Last Friday representatives of the press and radio met in Omaha with members of the state medical association, primarily to consider a program which would improve relations between news gathering agencies and the doctors of the state. A program of this type has long been needed; last Fri-day's conference proved to be exactly what was needed to get it started. The meeting, however, also had another

The meeting, however, also had another uppose: Consideration of the Truman ad-ninistration's proposal to institute social-zed medicine in the United States. The nedical profession doesn't like the pro-losal, and seeks to enlist the aid of the press and radio in a program of vigorous pposition to government encroachment in he field of medicine. Newspapers, as a whole, are solidly behind the medical pro-lession in this fight—not just because it's he medical profession that's being threat-ned, but because every new socialistic step of the government is another threat to our ystem of free enterprise.
