Woman's Club Lists Rules for Flower Show

Entries Invited From All Who Grow Flowers

Wayne Women's club will sponsor its annual flower and style show Tuesday, May 24, at the city auditorium.

Mrs. Will Fentler and Mrs. Fred Hall will act as judges. They are members of the Norfolk Garden club and have made an extensive study of flowers and arrangements.

Rules of the flower show specify that all entries must be in place by 11 a.m. and judging will be done between then and 2 p.m.

There will be no entry fee and no admission charge. Exhibits will be on display in each section.

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The show committee has announced that all containers and other properties should be marked with the owner's name as it will not be responsible for these things.

A feature of the flower show will be the Forty-Niner table on which exhibits are to be displayed in receptacles of olden times.

EXHIBITS WILL be entered in the following sections and classes: Section 1—Single stem flower (iris, peonies, pansies, miscellaneous).

Section 2—African violet plants. Section 3—House plants (gloriosa, other varieties).

Section 4—Garden circus (plants growing in unique containers, entered by any boy or girl under 16. They need not be grown by the exhibitor).

Section 5—Bouquets (mixed variety of flowers, single variety of flowers, flowering shrubs).

Section 6—Artistic arrangements (church, dinner table, coffee table, buffet table, dish gardens, all white, novelty with flowers, etc.).

Section 7—Basket exhibit (floor, table, 12 varieties of iris—named).

Section 8—Corsages. Section 9—The Forty-Niner table.

Section 10—Tables (bridge, breakfast, luncheon, tea, picnic).

Sheaff to Leave McDonald Store; Wolf New Manager

J. M. McDonald, Jr., of Hastings, president of the J. M. McDonald Co., this week announced that George Sheaff of Wayne will be transferred to Canon City, Colo., to become manager of a new store the company will open next fall.

At the same time, it was revealed that Donald Wolf of Wayne will be promoted to manager of the company's store here. Wolf has been assistant manager of the Wayne store since last Aug. 1.

SHEAFF WILL TAKE over his duties in Canon City, a city of about 15,000 population, sometime in July. He has been with the J. M. McDonald Co., formerly the Brown-McDonald Co., since March 1928. He spent eight years in the company's Pullerton, Neb., store as assistant manager and manager, and one year at Hoisington, Kan.

### Johnsons Here From Alaska

Twenty-two hours is the time it took for Mr. and Mrs. Russell Johnson to come from Anchorage, Alaska, to Sioux City, Ia., by plane. The Johnsons will be here until the first of June visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Hall. They left a few feet of snow behind, the result of a late winter storm. A letter from Mr. Johnson's parents, who also live in Anchorage, says that night temperatures are about 20 to 25 degrees, although the days are sunny. The change of climate gave both Mr. and Mrs. Johnson colds.

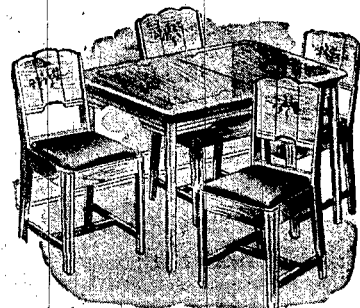

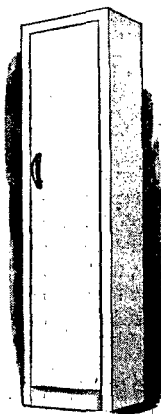

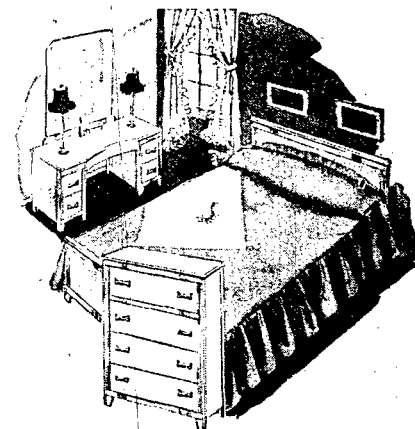

**Success to You**

**Saying So Isn't Enough**

Tax authorities in the 81st congress estimate the government will go into the hole three billion dollars in the forthcoming fiscal year. No wonder the president continues to demand higher taxes—it is one way to keep the national debt from increasing.

We, too, want it to go no higher and, in fact, want to see it reduced substantially. But there is a better way to do it than by piling on heavier taxes—a procedure that can be disastrous in these days of dropping prices and lessening income. Right now is the time for our government to stop reckless spending and to start economizing. Waste and inefficiency must go.

Congressmen are showing increasing realization of the fact that economies must be instituted; that spending must be curbed. They say these things publicly and hence must believe that it is time to call a halt.

