

Council Authorizes City Spray Program

Sholes School Patrons Vote New Building

Patrons of school district 76 at Sholes voted unanimously Monday to instruct the schoolboard to construct a new, two-room, eight-grade school building to replace the grade and high school building destroyed by fire a year ago last April.

Ever since the fire, pupils of the district have been attending schools in Carroll, Randolph and adjoining districts, pending the settlement of differences of opinion among patrons as to whether the school should operate only as a grade school or as both grade and high school.

ONE GROUP favored the building of a new grade and high school, other patrons supported their position was opposed by the state board of education which said there is no authority to maintain a high school in the Sholes district. On April 19 District Judge Lyle Jackson ruled to this effect in granting a permanent injunction enjoining the district from maintaining a high school.

The injunction also prevented the district from leasing certain other proposed buildings for school purposes without consent of the voters, and from making any expenditures of district funds without securing a similar permission.

APPROXIMATELY 100 patrons attended the meeting Monday and heard Freeman Decker of Lincoln, director of administration for the state department of education, point out that the district has an obligation to youngsters up to the eighth grade age.

Decker said they should plan a structure which could be expanded into a high school if, at some future date, the law and courts so authorize.

IN VOTING for the erection of the new grade school, the patrons instructed the board of education to hire an architect to plan the building. They hope to have the school under way by the time the new term opens, but believe it might not be ready until the first of the year.

Voters of the district also elected Harry Samuelson to a three-year term as treasurer, succeeding Leo Frederick, who did not seek reelection.

Other ministers in this area who were reassigned to their respective churches are: C. R. Garver, Carroll; A. L. Wright, Laurel and Belden; Victor West, Pierce; R. O. Louthan, Randolph, Coleridge and Belden; H. H. Miller, Stanton and Pilger; Mertie Clute, Winside; and E. A. Gaither, Winsor and Beemer.

Rev. Carl Bader, former Wayne pastor, was named to serve the Elm Park church in Lincoln for the third year.

Explains Resealing Program

Farmers who have loans on their 1948-crop corn have three choices under the resealing program recently announced by the department of agriculture, according to Frank W. Reed, chairman of the state production and marketing administration committee.

Loans and purchase agreements on the 1948 crop corn will be available to farmers in Nebraska until the end of June. Under the resealing program, farmers may (1) pay off loans Sept. 1, the original maturity date, (2) deliver the corn to the commodity credit corporation, or (3) not later than Oct. 31, 1949, extend the loans to mature July 31, 1950.

THE RESEALING program also permits producers who have purchase agreements to (1) sell the corn to CCC, (2) keep it, or (3) put it under loan by Oct. 31, 1949, at the 1948 loan rates, so as to mature July 31, 1950. Under a purchase agreement, the CCC agrees to buy during the 30-day period immediately following the maturity date of the 1948 loans, any quantity of corn up to the maximum covered by the agreement at applicable loan delivery rates.

Farmers who extend their loans or put purchase agreements on corn under loan will be entitled to a storage payment of 10 cents a bushel of the corn is delivered to CCC at maturity of the loans.

OFFICIALS SAID the resealing program seeks to slow down the excessive movement of corn off the farms which would result from heavy deliveries of corn to CCC this fall. Through March, about 243 million bushels of 1948-crop corn had been put under loan and 52 million bushels under purchase agreements. The total may be close to 500 million bushels before the end of June.

Nebraska producers through the month of April had put under loan 44 million bushels of 1948-crop corn, and 4 million bushels under purchase agreements.

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Seek Control Of Flies and Other Insects

First Application Scheduled in Next Few Days

Wayne's city council declared war on flies and other insects Tuesday night when action was taken to have the city sprayed with DDT either this weekend or the forepart of next.

The spray will be in the form of a dry fog which is said to be harmful only to insects. It will be applied on all streets and alleys, parks and playgrounds, and dumping grounds.

The council engaged the Dry Fog service, a Sioux City firm, to do the work. A representative of the company said the people of Wayne need take no special precautions, as the spray will injure no one.

COST OF THE project is estimated at roughly \$200 and will be paid by the city.

In order to keep the city fly-free throughout the summer, two additional applications of the spray probably will be needed.

The council hopes the first spraying will be effective enough so that funds for the remaining two can be raised by popular subscription.

If weather conditions are favorable (not too windy), the city will be sprayed Friday. Otherwise, the work probably will be done next Monday or Tuesday.

