

He hasn't yet heard of the "hard times of '49."

He's too dang busy trying to keep his customers satisfied and still do the work that he is unable to hire get done.

Trie we have seasonal slumps. But we have always had them: those in-petween periods when farmers are too busy o come to town, or are hoarding their extra gast against coming expenses or hedging

ainst a crop loss.
So we ask, "What depression?"
