Says Adults Need X-rays

Omaha—Older persons should have chest X-ray pictures to help in diagnosing tuberculosis, in the opinion of Dr. Paul V. Joliet of the United States public health service, who spoke at the annual meeting of the Nebraska Tuberculosis Association in Omaha last week.

Dr. Joliet explained that community-wide surveys for tuberculosis are the best means of detecting cases of tuberculosis, and can now be done rapidly by inexpensive miniature X-ray pictures.

In speaking to more than 100 delegates at the meeting, held at the home hotel, Dr. Joliet said that of the first 200 adults he might X-ray, at least one would have tuberculosis, requiring medical attention.

Urges Better National Health

"We should be spending as much money on a national health program as we do on training our military forces," said Milo Bail, president of Omaha university, at the July 6 college convocation.

"Unless a person has good health, he cannot live positively," Bail continued. "The world is filled with negativism, suspicion, tension and uncertainty. We need individuals who can give certainty and positive viewpoint."

"Good health is essential to positive living. Other essentials are working for enjoyment, mental alertness and curiosity, community participation, pioneer spirit and faith in self, fellow man, American government and God."

There are thousands of frontiers available to people with vision and willingness to work. We must eradicate the welfare state complex from the thinking of students. The world of 2000 A.D. is in the hands of today's classrooms.

The challenge of education is to develop pupils to capacity and change behavior patterns from what they are today to what they

should be. The effect is that we will have a better world.

"People are the same now as they were before the war. They are afflicted with a desire to escape reality through trivial activities, but they should desire importance and status," the speaker concluded.

Who Spends the Money?

The federal deficit for the past fiscal year has turned out to be larger—much larger—than even President Truman had forecast. And another whopping deficit seems in the making for the new fiscal year—unless taxes are increased and spending is stopped.

We have done our share of carping at the administration for its spendthrift policies, and probably will continue to complain. But in truth, all the blame does not belong to the administration, nor to congress. We, the people, are more at fault than anyone, because we are the ones who demand the programs and benefits which make these heavy expenditures necessary.

The next time you read about billions of dollars being spent for something, stop and think a moment before you condemn our legislators for authorizing the expenditure. Was the expenditure for something you wanted? For example, are you in favor of government supported prices for farm products? Probably you are, because you live in an agricultural area, and if the farmer doesn't prosper, neither will you. Do you favor a big budget for the armed forces? Perhaps you do, because these are troubled times and you want our nation to be prepared in case of another war. Do you want the government to develop rivers and harbors? Perhaps this doesn't seem quite so important to you, but it does seem important to people in other sections of the United States. Do you want the federal government to help in the development of better roads? The answer is probably "yes," because your roads are not very good.

All of these programs, and many, many others cost money, and we have these programs only because you and a lot of other people want them. Government spending will not decrease until we, the people, stop asking the government to give us this, that or something else. We, after all, really are the ones who are doing the spending.

'Pork Barrel' Aid to State

(Knoxville, Ia., Journal)

Former President Hoover used some hard words when he answered a congressman's request for frank discussion of the larger appropriations of federal money to aid public schools generally in all states. He called some of the proposals "pork barrel" aid, including more or less "fat" for all comers, needy or not.

In what he said was this idea: that if aid is granted to states for public schools, it should go only to states where there is great need and little money, and not to states where there is money available and need is not so urgent. When federal funds go to areas that might well take care of themselves, that's "pork barrel" distribution and usually for political effect.

That raises the question whether Iowa wants to have any part of any "pork barrel" aid for its public schools, whether it can very well take care of its own school support.

When we size up the condition of our state treasury, overflowing with funds to the worry of many because they are piled so high, the answer is and should be "No." Of course, we say, when money is being passed around by the federal government, "we in Iowa might as well take it as not." That's what makes "pork barrel" proposals so effective, in politics; they seem to offer something for nothing, yet they never do. The people always pay the cost in the end.

The fact is that Iowa can and should take care of its own public school needs; it is abundantly able to do so. There are occasions when communities in the state need aid from the state to meet special local problems, but that is "within the state family."

Moreover, unless states that are able to meet their own public school needs stop crowding up to the federal aid "trough" every time a call goes out to come and get it, there can be no cutting down of federal spending.

Also, there is the question whether the states, in accepting federal aid for schools and other local institutions, do not invite bureaucratic federal control to come in and take a hand in carrying on local affairs.

