A Proposed Farm Program

In a recent issue of the Corn Belt Livestock Feeder, M. J. Hankins of Stanton, Neb., takes issue with the farm program proposed by Secretary of Agriculture Brannan. Because this is a rich farming area, and because a constructive farm program is of importance to farmers' and business people alike, The Herald herewith reprints part of Mr. Hankin's article, dealing with his own suggestions for a farm program:

with his own suggestions for a tarm program:

"I would like to see farm prices supported at a fairly high level based on a revised parity formula that would reflect current conditions; not those of 1910-14. If such a plan could be carried out I believe it would pievent a serious depression, since agriculture is by far our largest industry.
"A farm program, in my estimation, should contain these features—
"1. Treat all farmers alike. No discrimination against our larger, more intelligent.

nation against our larger, more intelligent, more progressive, more industrious, and more successful farmers, and livestock feeders. They are discriminated against too much now in the form of graduated income taxes.

too much now in the form of graduated income taxes.

"2. Details of program to be laid down by congress. Carrying out of program to be routine and of a clerical nature with no important phases to be left to the judgment of the secretary of agriculture or any other person or bureau.

"3. Price supports to be treated as such and not linked with soil conservation or other government programs in such a way as to serve as a whip hand in forcing farmers to comply with each and every damn fool idea that the government might happen to think up and attempt to choke down the throats of farmers through county AAA offices."

In the remainder of his article, Mr. Hankins proceeds to tear apart the program

In the remainder of his article, Mr. Hankins proceeds to tear apart the program proposed by Brannan, pointing out that it will only serve to help bureaucracy tighten its already mighty grip on the nation. Mr. Hankins, by the way, speaks from experience. He says:

"I' have worked 9½ years for the soil conservation service of the United States department of agriculture in an executive capacity so I have had some opportunity to observe some of the internal workings of bureaucratic government."