A PETITION was presented to the council asking the creation of a new sewer district north of Seventh street on Sherman. The council took no action, pending a survey of the proposed district by an engineer and the preparation of a resolution of necessity.

Three building permits were granted by the council Tuesday. They were for a two-story brick Portfield and Walford Carlson. The third is for a \$6,000 home to be built on Windom street in the College View addition by Victor Morhorts.

Bond Sale at 97 Percent Wayne county is now at 97 percent of its quota in the Opportunity Drive. W. C. Corvill, chairman of the savings bond committee, announced today. The county quota for the drive, which ends on July 30, is \$134,000.

Corvill stated that Nebraska has an excellent chance of being the first state in the union to reach its quota. Almost 80 percent of the \$134,000 assigned has already been subscribed. "In the two weeks remaining, we should be able to do quite a way beyond the four millions we still must meet," he said.

In Omaha, Leland R. Hall, state director of the savings bonds division, stated that Opportunity Drive subscriptions were swelling the already impressive total of bonds held by Nebraska citizens. "Nebraska bond holdings are pressing the three-quarters of a billion mark," he said.



Chabay came to this country first from his native Hungary in 1938 with the Salzburg Opera guild in their presentation of Mozart's "Cose fan Tutte."

FOLLOWING THE Salzburg tour, Chabay returned to Switzerland where he became a member of the Municipal opera in Bern. After four years in Switzerland, Chabay joined the Zurich Opera company, Switzerland's foremost opera companies. Together with his activity in Switzerland he was heard extensively in concert, oratorio and on the radio throughout Europe.

Returning to the United States he joined the Metropolitan Opera association, and is now one of its busiest artists. He is completing his third season with the Metropolitan, has completed his second season with the San Francisco Opera company, and has also been a member of the Mexico Opera Nacional in Mexico City. He has also sung two seasons with the Central City Music festival in Central City, Colo.

FOLLOWING THIS TOUR of the middlewest and south, Chabay will appear as soloist with Dimitri Mitropoulos and the Minneapolis symphony orchestra in one of the final appearances Mitropoulos makes before assuming conductorship of the New York Philharmonic.

Chabay will have with him, as accompanist, Kurt Adler, the chorus master of the Metropolitan Opera association.

RADIO LISTENERS who have heard the Metropolitan opera broadcast have applauded the choral work done by Adler and have also heard him numerous times on the Metropolitan opera between the acts broadcasts.

Adler will play a group of piano solos as part of the program he and Chabay are giving.

**No. 15 in a Series—
KNOW YOUR FACULTY**

This column features a short story each week on one of the faculty members of Wayne State Teachers college, in the hope that townspeople and college instructors may become better acquainted.

A firm believer of the old adage that "travel broadens a person" is Lenore P. Ramsey, head of the Wayne State Teachers' college speech department. To put into practice what she believes, Miss Ramsey can look back on her wanderings in Europe, Canada, Mexico and 47 of our own 48 states. Florida, the only state that she has missed visiting, is next on her list.

Her trip to Europe, which took place in 1937, was the highpoint of her travels. She traveled in Russia, Poland, Sweden, Denmark, Finland, Germany, England, Wales and Ireland. One thing that impressed her at that time was the ability of the people throughout Europe to converse in several different languages. Miss Ramsey believes that all college graduates of this country should be required to take a foreign language and master it, for more and more people are making contacts whereby it is necessary that they must carry on social and business relationships through the use of a common language.

ALTHOUGH NOT a true cast member, Miss Ramsey was reared in Pennsylvania and Indiana. In comparing school systems there with the ones in Nebraska, she gave as one of the reasons Indiana was more advanced, the much earlier settling of that region. Also, flight instructors were the chief residents of the area, and stressed education for all.

After completing work on her M. A. degree at Northwestern university, Evanston, Ill., Miss Ramsey came to Wayne to assume her



duties as speech instructor at the teachers college.

DRAMATIC productions by the students of the college are not only a part of the regular instructing of a dramatics coach, but are to Miss Ramsey a personal and real victory when the participants are made to feel the part of the character they are assuming. The production of "Hamlet" the past year was a long time desire of Miss Ramsey's in presenting Shakespeare's tragedies.

"A time is coming in the not too distant future when it will be required for all rural school teachers to have at least two years of college before teaching," she stated,

and explained that it is a need that has been too long overlooked by the state legislators and not by the educators. In conjunction with this, she believes that speech should be taught to all would-be teachers, for the fact that corrective speech can be taught in the rural school when it is necessary and at the age when it can be most effective.

