

Voters Approve \$20,000 Library Bond Issue

Estimate City's Budget Will Be \$10,000 Higher

Boosts Deemed Necessary for New Fiscal Year

Wayne city council Tuesday evening approved an estimate of \$265,000 as the probable amount the city will need for the fiscal year which began May 1.

This is an increase of \$10,000 over the budget adopted for the year just ended.

Largest increase is in the library fund. The council estimates that this fund will need to be boosted \$20,000—the amount voted for library improvements in the special election Tuesday.

OTHER INCREASES are: \$5,000 in the sinking fund for bonds, \$4,000 in the insurance fund, \$2,000 in the streets and alleys fund, and \$2,000 in the general fund.

At the same time two reductions are contemplated. The council believes it can cut the park fund by \$4,000 and the foreclosed fund by \$20,000 in the new fiscal year.

City Clerk Walter S. Bressler told the council that receipts for the fiscal year ending April 30 totaled \$140,633.

A complete budget estimate for the new fiscal year will be published in The Herald next week.

BESIDES THE weighty business of determining the city's financial requirements, the council also took action on several other matters.

It passed a resolution of necessity approving the construction of a new sanitary sewer system in the northwest part of the city, and set May 31 as the date for hearing on the resolution. Cost of the sewer system is to be paid by property owners who will benefit from its construction.

Four requests for building permits were approved. To Jack Kingston, for the construction of a \$2,250 sun porch onto his home; to Desmond Wolsinger, for the remodeling of his home, \$2,000; to Sherry Bros., for the building of a 14x20 addition to their business building, \$1,000; and the Fred Ruser, for the addition of a garage to his house, \$600.

THE COUNCIL ALSO retained H. D. Addison as special counsel for the city, allowed bills and set May 20 as the date of a special meeting for the canvass of the vote in Tuesday's special election and for the consideration of other business.

Four-day Session Opens Monday at Redeemer Lutheran

Delegates and pastors of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod in the Midwest, United Lutheran Church in America, will assemble at Redeemer Lutheran church in Wayne next Monday through Thursday for the synod's 60th convention.

Highlighting the convention will be addresses by Dr. Franklin Clark Fry, New York president of the United Lutheran Church in America, and Pastor Heinrich Falk of St. Mark's Lutheran church, Frankfurt, Germany, who is now on leave of absence in the United States.

Rev. S. K. deFreese, pastor of Redeemer Lutheran church, said he expects approximately 125 pastors and delegates to attend the four-day session. There also will be many visitors.

OFFICERS of the synod are: Rev. Lorin Wolff, Lincoln, president, who will conduct the sessions; Rev. P. Moesner, Hooper, vice president; Rev. J. Wolner, Hooper, secretary; and Rev. G. Wlenke, Auburn, treasurer.

The convention opens with a communion service Monday evening, Dr. Fry will deliver the sermon.

The synod will hold regular sessions Tuesday. A memorial service will take place at 5 p. m. At 8 p. m., two men will be ordained, with Dr. Martin Schroeder of Glenview as speaker. The candidates for the ministry are Martin Schroeder, Jr., of Glenview, who will assume a pastorate at Grand Island, and Edwin Bastian of Pennsylvania, who will become pastor of a Hastings church.

ALSO ON TUESDAY, the anniversary of ordinations for 25 years service will be observed for Rev. C. H. Goetz, of Auburn, Rev. Karl H. Goetz, of Yutan and Rev. Fred Block of Oklahoma City, Okla. Rev. J. N. Maxeb of Blue Hill will speak in their honor.

Increased attendance is expected Wednesday evening at a laymen's banquet which will follow sessions of the day. The banquet will begin at 6:30 in the city auditorium. Dr. Fry will be the speaker. Also on the program will be selections by a chorus under the direction of Milton Hassel.

PASTOR FALK will address the convention Thursday on behalf of Lutheran World Action. Rev. Falk has been pastor of St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran church in Frankfurt for 17 years. During his past years in the United States, he is touring the country in behalf of Lutheran World Action. His congregation in Frankfurt numbers more than 6,000 members.

In his lectures here, Rev. Falk tells about the life of his congregation from the time he became pastor in 1934 until the church and parsonage were destroyed in World War 2. His wife is American-born.

She received her education here and engaged in the dressmaking and millinery business in Wayne.

On Feb. 12, 1899, she was married to William E. Surber. They lived on a farm in this area for a time, and later on a farm near Reiden, Mo. Surber died Feb. 3, 1902. She moved the following year to her farm near Middlebranch.

SHE WAS MARRIED Feb. 24, 1904, to John Bengson. They lived on his farm for 2 1/2 years, then moved into Middlebranch where Mr. Bengson operated a general store and Mrs. Bengson was postmistress three years. They then returned to the farm. Mr. Bengson died Sept. 5, 1929.

375 Approve; Only 110 Vote Against

Residents of Wayne Tuesday approved a \$20,000 bond issue for the repair and enlargement of the municipal library—with votes to spare.

Of the 485 votes cast in the special election, 375 were for the proposal; only 110 against. In order to carry, the proposed bond issue needed two-thirds of the total vote cast. It received slightly more than 77 percent—a comfortable 10 percent more than was necessary.

Only the first ward failed to give the necessary two-thirds. The vote there was 63 for and 37 against, or 63 percent in favor of the bond issue.

The second and third wards easily made up the deficit by voting overwhelmingly for the proposal.

Voting, while not extraordinarily heavy, was brisk. Election officials tallied the returns to the city clerk before 9:00 Tuesday evening. The polls closed at 8:00.

The vote will be canvassed at a special session of the city council May 20. At that time, the council also will consider the sale of the library bonds.

Sioux Falls Rabbi Says Ideas Needed To Defeat Ideas

"An idea cannot be defeated on the battlefield. . . it can only be defeated by a better idea."

