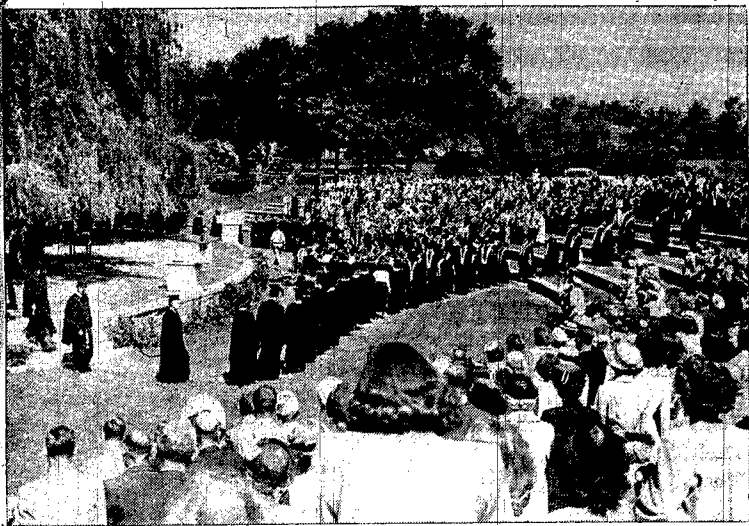


Summer Recreation Program Starts June 7

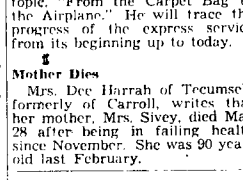

Establishing Wheat Acreage Allotments

Acreage allotments are now being established by the Wayne county agricultural conservation committee for all old wheat farms to be applicable to the acreage of wheat seeded for harvest for the crop year 1950.

Any farm producer on a farm on which wheat was not seeded for harvest in any of the years 1947, 1948 or 1949, and who plans to seed wheat for harvest in 1950, may request, in terms of a specific acreage allotment, that the acreage be established in the county office in writing not later than June 20, 1949, if an allotment is subsequently to be established for such farm.

Grace Lutheran Joins Nationwide Drive



Concordia Teachers College, Seward, Nebraska (administration building in photo), expects to receive approximately \$270,000 for construction of a two-unit auditorium and laboratory-classroom building from a \$2,000,000 "Building For Tomorrow" effort now being carried out by The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod.

Members of Grace Lutheran church, and of other churches in this area affiliated with the Lutheran church (Missouri synod), are preparing to participate in a nationwide effort to raise more than \$2,000,000 to be used for construction of new buildings at colleges and theological seminaries operated by the Lutheran church—Missouri synod.

The greater part of the fund will be raised by the synod's 5,000 affiliate congregations throughout the United States and Canada in a special offering on Pentecost Sunday, June 5. Solicitations will be strictly from members of the church and will be on a voluntary basis.

This will be the first large fund raising project for capital improvements at higher educational institutions of the Missouri synod since 1925. Major expenditures of the church body during the last decade have been devoted to wartime service to armed forces personnel, to foreign and domestic relief activities and to postwar relief and rehabilitation purposes abroad for which an estimated 15 million dollars have been contributed by the 1,500,000 members of this denomination since 1945.

"IN ADDITION to replacement of obsolete buildings," Rev. E. J. Bernthal, pastor of Grace Lutheran church, explained, "the new program for eventual expansion of the existing educational facilities at 12 colleges and theological seminaries to provide a minimum of 200 candidates annually for the Lutheran ministry, and a minimum of 475 graduates annually, prepared to teach in the synod's rapidly expanding system of parish schools.

A distinctive feature of the latest parish school system of the church, the largest maintained by any Protestant church body in America, is the unusual number of men teachers employed. At present, over half of the 2,806 trained full-time teachers in the system are men. Most of these teachers are graduates of the church's two teachers' colleges located at Seward, Nebr., and at River Forest, Ill.

"THESE COLLEGES, the only teacher training institutions operated by a major American Protestant church body, occupy an important place in the proposed building program, which has been appropriately titled, 'Building For Tomorrow.' Concordia Teachers college at Seward expects to receive an appropriation of approximately \$270,000 for construction of a two-unit auditorium and laboratory-classroom building.

Mrs. Wayne Walters Tells of Long Tour Through Europe

Capt. and Mrs. Wayne Walters and two children, who have been in Germany for more than two years, will leave there soon for the states. They will come to Wayne to visit Mrs. Walters' parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Fuesler, some time in June.

