

# 'Good Farming Pays Dividends'

That the use of better livestock and livestock particles pays divi-dends is being demonstrated by the Edward B. Watkins family, lwho live on the Spahr place, two and three-fourths miles northwest of Wayne, says Thomas G. Nealon, county 'supervisor of the Farmers Home administration in Wayne. The Watkins family started farming in 1949 with a supervised oredit loan from the FFIA with which they purchased 5 milk cows, 6 brood sows, 2 horses, tractor and the necessary machinery to oper-dic the farm. Now they have 7 head of cattle, 62 head of hogs, 90 laying hens, 4000 young chickens, bosides having a garden and good looking crops consisting of 45 acres of corn, 10 acres of cats, 10 acres of allalla and 7 acres of bromus pasture.
