w nen Consumers Strike Consumer strikes may be one means of bringing prices down—way down—but the consumer himself may be one of those most adversely, affected by tumbling prices. Prof. Malcolm P. McNair of the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administra-tion; says: "If now, with the keen edge taken off demand for durables, consumers are going to stand off and wait for lower prices, the over prices will probably come, but only as a result of severe economic dis-location, general unemployment, sharp de-clines in consumer income, and great dam-age to our economic and political struc-ture."

ture." When the consuming public refuses to buy, the retailer also guits buying products which won't move. On up the line it goes to the 'manufacturer, who stops making them and as a result lays off employees. In the final analysis, this results in increasing unemployment, a reduction of the money in circulation, and financial trouble for the entire nation. Consumer strikes sometimes may be justified, but not when carried to a point that damages the national economy.
