Good steers bulked at \$24.75 to \$25.75 and good choice sold up to \$26.50. Medium shortfeds brought \$23 to \$24.50. Medium and good fed heifers and mixed yearlings

brought \$22.50 to \$25 and good to choice sold up to \$26.

Good drylot cows looked fully steady with grass cows weak to 50 cents lower. Common and medium bulked at \$14.50 to \$16, good \$17 to \$19.50. Canners and cutters sold \$12 to \$13.50. Bulls sold strong to 50 cents higher with good heavy sausage kinds \$18.50 to \$19.50, good beef bulls \$17.50 to \$18.50.

An increased supply of stockers and feeders sold around 50 cents lower. Medium to good stockers bulked at \$19.50 to \$23, with choice

675-pound steers topping at \$24.50. Good 1,000-pound feeders earned \$20 to \$21.

Butcher hogs moved 25 to 50 cents lower at \$14.50 to \$21, and sows sold 50 cents lower at \$12.50 to \$17.75.

Slaughter lambs sold steady, native springers topping at \$26, and killer ewes were unchanged at \$8 to \$9.

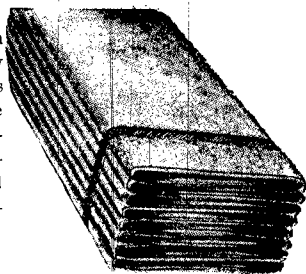

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Walter Monument Co. Please Watch Out For Telephone Wires When Moving High Machinery. This column features a short story each week on one of the faculty members of Wayne State Teachers college, in the hope that town people and college instructors may become better acquainted.



Professor Anderson, chairman of the division of fine arts returned to the mid-west for more education. He received his Mus. M. from Bush Conservatory of Music, now known as Chicago College of Music.

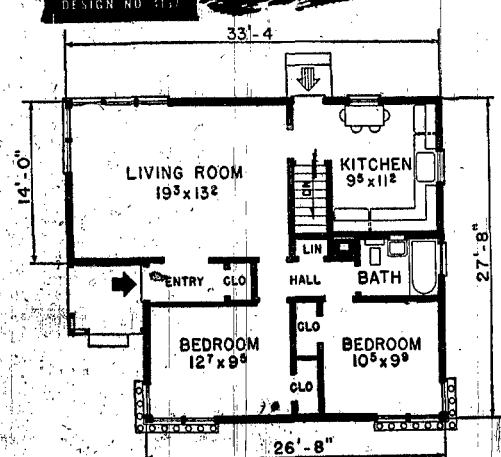
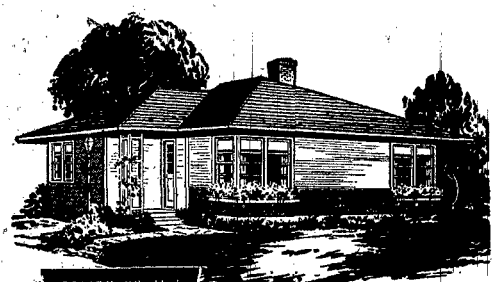