Yet, in the next breath, they vote huge new appropriations for one thing and another. Such inconsistencies make one wonder about the wisdom and sincerity of some members of congress.

**When Consumers Strike**

Consumer strikes may be one means of bringing prices down—way down—but the consumer himself may be one of those most adversely affected by tumbling prices.

Prof. Malcolm P. McNair of the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration, says: "If now, with the keen edge taken off demand for durables, consumers are going to stand off and wait for lower prices, the lower prices will probably come, but only as a result of severe economic dislocation, general unemployment, sharp declines in consumer income, and great damage to our economic and political structure."

When the consuming public refuses to buy, the retailer also quits buying products which won't move. On up the line it goes to the manufacturer, who stops making them and as a result lays off employees. In the final analysis, this results in increasing unemployment, a reduction of the money in circulation, and financial trouble for the entire nation.

Consumer strikes sometimes may be justified, but not when carried to a point that damages the national economy.

**Prosperity Sign**

(Omaha Journal-Stockman)

Are we really enjoying an era of prosperity these days? Economists have their own methods—clearing house figures, the stock market, livestock prices, etc., etc. But Jeff Davis is quite sure that things are all right with our nation, financially speaking, and his reasons for saying so are that most of the hoboes are off the road, working at jobs, even paying income taxes in some cases. Mr. Davis is in a position to know about this. He is "king of the hoboes." Interviewed in Chicago, Mr. Davis revealed that his Hoboes of America, incorporated in Indiana recently, boasts a membership of 1,030,000.

Mr. Davis himself keeps right on hustling his razor blades, but still manages to get around the country. It's only a note of fear in some of the people that is keeping back a real boom, says he. "They should forget their fears like the ho's," he says, "and spend their money." We suggest that the government is way ahead of us on that score, Mr. Davis. It is spending it for us.

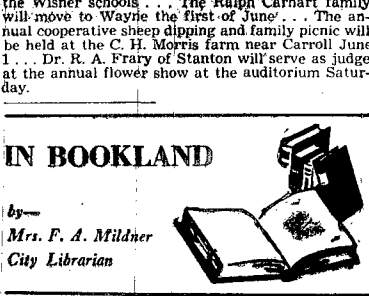

What-a-you-know About Public Sentiment?  
Abraham Lincoln said, "Public sentiment is everything. With public sentiment nothing can fail; without it nothing can succeed." Feeling that it was lack of public sentiment that was the source of our troubles, last January I began to try to stir up some, and the vote on May 10th was the result. The thing that stirred me to action was a little poem which I read in a 1944 Wilson Library Bulletin. I pondered over that bit of verse for three years and finally decided to take the author's advice. This is the poem:

Up and At 'Em  
Let's confess,  
In this more or less public press;  
No politician's primal weakness is humility  
To the point of nil-ity,

E. E. Carle, former adjutant of the department of Nebraska of the Spanish War Veterans, has taken his new office as adjutant of the national organization with headquarters in Washington. This is the highest paid office in the organization.

The house passed the amendments to the commodity credit corporation bill. This will provide for more storage of farm products and it is planned to have much of this storage on the farms.

A large group of Nebraskans who were here in connection with the United States Chamber of Commerce meeting heard an interesting "off the record" illustrated talk by Gen. Alfred Gruenther regarding U. S. defense plans in case of another emergency. General Gruenther, who was born at Platte Center, was once the youngest general in the army. He is now director of the planning section of the joint chiefs of staff.

Members from farm districts are complaining that European relief funds to the United Kingdom are being used to purchase pork products in Canada. These members feel that the money from American taxpayers should be used to buy American pork products when there is a surplus.

**TRAVEL TO EUROPE** is so heavy that some airlines report they are solidly booked for one year. Many Nebraskans are writing for visas and reservations.

Switzerland is getting 16 million dollars from Uncle Sam for damage done to Swiss property by American aviators who unintentionally dropped bombs in that country during the war. The Swiss also want 5 per cent compound interest on this bill. An effort to eliminate the interest failed in the house by 20 votes. The Swiss were neutral during the war. They collected many millions from both sides of the conflict and charged Uncle Sam large sums to represent us during hostilities. Their bill for interned Americans in Switzerland was unusually high.

When members of the Congressional Secretaries' club made their biennial tour of the federal bureau of investigation last week, one of their guides was Jay Bailey of Schuyler, a clerk in the FBI's file section. A World War 2 navy veteran, he has been here two and a half years. Following his graduation in accounting from a local night school next January, young Bailey hopes to pass qualifying examinations to become an FBI agent.

