentence that can be invoked.

Under the second offense the only change made was lessening the monetary fine which may be levied. The bill will take effect 90 days following the adjournment of the legislature.