This is the belief of Rabbi Karl Richter, Sioux Falls, who spent two days this week on the Wayne State campus. He made the above statement in a talk before the Kiwanis club Monday noon.

THE RABBI is himself a former resident of Hitler's Germany, who escaped to this country 10 years ago—before the war started. Speaking on the world conflict of ideas today, Richter stated that the conflict between Russia and the western powers is very much the same now as it was 100 years ago during the Crimean war. He added that "the situation is not hopeless."

"Two ideas have emerged in Europe during the 20th century," the rabbi said, continuing. "One is the concept of the pure race, that must lead and ultimately conquer; the second is that of historical materialism, an economic idea, he thought that they (the proletariat) will ultimately gain control of all production and materials, and thus conquer."

"AND OPPOSED to both these concepts is democracy—based on ideals—love, truth, tolerance, and the assumption that all men are created equal."

Rabbi Richter is one of several hundred in the United States who have been designated to visit educational institutions, and to talk to various groups on Jewish history and religion.

OUT OLD NEBRASKA

by **JAMES C. OLSON, Superintendent STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY**

One of the most significant ceremonies in the history of the west was that held at Promontory, Utah, on May 10, 1869, signaling the completion of the first transcontinental railroad.

Even before California became American soil, there was interest in improved communication with the Pacific coast. With the discovery of gold and the admission of California into the union, that interest grew apace. The overland mail and the pony express represented attempts to tie California more closely to the rest of the Union.

FOR NEBRASKA, the transcontinental railroad had particular significance. A need for organizing the Indian country to make possible a Pacific railroad along the central route was an important factor in the creation of Nebraska territory. The actual construction of the railroad itself, and its subsequent operations, were important factors in settling the new state of Nebraska.

The Union Pacific railroad was chartered by congress in 1862, and the ground for the enterprise was broken at Omaha on Dec. 2, 1863, with Gov. Alvin Saunders turning the first spadeful of earth.

BUILDING A railroad across Nebraska was no easy task. Until the Northwestern was completed to Council Bluffs in 1867, all materials had to be hauled up the Missouri river in steamboats, and then sent by rail from Omaha to the end of the line. Even after the railroad reached Council Bluffs, freight had to be transferred by ferry inasmuch as there was no bridge across the river.

Ties were as much a problem on the treeless plains as were rails, and had to be shipped in from Michigan, Pennsylvania and New York.

Still another problem was that of furnishing food for the construction crews. Fortunately, the buffalo roaming the plains provided a source of supply near at hand, and buffalo tallow was an integral part of the railroad's crew.

Nebraska Education Progresses

Vote trading, described in at least one daily newspaper as "the worst it has been in several sessions," is credited by some observers with having been responsible, to a great extent, for the passage of the normal school liberal arts bill by the state legislature.

Opponents of the bill, in alleging that vote trading among legislators resulted in its enactment, appear to be attempting to shroud the measure in an aura of disrepute.

The liberal arts bill should not be so tagged. It is a progressive piece of legislation. The Herald believes it can and will add measurably to the educational opportunities offered to the young people of Nebraska.

When this editorial was written, the bill awaited only the signature of the governor to become law. If approved by the governor, the four state teachers college finally will be permitted to become in fact and authority the higher ranking educational institutions which they long have been in practice.

It will behoove our teachers colleges to treat their newly earned authority with due respect for their responsibilities as higher institutions of learning. If this is done, as we feel sure it will be, there can be no cause for anyone to regret that the 1949 Nebraska legislature made this important move toward the enrichment of education in our state.

Congress Has the Opportunity

The 81st congress may, after all, prove itself to be more concerned with the economic welfare of the nation than seemed possible after the mandate the voters apparently gave President Truman in the last election. The president immediately embarked on a proposed spending program without previous parallel (discounting the war), and it appeared that congress would go along with him.

Now, however, the picture has changed. The long awaited leveling off period has arrived, and top ranking authorities on the national economic picture have warned that higher taxes and expansion of costly government programs may be extremely dangerous. Apparently the congress is listening to these warnings. So should the president.

The administration's proposals must be considered with extreme caution. If business continues to decline, so will earnings for workers and profits for employers. With this fact in mind, adding to the already heavy tax burden can only result in economic disaster—plus the destruction of the free enterprise system which has built the greatest nation in the world. When government taxes take away all earnings and profits, the incentives to earn and to do business are destroyed. Government benefit programs also can be carried so far that the incentive to earn one's own living is weakened.

The 81st congress has the power and the opportunity to prevent an economic collapse by reducing government spending, by instituting economies in government operation, and by holding the line on taxes—or even reducing the load. And if it uses this opportunity, the 81st congress also will be helping to halt our national trend toward socialism.

A Black 'White Spot'?
(Omaha Republican)

Good, common sense. A writer in the public forum says: "Nebraska would fare better if this nonsense about the white spot of the nation were forgotten. Sure, we have no income tax, no sales tax, no bonded debt, but we also have 'no nothing.' Little wonder that we rank with the Dakotas, Mississippi, and Arkansas in many obvious respects. We are asking for the federal government to step in when we fail to keep our own house in order."

No Recession in Land Values
(Sioux City Journal)

Despite predictions of inflated land values, such as so much disturbed the agricultural economy of an earlier postwar period, there was no such development. The price of agricultural lands was comparatively low at the outbreak of the recent war and did not increase abnormally during the fighting years or in the postwar period. Hence on March 1 of this year, the average land values were only 3 per cent higher than at the same time in 1948, 111 per cent more than the 1935-39 level and 75 per cent higher than in 1912-14. Compared to farm commodity prices, farm land values have remained low. Hence the danger of a disturbing price recession in this field is negligible.
