Fifth Annual Music Camp Opens Aug. 7

The fifth annual high school band and choral music camp will be held Aug. 7 to 14 on Wayne State's summer campus. All high school students with previous band and choral experience are invited to participate.

The camp will be under the joint direction of Russel Anderson and Eugene Beaman. They will be assisted by other Wayne State faculty members and by band and choral directors from various high schools.

Purpose of the music camp is to provide an opportunity for talented students of music to come together for a week of study and performance of the better choral, symphonic, and instrumental literature.

REGISTRATION will take place Sunday, Aug. 7, from 3 to 5 p.m. in the Student Union lounge. The music camp is for all high school students, including graduates of 1949.

Paul Van Brodegraven of the University of Missouri will be guest conductor on Aug. 10 and 11 at the Wayne State music camp. He is in constant demand throughout the midwest as a music critic, conductor, contest judge, and speaker.

INSTRUMENTAL work will be under the direction of Prof. Eugene Beaman of Wayne State Teachers college, who will be assisted by A. J. Atkins, director of instrumental music, Wayne city high school, and Duane Schultz, director of instrumental music, Wisner.

Choral work will be under the direction of Prof. Russel Anderson of Wayne State, assisted by Earl Jenkins, director of music, Columbus, and Guy Swanson, director of music, West Point.

The string ensemble will be under the direction of Mr. Beaman.

These prices are: Wheat, \$2.01; oats, 1.66; barley, \$1.12; and rye, \$2.71.

Loans will be available through the Commodity Credit Corporation through Jan. 31, 1950, and will mature April 30, 1950, or earlier on demand.

If offered as security for a farm-storage loan, the grain must have been stored in the granary or bin at least 30 days prior to its inspection for measurement, sampling and sealing, unless otherwise approved by the state PMA committee.

Discuss Farm Rentals Aug. 3

12 Counties to Convene Here

Lincoln—About 75 persons especially interested in farm rentals in 12 northeast Nebraska counties will meet in Wayne Wednesday, Aug. 3, to thresh out farm lease problems arising in that area.

The workshop meeting is one of a series arranged by F. J. Chase, University of Nebraska college of agriculture extension economist in farm management. Local arrangements are being handled by Donald E. Warner, Wayne county extension agent.

SESSIONS WILL OPEN at 9:30 a.m. in the Wayne State Teachers college Student Union building. A. W. Epp, University of Nebraska rural economist, and Richard Flynn, Norfolk, professional farm management representative, will discuss lease requirements and the latest developments in farm management practices. Then the meeting will be divided into small groups for the discussion of such problems as these:

1. Essential features of good lease contracts and agreements.

Blaze Destroys Three Buildings On Chace Farm

Three buildings and part of their contents were lost in a bad farm fire late Tuesday afternoon on the Chace farm, located seven miles north, two miles west and a half-mile north of Wayne.

Tenant on the farm is Paul Erickson, who lives there with his mother, Mrs. Victor Erickson. The Erickson family has been on this farm for about 25 years.

Apparently starting in a wash and storage house at approximately 6 p.m., the flames got into the nearby garage and seemed to break out of both buildings at nearly the same time. The blaze was first discovered by Mrs. Erickson.

NEXT TO BE engulfed by flames was the well equipped farm workshop of Paul Erickson. All of his good machine tools, including a lathe, were lost in the fire. This building also contained some oil supplies, according to local firemen, which added to the fire's intensity.

In the wash house, the family's washing machine and equipment was lost, as well as a supply of coal and other fuel, and additional stored items.

The garage was a large building in which the car and tractors were housed. However, the car was pushed out before damage and the tractors were saved.

Says Aviation Producing Changes in World

"Aviation has wrought vast changes that cannot be enumerated in schools and educators," said John W. Patterson, representative of the Civil Aeronautics administration, at a Wayne State Teachers college convocation Wednesday morning.

"Time and space have an altogether new meaning now than in past generations," the speaker remarked, "because there is no place on the face of the earth that is more than 38 hours distance from Wayne."

He pointed out that the leaders of all the world's nations can assemble in less time now than the county superintendents of Nebraska could have a generation ago.

"In 1926," Patterson said, "there were 92 airports in the United States; there are 2,000 now in America, and more than 100,000 airplanes as compared with 100,000 today, and 5,000 pilots as compared with 500 then."

He said that the impact of the air age is changing social, political and economic orders in the world.

Secondly, aviation affords stimulation to the schools' curriculums. In the third place, it is a duty of citizenship to know about advanced aviation business because America's future is in the air.

As a fourth reason, he said that many vocation opportunities are supplied by the 6000 types of jobs in the aviation industry, which is the fourth largest industry in America.

Fifth, the United States must maintain a strong national air defense, Patterson stated.

Is Up 1 Mill as Constitutional Limit Reached

Wayne county's proposed tax levied in 1949 at 5 mills, or 1 mill higher than last year, according to the summary of county budget and levy comparisons published in today's Herald.

