Nebraska Education Progresses

Vote trading described in at least one daily newspaper as "the worst it has been in several sessions," is credited by some observers with having been responsible, to a great extent, for the passage of the normal school liberal arts hill by the state legislature.

Opponents of the bill, in alleging that vote trading among legislators resulted in its enactment, appear to be attempting to shroud the measure in an aura of disrepute.

The liberal arts bill should not be so tagged. It is a progressive piece of legislation. The Herald believes it can and will add measurably to the educational opportunities offered to the young people of Nebraska.

When this editorial was written, the bill awaited only the signature of the governor to become law. If approved by the governor, the four state teachers college finally will be permitted to become in fact and authority the higher ranking educational institutions which they long have been in practice.

If this is done, as we feel sure it will be, there can be no cause for anyone to regret that the 1949 Nebraska legislature made this important move toward the enrichment of education in our state.

The long awaited leveling off period has arrived, and top ranking authorities on the national economic picture have warned that higher taxes and expansion of costly government programs may be extremely dangerous. Apparently the congress is listening to these warnings. So should the president.

The administration's proposals must be considered with extreme caution. If business continues to decline, so will earnings for workers and profits for employers. With this fact in mind, adding to the already heavy tax burden can only result in economic disaster—plus the destruction of the free enterprise system which has built the greatest nation in the world. When government taxes take away all earnings and profits, the incentives to earn and to do business are destroyed. Government benefit programs also can be carried so far that the incentive to earn one's own living is weakened.

The state congress has the power and the

The Aist congress has the power and the opportunity to prevent an economic collapse by reducing government spending, by instituting economies in government operation, and by holding the line on taxes—or even reducing the load. And if it uses this opportunity, the \$1st congress also will be helping to halt our national trend toward socialism.

No Recession in Land Values

No Recession in Land Values

(Slow City Journal).

Despite predictions of inflated land values, such as so much disturbed the lagricultural common of an earlier postwar period, there was no such development. The price of agricultural lands was comparatively low at the outbreak of the recent war and did not increase abnormally during the fighting years or in the postwar period. Hence on March 1 of this year, the average land values were only 3 per cent higher than at the same time in 1948, 111 per cent more than the 1935-39 level and 75 per cent higher than in 1912-14. Compared to farm commodity prices, farm land values tave remained low. Hence the danger of a sturbing price recession in this field is regigible.

The overland mail and the pony express represented attempts to the California more closely to the rest of the Union.

BUILDING A railroad across Nebraska was no easy task. Until the Northwestern was completed to Council Bluffs in 1867, all materials had to be hauled up the Missouri river in steamboats, and then sent by rail from Omaha to the end of the line. Even after the railroad reached Council Bluffs, freight had to be transferred by ferry indismuch as there was no bridge across the river.

Thes were as much a problem on the treeless plains as were rails, and had to be shipped in from Michigan, Pennsylvania and New York.

Still another problem was that of furnishing food for the construction crews. Fortunately, the buffalo roaming the plains provided a source of supply near at hand, and buffalo hunters were an integral part of the railroad's crew.