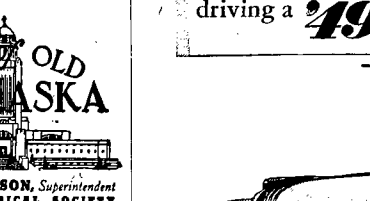

that 4,577 tons of hay and feed were dropped or delivered by air force personnel in Nebraska, Arizona, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming, North and South Dakota.

Texas is said to have lobbyists on capitol hill opposing proposed bills which would make Alaska the 49th state. The Lone Star state, at present the largest in the union, doesn't want to lose that distinction to Alaska which has considerably more land area. We haven't heard what the Texans think about Hawaii, which also is anxious to acquire statehood.



In these degenerate days, Nebraska's fishing grounds must be stocked regularly if the state's anglers are going to enjoy any sport at all. In old Nebraska, though, the fishing was fine and without benefit of limits, hatcheries and closed seasons.

Many of the diaries kept by explorers, soldiers, traders and emigrants tell of days spent fishing in Nebraska's streams. It was a favorite amusement on Sundays, and at all other times when rest or than travel was the order of the day.

**BUT FOR THOSE** early Nebraskans, fishing was much more than amusement. It was a means of securing fresh food, and providing a welcome supplement to the standard diet of bacon, beans and coffee. On military expeditions, soldiers frequently were assigned to a fishing detail, and the Mormons organized committees to fish the rivers to provide food for the destitute.

Considerable ingenuity was used in catching fish. The seine was a favorite device, although scoops and baskets also were used. The story is told of a group of trappers who, having gone some time without food, found a large snafy pin in one of their blankets. They quickly bent the pin into a hook and braided a line of hair taken from the horses' tails, with the result that they soon had a pan full of fresh fish, plus an additional supply for future use.

**PROBABLY ONE** of the first fish stories to come out of Nebraska is that recorded in the journal of Lewis and Clark who ascended the Missouri River in 1804. On Aug. 15, at a camp just north of the Omaha village, they dragged a small creek dammed by beaver, catching "315 fish of different kind . . . Pike, Bass, Salmon, perch, red horse, small cat, and a kind of perch Call Silver fish, on the Ohio."

Captain Clark, whose spelling is wonderful to behold, also reported that he caught "a Srimp proselyt of Shape Size & flavour of those about N. Orleans & the lower part of the Mississippi". The next day their luck was even better as they caught "upwards of 800 fine fish, 79 pike, 8 salmon resembling trout . . . 1 rock, 1 flat back, 127 buffalaw & red horse, 4

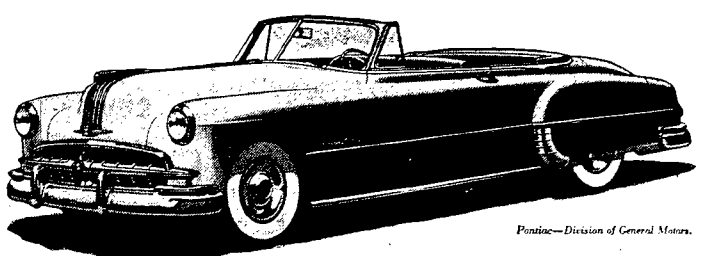

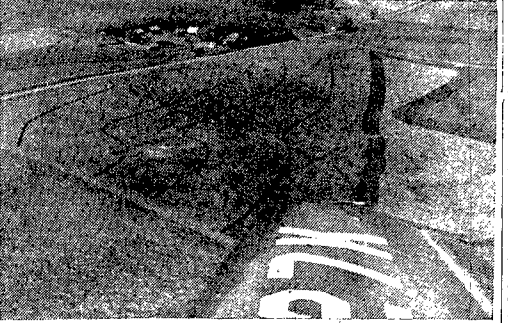
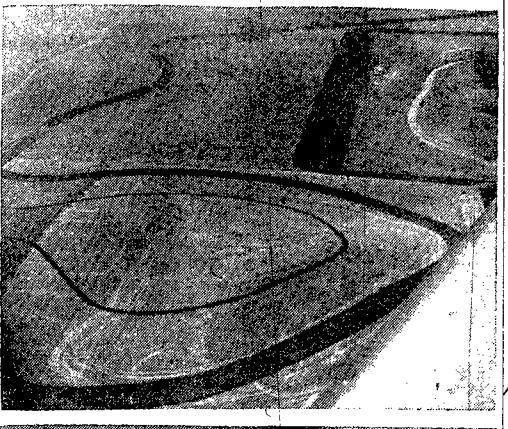