The fact is that they do. Where federal money goes, there also goes more or less federal control or interference.

Goes Against Us
(Omaha Journal-Stockman)

Some analysts of things economic have come up with the conclusion that the recently concluded five-year trade agreement between England and Argentina is certain to cut into the foreign trade possibilities of the United States. Exports from this country to Britain, chiefly agricultural products, will suffer, the experts say, but they see an even greater loss for American

manufacturer in outlet for their products in South America.

Theoretically, the agreement calls for as even a swap as possible of British coal, petroleum and manufactured goods for meat and animal feeds mainly. Actually, England isn't expected to be able to export enough stuff to balance the trade scales. But the rub is that our British cousins will make up the unfavorable overlap in their trade balance in sterling, not dollars, so whatever money Argentina gets out of the deal will have to be spent in countries that are on a sterling basis, and cannot be used in the United States to buy the things the Latin-Americans need. In other words, for his direct loans and Marshall plan help, good, generous Uncle Sam appears to have been left holding the bag when it comes to foreign trade on anything but a give-away basis. Perhaps it's no wonder that Washington is getting worried about our future crop surpluses and what to do with them.

OUT OF OLD NEBRASKA

STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The grand and glorious Fourth always has been enthusiastically celebrated in Nebraska, and the records of Nebraska's past are replete with accounts of Independence Day festivities. Though some of the early celebrations may lack a little glamour in the eyes of today's generation, it is true nevertheless that those pioneer Nebraskans, dependent upon their own resources rather than commercial entertainment, actually had as good a time (if not a better one) on the Fourth than we do of this generation.

Without a doubt, the Fourth of July was one of the most important occasions of the year in old Nebraska. Celebrations followed a somewhat established pattern, and the program, the big dance and the dinner were regular features. Celebrants came from miles around, frequently beginning their trip on the third and arriving home the fifth.

OCCASIONALLY, enterprising promoters used a Fourth of July celebration as a means of advertising and selling town lots. Lots in Omaha were advertised that way in 1854, and the same device was used at Decatur.

In the latter instance, "dodgers" were sent out through the county promising free meals and "surprise" amusements. The "surprise" was to consist of a war dance by Indians from a neighboring agency. The Indians, however, decided to do a little surprising on their own and swopped down upon the gathering as they were attacking the assembled whites in earnest. As a result, every last visitor packed up and fled, leaving the local citizenry with great quantities of food and town lots. The Indians weren't interested in the latter, but they did help dispose of the food.

Indians also figured in the first celebration at Falls City, in 1837, but their war dance on that occasion was strictly according to schedule. General Jim Lane, the noted Kansas Jayhawker, was the principal orator of the day, and a rifle and drum furnished the music.

One of the smallest celebrations on record was that at St. Edward in 1871, the year the town was laid out. Only four men were present, but "speeches were made, songs sung and the Declaration of Independence repeated from memory."

The first recorded celebration in Lancaster (later Lincoln) took place in 1862. It began simply as a gooseberry hunt, but before the day was over Elder Young and a group looking for a site on which to colonize arrived, with the result that a regular patriotic program developed with Elder Young delivering an address on respect for the flag and the dangers of the Civil War.

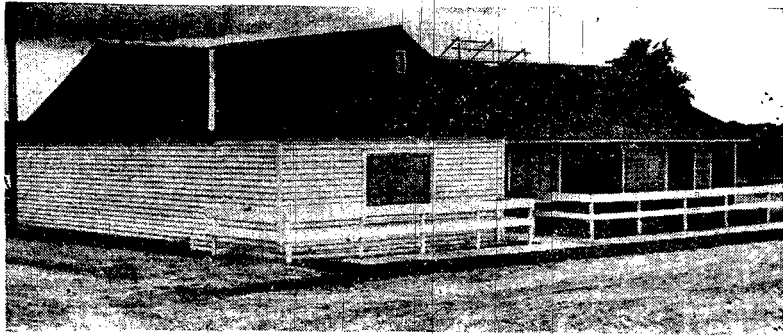

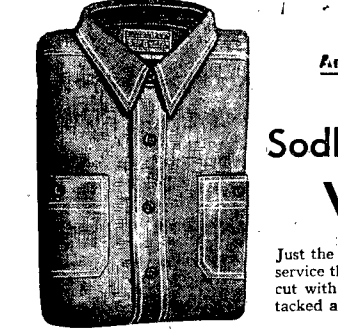
