Fuel for the Fire
The federal payroll continues to increase notes Congressman Karl Stefan in his newsletter this week.

letter this week.

Stefan reports that civilian employment by the government reached 2,120,019 in May—a net increase of 9,490 over April and 20,903 over March. He places the average federal pay at about \$3,000 annually—which means that in May alone the annual cost of government personnel increased "at the rate of \$918,000 per day."

Meanwhile, the government is spending more than it takes in. The unnecessary expansion of the federal payroll must be considered one of the reasons why the government is unable to balance its budget.

If the republican party chooses to make an issue of the administration's spendthrift ways in the 1950 campaign, it will have plenty of fuel for the fire.

Danger in the Corn Fields

The leadership of the Nebraska Education association has gained for itself a somewhat tinted reputation of attempting to bulldoze the legislature into educational financing with somewhat of a "the hell with everything else" attitude.

The education association's bungling of the \$40 amendment two years ago, and their bland attempt to push through a sales tax in the last legislative session are examples of their effectiveness.
Educational leaders have muttered about forming "the greatest political organization" the state has ever seen. In fact, State Superintendent Wayne O. Reed made a similar threat indirectly to the 1949 unicameral.

Overbearing political organizations which seek to control legislatures or public offices are absolutely without value in Nebraska or any other state. Whether they consist of teachers with white collars or union giet in work clothes, makes no difference.

He suggests a "well-organized, well-directed, non-partisan, non-personal and non-sectional, voluntary, over-all group of qualified people who accept the obligation of thinking and planning and working for the welfare of the state."

This suggestion, we believe, has considerable merit and would come closer to advancing Nebraska's educational difficulties than the strongest political organization the teachers ever could develop.