For the past three or four months, the Walters' have been touring Europe during the captain's leave time. The following excerpts were taken from some of Mrs. Walters' letters to her parents.

FEB. 29.—"Within the last six days we have made a little trip down through Switzerland, Austria (French zone) and back to Germany. It was all very nice and, as usual, it was unusual. We went first to Switzerland and after having our passports checked and getting our money in order, we went down to Zurich. We parked the car, and after getting lost and unjust trying to find our friend's address, made our way to his office.

"We had not written him we were coming, so he was rather surprised to see us. True man style, he called his wife and suggested that we come out for lunch. With 10 minutes notice, I knew how she would feel, so told him we could not come. Then he suggested we go to this one hotel for our meal and get a room there. His being the American counselor there, I am sure, helped make a room possible,

but we picked it before we signed and found it would be costing us about \$10 a day. The lunch cost over \$4, so we decided to make plans to stay elsewhere.

"BY GETTING LOST, we found ourselves in a tiny village peering over a mountain at the valley below, and hiding behind another ridge from the city smoke and noise. We entered an inn and found a jolly middle aged couple trying to coach four card players and serve the ever-wine-drinking waiters. We discovered we were the first Americans to have gotten lost enough to find their little town. We were shown the only free room and took it. There was no heat, but it was clean and the feather beds were thick enough to keep out any cold, and for only \$2.50, including breakfast.

"After changing our clothes, we made our way back to the city to look for something for Judy's (their two-year-old daughter) birthday. Everything was so expensive we quickly put it back down. As much as we tried, we could not find much other than watches that were Swiss made. All toys, most of the clothing, the canned, bottled and dried food, etc. were stamped 'Made in America.' 'Grown in America' mostly more than I had seen in a long time. Their fresh foods were mostly from Italy. If you ever hear anyone say Switzerland is heaven, you can tell them it should be

everything is so high from the mountains to the prices.

"THE NEXT DAY we were off for a look-see at the country. We had a beautiful day. The sun peaked through a misty film of fog, giving the distant Alps, completely clothed in pure white snow, a dream-like appearance. We drove along one of the many lakes, called seas, and watched the tiny doll-like topped villages on the mountainsides.

"Their crooked streets and colored houses looked like flowers on a white formal dress worn by the giant mountains, all standing around waiting for the dance to begin. Ski traces in the snow wove a lace-like pattern into the picture making it look more and more unreal. Just about the time I began wanting to begin painting a masterpiece, we came to a village along the side of the lake. The town added everything that was needed to complete the picture. We took pictures and wished we could give each of you the hour we spent there.

"Then, turning a corner, a beautiful couple with bright pink shutters topped off by a red roof, rather set us back on our heels. The car sputtered as if also taken back, gasped its disapproval and stopped.

"THE DAY SOON came to an end and we found ourselves at the border where we met Jean Paul,

our French friend. We got a room at a small guest hotel and for the first time in three days found heat, not much, but enough to take a spit bath, in the water hot enough to allow for the difference. After the bath, we made powdered coffee that lasted almost hot.

"The next morning we met Jean Paul and then went to the bank to change our money into American dollars. The top Frenchman in the French zone of Austria is a friend of Jean Paul's and, through him, we were allowed to cross into Austria with the basic questions rather than the all-out search."

MARCH 28.—"We have just finished seeing Italy in eight days, rushing from one end to the other, putting a run in the Italian boot. After going at a snail's pace over the high mountains, we got to Verona, then on to Venice where we took a street car (big boat) down the main street (Grand canal) to the Piazza of San Marco, and visited the palaces, churches, etc., and fed the famous pigeons.

"After crossing bridges through the tiny street sidewalks, across anything but clean lanes, we made our way back to the car. We did not ride in gondolas because they took too much time.

"Leaving there we went down to Florence over the most rugged mountains I have ever seen. We went by car and had to make it to make it to Florence. We stayed our second night there and wandered through a communist riot without even knowing it. The next day we visited the beautiful churches, castles which are now art centers and saw many beautiful pictures and statues known all over the world.

"AFTER VISITING the places of interest in Rome and the Vatican city, we took off for Naples. After all the mountains, the smooth road and lack of hills seemed wonderful and we did not mind the donkey carts as we had in the mountains. It only took us three hours to get there, but we wandered around in the slum streets for another three. We found an American working at the place at which we stopped to eat and he helped us find a hotel. He went with Wayne to take the car to a garage and on the way back, they saw a little 10-year-old boy with his leg off, huddled against the wall of the hotel on the sidewalk sleeping.

