

"Wayne Public Library Condemned ... Building Found Unsafe."

How would you like to see that headline in your newspaper? It hasn't happened yet, but someday it may if nothing is done to repair the damage the building has suffered during the years since it was built in 1912. The library building hasn't been neglected, but funds derived from the library levy haven't been sufficient to pay for both upkeep and the cost of operation. As the librarian has consistently pointed

As the librarian has consistently pointed out, and will show anyone who is interested, termites have caused extensive damage to the floods and woodwork. Furthermore, this is not invisible damage. It can be seen by anyone

Wiring in the building is obsolete and even dangerous. The furnace room and basement storeroom are in a state of discrepair, as are the door and entrance. The restroom is practically unfit for use.

All this adds up to one undeniable fact: A valuable public building is going to ruin because there are insufficient funds for repair and upkeep.

because there are insufficient tunds for repair and upkeep.

Next Tuesday Wayne voters will have the opportunity to preserve this building when they vote at a special election on the question of whether or not the city shall issue \$20,000 in bonds specifically to repair the building and possibly to construct a badly needed addition.

The cost to property owners will not be high. It is placed at about 75 cents to \$1.50 per year for a moderately priced home until the bonds are retired. That seems an insignificant sum to pay for the preservation of an institution as important to the community as the public library.

The library building was constructed and given to the city by the Andrew Carnegle Foundation. In the past 37 years it has provided a source of relaxation through reading, as well as educational help, for countless Wayne residents and their children. It is your library—for you and your children and for future generations.

Are we going to permit this gift to deteriorate into a state of complete useless ress? Ethe-vote next Tuesday should be an overwhelming "Yes."

Henry A. Wallace has attacked the north Atlantic pact. In his so-called "peace tour" of the country he is making a series of speeches in which he criticizes and condemns United States policy as if his very life depended upon defending Soviet Russia. If he continues this line, at least his fellow Americans will wonder whether after all he is some kind of red or fellow traveler, sympathetic with the aims of the Moscow regime.

Mr. Wallace in bitterness attacked Senator Vandenberg of Michigan as being responsible "more than any other single man" for the north Atlantic alliance. He said the Vandenberg resolution of last June became a "signal for the pact." He called it "merely another lineup of nations under the cover of anticommunism for another-holy war on Russia, just like Hitler's."

The lowan had an alternative. Instead of the pact he wants the "building of a stronger United Nations" and a "returning to one world built on cooperation and unity." That is probably as silly a thing as Henry Wallace has uttered since he was kicked out of the Truman cabinet. He ought to have gumption enough to know that the U.N. cannot be made stronger as long as Soviet Russia by employing the veto stops all cooperation and unity. It is that opposition from Russia has compelled the western nations to ally themselves together. Everybody here but Henry Wallace knows this to be true. That man is utterly impossible.

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