ENGAGING in a school program that requires as much time as do dramatics, leaves scant time for outside activities. However, collecting stamps, Madonna pictures, and autographed first editions is an interesting pastime of Miss Ramsey's. Tending a garden can also be an interesting and useful pastime, and she admits that her garden this year is successful looking, but attributes it to the fact that nature is a big help.

Time permitting, travel will again take precedence over the every day business of living. Miss Ramsey has decided that to instruct intelligently, a person is better qualified with the actual knowledge of having done a certain thing and done it well.

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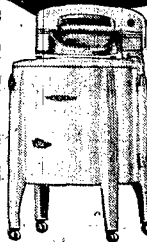

Small Comfort

Government economists see no cause for alarm in the prediction that the total of unemployed will reach nearly four million persons in June—the greatest number of jobless in the United States since February 1942. They say it will still be below the level of 4,200,000 unemployed, which many economists believe is a "safe" figure, considering that the nation has a labor force of more than 60,000,000 persons.

Maybe it isn't alarming, but 4,000,000 isn't very far from the so-called "safe" limit of 4,200,000. And if unemployment continues to increase, the jobless total soon will reach and surpass the "safety" mark.

Government assurances of "nothing alarming" are far less reassuring than a halt in the unemployment trend would be.

Who's Being Discredited?

Iowa Senator Hickenlooper's "witch hunt" in the atomic energy commission seems to be producing little concrete evidence that anything is seriously wrong with the handling of the nation's most closely guarded secret. Top-ranking atomic scientists have come to the defense of Chairman David Lilienthal and other members of the committee with high praise for the commission's management policies. Unless the senator can produce proof to back up his contentions of "mismanagement," he would do better to drop his charges. So far, the publicity which has developed from this investigation has done more to discredit the senator than the men he is investigating.

Lewis, Again

Any possibility that congress might repeal the Taft-Hartley labor act probably ended when John L. Lewis called his miners out for a one-week work stoppage because, as he sees it, the nation's stockpiles are too large. There was no other reason for the stoppage—or strike—whatever you may want to call it. Lewis' action actually appears to be against, rather than for, the interests of labor. Many congressmen who might have been willing to vote for a labor act less stringent than the Taft-Hartley law now will prefer to let it be as it is.

Timid Youth

The Omaha Journal-Stockman notes with horror that the young people of today appear to have little of the initiative their forefathers displayed in developing and building the United States into a great nation. Based on a recent poll of college graduates, the Journal-Stockman notes that only a very few are interested in assuming the responsibilities of going into business for themselves.

If this be true, the United States may be entering a period in which its stature among the nations of the world will decline. But here's what the Journal-Stockman has to say about it:

"What in the world are we Americans doing to our children? That question arises automatically when you read that in a recent survey made by a national magazine among this year's college graduates, only 2 per cent of them had any thought of ever going into business for themselves. On the contrary, what the great majority of the men getting their degrees in 1949 want is the "security" of a position (and not necessarily a high-paying position, either) with some sound corporation. Shades of the pioneers who built this country! And small wonder that socialism, communism, fascism and every other -ism offering a chimerical "security" to its followers is gaining ground. True, these wily salesmen of new political sects say nothing about the freedom of thought, action and opportunity which their followers must barter in exchange for doubtful remedies for the world's ills. But apparently that is not a big item with the majority of young people today. To judge from the results of the survey, what a pity! And what a sad future for America it bodes unless it should turn out that the youngsters were just kidding the poll-takers, and that the spirit of our founding fathers, who died as dead as the gloomy results of this survey would make it seem."

Waterloo (Ia.) Courier: It has long been absurd, of course, that residents of the United States capital have not been allowed to run their own affairs. And nothing has been gained by the undemocratic system previously in effect for the government of the district has not been notoriously efficient nor particularly wise. There is every reason to believe that district residents can do a better job of governing than can committees of congress.

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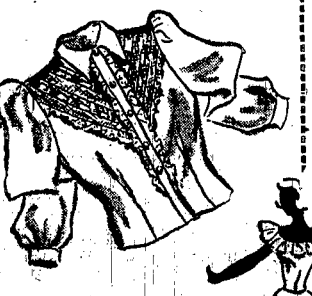

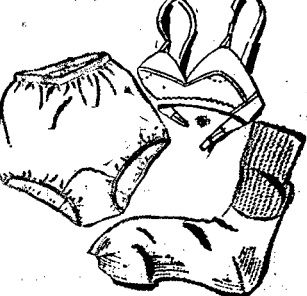