"The man just shrugged and said that he was a typical war orphan and to leave him alone and let him sleep in peace—that was the only time he had any. This American worked with such children and he spent the rest of the evening telling us such stories.

"Honestly, the poorest German is rich compared to the people there. One little eight-year-old 'bum' (over 50 per cent of the people living there are beggars) came to Wayne and remembering when the American soldiers were stationed there, he asked him 'Joe, hey Joe, gotta-five dollar-a don't want, Joe? Joe, what-cha gimme?'

"THE NEXT MORNING we got up early and with the help of one of the men at the hotel, found our road to Pompei, passed sleeping Vesuvius. We saw everything there, and our guide, who had taken many G. I.'s through the city, saw to it that we didn't miss a thing. From there, we made our way back to Rome and then off to Pisa. There we stayed the night, and next day took a look at the leaning tower and other buildings there.

"Then long the Italian Riviera through Leghorn to Genoa and up to Milan. About that time we found a super-highway and decided we had seen what there was to see and had better get back home. With gas about 65c a gallon, that was our main expense, because prices ranged about the same as in the states.

"BEFORE WE REACHED the border, we stopped to rearrange the things in the car so their tumbled look would not suggest that we were trying to hide anything. The border officials looked through everything but the fillings in our teeth.

"We took off through Brenner pass. New and old snow left things rather slick and pulled off on the side of the road to spend the night. After about three hours sleep, we went on, stopping at Garmish for breakfast. Three hours later, we were back home with the children."

No. 13 in a Series—KNOW YOUR FACULTY

This column features a short story each week on one of the faculty members of Wayne State Teachers college, in the hope that townspeople and college instructors may become better acquainted.



Raymond A. Schreiner, head of the industrial arts department at Wayne State Teachers college, has a wide range of interests in connection with his teaching profession.

He received his A. B. degree from Peru State Teachers college with majors in education and industrial arts, and minors in mathematics and physical science. Teaching in either of his minor fields would be as interesting as is that of industrial arts, he believes.

Instructing during the regular school year and attending summer school at Colorado State college, Greeley, permitted him to attain his A. M. degree in 1937. During the summers spent in Colorado's vacationland, he developed an appreciation of their climate and also a skillful arm with the rod and reel.

A NATIVE RESIDENT of Nebraska, Mr. Schreiner first attended school at Dunbar. He recalls that due to the smallness of the school, basketball was the chief sport. On one occasion football was attempted for a two-year period but died out. This was not due to lack of interest, but because the only supplies available were helmets for the squad members. All other equipment was either home-

made or entirely lacking. He admitted that playing ball under those conditions was just a trifle rough, but even so they managed a good two seasons before disbanding for gentler types of sports.

Since coming to Wayne in 1938, Mr. Schreiner has taken an active interest in community as well as college affairs.

"WAYNE IS A very pleasant place in which to live," he stated, "but could be a trifle larger. However, a city is no place in which to live either."

To improve our Nebraska school systems, he believes that in addition to restricting, it will be necessary to broaden our tax base by having a sales tax. The additional revenue would not be entirely for school improvement, but for all state uses. Consolidation of our rural schools should be the next step in the educational program.

All of this hinges on the passage of a tax bill with these provisions included, and which he believes must come about in the near future.

MR. SCHREINER enjoys college work and gave as one of his reasons, the greater freedom a college instructor has. The teacher is not as regimented as to time as he is in a secondary school system and also does not have to contend with the discipline problem.

This is a reflection on the fact that a teacher can be identified by the quality of student he perfects, which is reward in itself to dispensers of knowledge.

Safety Council Seeking Funds

The board of directors of the Nebraska State Safety Council last week voted to expand and seek private financing, following the legislature's refusal to grant state funds to the group.

The safety council had been operating on state money and had been occupying space in the state capitol building. However, the legislature removed the proposed appropriation of \$25,000 from the 1949-51 budget bill.

The council's board, headed by Horace F. Crosby, president, will supply two committees one to study immediate financing and the other to study a long-range financing plan and action program.

The board also voted to expand the facilities of the present organization to include all fields of safety. The extent of the council's active program will depend on the amount of money which can be raised for its support.

President Crosby stated that this temporary reversal by the legislature might well be a "punching in disguise." He asserted that this may be the means of making the council a larger and more active organization in the state's safety program.
