Even the Farmers Don't Like It

Agriculture Secretary Charles Brannan's proposed new farm program isn't being received as well as it could be—even among the farmers. Last week in West Point, the board of directors of the Nebraska Livestock Feeders association went on record as being unanimously opposed to the Brannan plan, or, as the association put. It is also disclosed by the Hoover Commission that separate agencies operate 138 printing plants and 256 duplicating plants at a cost of about \$25,000,000 per year.

All that is in addition to the cost of operating a great Government Printing Office which is Equipped to do about anything and everything in the printing line. Last year that plant alone put out ten and a half billion printing items at a cost of \$47,500,000 more than the year before.