The proposed budget for the fiscal year July 1, 1949, to June 30, 1950, is not necessarily the budget which will finally be adopted by the county board of commissioners. It is compiled to provide a basis for estimating the county's financial needs for the new fiscal year.

Mill levies proposed for all funds for an additional 1 mill, except for two which are eliminated entirely this year. These are the veterans aid and farm-to-market levies in 1949, the county levied .10 mill for veterans aid and .50 mill for farm-to-market roads.

COUNTY CLERK C. A. Bard said it was decided to eliminate the veterans aid levy for this year upon the recommendation of the veterans committee. This fund now has a cash balance of \$6,642.39, and the committee felt that no more is needed at this time.

Last year's half-mill levy on farm-to-market roads was eliminated in the county's history for this purpose. It was levied because state law prevented the county from exceeding a limit of 3 1/4 mills for all funds, with the exception that an additional 1 mill could be levied for farm-to-market roads.

THE LAST SESSION of the legislature, however, authorized the 3 1/4-mill limit, permitting counties to levy up to the constitutional limit of 5 mills total for all funds. Henceforth, money for farm-to-market roads will be raised through the regular road levy.

The county's farm-to-market fund now totals \$10,253.96. Largest proposed increases are in the road and bridge funds, both of which have had steadily decreasing cash balances in recent years. The next year proposes an increase of \$60 mill in the road fund and a boost of 60 mill in the bridge fund.



Fuel for the Fire

The federal payroll continues to increase, notes Congressman Karl Stefan in his newsletter this week.

Stefan reports that civilian employment by the government reached 2,120,019 in May—a net increase of 9,490 over April and 20,303 over March. He places the average federal pay at about \$3,000 annually—which means that in May alone the annual cost of government personnel increased “at the rate of \$918,000 per day.”

Meanwhile, the government is spending more than it takes in. The unnecessary expansion of the federal payroll must be considered one of the reasons why the government is unable to balance its budget.

If the republican party chooses to make an issue of the administration's spendthrift ways in the 1950 campaign, it will have plenty of fuel for the fire.

Danger in the Corn Fields

Wayne county's corn crop at this season of the year looks like a world beater. And it presents a picture of rare beauty, too, as the fast growing, dark green stalks push upward from day to day.

But, pleasant as it is to contemplate, let's remember that our tall corn fields also have in them an element of danger. Now all motorists on country roads must use extra caution when approaching intersections, because the corn is so tall that it often is impossible to see cars approaching from either side.

Let's take justifiable pride in our corn, but let us not permit it to be the cause of tragic highway accidents.

Teaching Problems

(Dakota County Star)

A former South Sioux high school principal, C. C. "Bud" Kikler, has suggested an organization primarily of business men to advance the cause of education in Nebraska.

Pointing out the Nebraska legislature has "not been very friendly toward schools" for as long as he could remember, Mr. Kikler reasons that leaders within the teaching profession cannot properly promote the more practical politics of education.

Mr. Kikler, who now is executive secretary of the Kansas State Chamber of Commerce, is quite right.

The leadership of the Nebraska Education association has gained for itself a somewhat tinted reputation of attempting to bulldoze the legislature into educational financing with somewhat of a "the hell with everything else" attitude.

The education association's bungling of the \$40 amendment two years ago, and their bland attempt to push through a sales tax in the last legislative session are examples of their effectiveness.

Educational leaders have muttered about forming "the greatest political organization" the state has ever seen. In fact, State Superintendent Wayne O. Reed made a similar threat indirectly to the 1949 unicameral.

Overbearing political organizations which seek to control legislatures or public offices are absolutely without value in Nebraska or any other state. Whether they consist of teachers with white collars or union men in work clothes, makes no difference.

Mr. Kikler's suggestion, however, would bring individuals from outside the teaching profession directly to the problems troubling the educational leaders. Compromises could be worked out and help given to legitimate educational financing by business men instead of primarily by the teachers themselves.

Reasonable work could then be done in the legislature.

Mr. Kikler's suggestion is not original. In Kansas, he wrote Superintendent E. N. Svett, the state chamber of commerce provides the leadership. In South Dakota it is The Greater South Dakota Association.

He suggests a "well-organized, well-directed, non-partisan, non-personal and non-sectional, voluntary, over-all group of qualified people who accept the obligation of thinking and planning and working for the welfare of the state."

This suggestion, we believe, has considerable merit and would, come closer to advancing Nebraska's educational difficulties than the strongest political organization the teachers ever could develop.

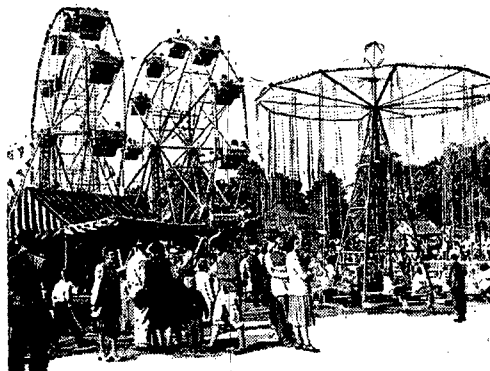
